# Walkout and boycott are absence, says Supreme Court

# Speaker to determine period

By Staff Correspondent

In a unanimous opinion on the presidential reference, the Supreme Court yesterday declared that the "walkout" from and 'boycott' of the Parliament by the Opposition members must be construed as "absence", resulting in the vacation of their seats. The five-judge Appellate Division also expressed the view that the prorogation period should be excluded in computing the 90 consecutive sitting days and that it is the Speaker who will compute and determine the period of absence.
