Resuming at 39 without loss, Jason Gallian and Atherton took the score to 60 when Ambrose, the only bowler all Test to find some life in the pitch, found Gallian's edge which Stuart Williams took at third slip.

Four runs later, John Crawley opened the face of his bat to an away swinger from Ambrose and wicketkeeper Courtney Browne took the catch to give the match a dramatic turn.

Atherton played a responsible innings and was the fourth batsman in the Test to be out in the 90s, caught down the leg side by Browne off lan Bishop for 95 (Hick was out for 96 and Jack Russell for 91 in England's first innings, and West Indies captain Richie Richardson made 93).

After its first innings total of 454. England thought it was in a position to win its first series against the West Indies since 1969.

In the end, a slow and placid batsman's pitch made a draw inevitable.
