'Arms ban now stands null and void'

Dhaka proposes emergency OIC summit on Bosnia

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia yesterday called for an emergency summit of the OIC states to work out strategy for protecting independence and territorial integrity of Bosnia-Herzegovina by detering the Serb aggres-

sion, reports UNB. She put forward some specific proposals for providing the legitimate government of the Muslim republic with moral, material, humanitarian and military support enabling it to resist further acts of aggression.

The Prime Minister sent the proposals to the heads of state or government of the

Muslim countries through letters delivered to the envoys of the OIC countries in Dhaka vesterday.

Begum Zia in her letter expressed deep concern over the volatile situation in former Yugoslavia, particularly the massacre in the enclaves of Zepa and Srebrenica after the fall of safe zones to the Serb aggressors.

Briefing newsmen about the contents of the proposals at the Foreign Office, Foreign Secretary Farooq Sobhan said Bangladesh has proposed for development of well-armed six battalion troops from OIC states to the 'safe zone' of

"Bangladesh is ready to send one battalion," he said. Farooq Sobhan said the Prime Minister further suggested that the capability of the peacekeepers be stren-

Replying to a question, the Foreign Secretary said Bangladesh would send even a regiment if asked for to protect the enclave. More than 1200 Bangladeshi

troops are now deployed in the UN designated safe zone of Bihac in Balkan.

Five other OIC troops contributing countries to Bosnia are Pakistan, Malaysia, Turkey, Jordan and Egypt.

The Foreign Secretary said the Prime Minister in her letter expressed the views in line with the OIC decisions that the arms embargo against Bosnian Muslims "now stands null and void."

JHENIDAH, Aug 15: At least 150 people were missing after a launch capsize in the river Chitra, about 16 kilometre off Narail town. reports UNB.

Police said ML 'Bashanti' from Khulna went down the turbulent river at Raghunathpur in Kalia thana in the

afternoon. The small motor launch with 150 passengers aboard was caught in a whirlpool and overturned by the strong current, witnesses said.

By-polls deferral not dictated, vows CEC

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Justice AKM Sadeque has refuted the allegations that he was instructed by the government to defer the by-elections.

"I can say on vow, though a man of my status should not do this, that I did not have any communication with anybody in the government regarding deferral of by-elections," he told this correspondent yesterday.

Said the CEC. "It was done absolutely because of the flood situation. It was my own decision and nobody influenced me to make it". He also said he would announce the election schedule as soon at the flood situation im-

He said deferral of election by 90 more day did not

always mean that the election would be held on the last day of the 90-day extension. The Election Commission would have to hold by-elections to 144 seats, he said and added. The commission cannot go for general elections."

Recognising the fact that all concerned districts were not affected by floods, he said the commission would have to hold by-elections in all vacant seats simultaneously. There was no scope for separate elections, he said.

'Corporate tax rate should be below 20pc to attract FDI'

The country's corporate tax rates should be brought down to a level not higher than 20 per cent from the current 35 per cent to 47.5 per cent level to attract more foreign direct investment (FDI), suggested a recent re-

The report of the Policy Implementation and Analysis Group (PIAG), also advised not to extend the current tax holidays for industries set up after June 2000, the date up to which it has been extended in this year's budget. The attraction of foreign investment would undoubtedly be enhanced if taxes were at low levels - at levels comparable to those maintained in foreign investors own countries and in other countries which are competing with Bangladesh for foreign investment," said the report, which is due to be submitted to the government
