

Rao hints at polls in Kashmir within 4 months

KUALA LUMPUR, Aug 4: Indian Prime Minister P V Narasimha Rao said today his government has plans for elections in strife-torn Kashmir soon. Malaysia's Bernama news agency reported, reports Reuter.

"... In the next three to four months, please don't be surprised if we have fair and free elections in (Kashmir) That is that we have planned." Rao told reporters during his four-day visit to Malaysia.

In June, New Delhi extended its direct rule over Jammu and Kashmir, saying it planned to hold elections in the state to start afresh the democratic process.

Plans to hold elections in July fell through after a shrine to Kashmir's patron saint, Sheikh Nooruddin Wali, was burnt down in May, causing widespread violence.

The Dhaka Stock Ex change (DSE) witnessed another week of healthy trading of shares as both its' market capitalisation and all share price index marked

The DSE index rose by 5.51 points or 0.71 per cent to 775.67 at the closing of the week Thursday from the previous week's 770.16. The index had gone up to 781.25 points on the second day of last week Sunday - and went down to 771.89 points Wednesday.

The market capitalisation last week rose by Tk 78 crore to Tk 47.96 billion from the previous week's 47.18 billion. In line with the movements of the index, the capitalisation rose to as high as Tk 48.34 billion Sunday and then gradually came down to 47.73 billion Wednesday.

The week's trading was dominated by different Beximeo shares. Beximeo Pharma and Beximco Textiles continued to lead the volume See Page 12 Col 7
