

She identified some factors like erosion of social and cultural values, caste system, unequal position of women in family and society, drug addiction, regional and international conflicts causing discrimination against women.

Identifying lack of social security and poverty as obstacles to women development, Begum Zia stressed the need for building a broadbased women movement to ensure overall security for them.

Referring to the poor soclo-economic condition of women in the SAARC countries, she said they are deprived of loan facilities, suit-

The Awami League Central Working Committee (ALCWC) vesterday resolved that the Prime Minister should immediately advise the President to dissolve Parliament and take measures for holding general elections under a non-party caretaker administration.

According to a senior AL leader, the party is now waiting for a fresh government offer for dialogue on the issue of a caretaker government for conducting the next general elections, insisting that it would be the only option to overcome the long political

Chaired by acting party chief Abdus Samad Azad, the meeting also viewed that only such steps could rid the nation of the long standing political crisis. Otherwise, it warned, the nation would be thrown into a deeper crisis.

Dhaka seeks help in water management

Kathmandu sees overland transit vital for trade

The 9th meeting of Bangladesh-Nepal Joint Economic Commission began in Dhaka vesterday against the backdrop of a poor progress in economic interaction between the two neighbouring countries, reports UNB.

While the JEC is meeting after a lapse of four years, an official document revealed that most decisions of the 8th meeting still remained unattended.

Important decisions, including initiatives for setting up joint-venture cement and pharmaceutical units in Nepal, joint boulder mining and technical cooperation in the areas of garments and jute, were not followed up during the last four years as, said the document, the Nepalese side continued to

show apathy to follow up. According to an official, the current session will concentrate on reviewing the follow-up of the decisions of the last meeting, held in September Kathmandu, rather than add fresh agenda

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman is heading a 12member home-side at the meeting. Nepalese Minister for Finance and Civil Supplies Bharat Mohan Adhikari is leading an eight-member delegation of his country.

Senior officials of different ministries and a representative from the FBCCI are included in the Bangladesh delegation.

Although Saifur Rahman did not explicitly referred to the lacklustre scenario of Dhaka-Kathmandu economic ties, he lamented the sloth in regional cooperation in South

'We (SAARC countries) are still practising the regional cooperation only as a theory, Rahman said.

Volume of trade between Dhaka and Kathmandu currently figures a meagre 10 million US dollars a year with

the balance overwhelmingly tilted towards Bangladesh. Joint-venture is still out of venture.

In 1993-94, Bangladesh's exports to Nepal grossed Tk 44 crore against its import bills of Tk 1.81 crore. Largescale import of Bangladeshi urea fertiliser by Nepal results in the trade gap.

Problem of transportation was identified vesterday by the finance ministers of both the countries as the main obstacle responsible for the staggeringly low level of bilateral trade.

Expressing his concern at the trade imbalance, the Nepalese minister, however, told the inaugural session that arrangement of overland traffic-in transit facility was vital for expanding the twoway trade. He said his country would initiate dialogue with India for allowing the landlocked Nepal the use of land route, as in case of See Page 12 Col 8
