
DID U' KNOW?

Column One Indians win Asian duel

The indian boys handball team trounced Pakistan 33-21 in their first match of the sixth Commonwealth youth handball championship at the Mirpur Indoor Stadium yesterday. The Indians, who dominated the encounter from the start led 17-9 after the opening half.

The winners showed superior technique in all parts of the game and simply over powered their opponents with their quick, breezy style.

Raj Kumar and Jas Karan Singh scored at will. Raj Kumar was particularly impressive on the fast breaks and was rewarded with nine goals while Jas Karan notched up seven including three penalties. Kulwinder Singh, the Indian No 10 also impressed the crowd with his four spectacular goals.

Their defence was also rock-solid at the outset but loosened up as their victory became imminent. Both their custodians - Hamid Khan and Makesh Chand - handled their jobs competently thwarting many Pakistan sorties and helping to create a host of fast counter-attacks for their own attackers.

Pakistan rode solely on Mohammed Zubair, their hero against Hong Kong the day before. The diminutive scorer top-scored with twelve goals including six penalties as he carried on the one-man battle. Although their team coordination looked to be good, displaying quick passing and organised attacks, the Pakistanis lacked in both skill and experience.

At the post-match press briefing the Indian coach Manjir Singh pinpointed his opponent's lack of technique and experience as their pit-

Manjir said that his team was better prepared for the match and that he expects a similar result against Hong Kong today.

The Pakistani coach Syed Qalab Abbas said that he was happy with his team's performance taking into view heir lack of experience and raining. He counted scoring

goals against India as quite an achievement.

The win puts India level with their neighbours on two points but Pakistan have played an extra match. The placings of Group B and the two semifinal qualifiers from the group will be decided after the India Hong Kong match today.

sured their place in the last four when they drew 16-16 with holders Great Britain a Group-A match. The tie puts the teams equal on one point each but Nigeria became group runners-up, behind hosts Bangladesh, with a better goal advantage.

In a keenly contested match, the defending champions were leading 9-6 at the breather.

The British captain Kevin Lindsey again provided the inspiration for his team scoring four goals and setting up many more. lan Evans also scored four with his impressive dribbling and dodging skills. But the title-holders lost steam as the match went on and Nigeria gradually took control.

Two late goals by Paul Medawar and a last minute penalty by the skipper finally brought England level after they were two down with three minutes to go.

For the young Nigerians Afolobi returned with six goals while Musa Jibran chipped in with four.

The Nigerian Aliwu coach blamed injuries sustained in the match against Bangladesh for his team's inability to win. Phil Church, the British coach, said his team's inexperience showed when they could not capitalise on a firsthalf lead. He mentioned that his frontline let him down but his defence is the most disciplined in the tournament. He appreciated the local crowd for encouraging his team and expressed his desire to win in the 5th/6th position decider.

Church requested this correspondent to put his team down as Great Britain despite the official papers reading England. He mentioned that many of his players are Scottish, which technically qualifies his team to be a British outfit.

India top this section with full four points while Bangladesh and Great Britain are yet to open their accounts.



"I mean, you are out for two years, you come back, and to win a final one and love, that is pretty much impossible," Sampras said. "If I was out for two years and came back, who is to say if I could get through the qualifier? It is a whole different game.

Sampras cited the comeback of Mats Wilander, winner of three Grand Slam titles in 1988, who took off most of three years before playing his first full season again last year.




