### LTTE sets conditions to free hostages

"There are important, potentially difficult, conditions to be met for the release of some people they have taken prisoners," the source told Reuters.

Corporation under an agree ment with BSL got the responsibility for management of the hotel for 20 years with effect from 1984.

The Ministry of Civil Aviation and Tourism scrutinised the allegations levelled against the management of Hotel Sheraton whereby it appeared that the hotel used to make profit during 1973 to 1983 under the management of the Inter-Continental chain, the handout noted.

But, since the management of the hotel went to Sheraton, it has started making huge losses every year which has became a matter of concern for the Taka 200 crore hotel property of the government.

While making further examinations, it appeared that the unequal agreement giving responsibility to Sheraton to manage the hotel was responsible for incurring such huge losses. The government feels that the agreement requires to be changed, it added.

the day. Our Correspondent from Dinajpur reported that at least nine people, including a woman, were injured in clashes between two rival political parties near the Suinhary intersection in the

News agency reports said that at least 12 people were injured in a clash between pickets and anti-hartal shopkeepers in Rajshahi while nine were injured when antihartal activists attacked an Awami League procession at Pakundia Bazar in Kishoregani district.

In Chandpur, at least 12 people, including two train drivers, were injured when opposition activists stoned a train and some government offices to enforce the hartal.

In the city, sporadic explosion of crackers marked the day. But there was no report of major casualty. The pickets burnt tyres on city streets at different areas.

A large contingent of police and BDR personnel were deployed at different city points. Chase and counter chase between police and pro-hartal activists took place at Airport Road near Shaheen College where a tempo was set ablaze early morning. Police also fired two rounds of teargas shells to disperse the agitated pickets.

A clash between police and pickets took place at Mirpur Road near New Model Degree College. Some 10 people received injuries in the melee. Two youths Asghar and Habib were injured when a bomb went off

at Bangabandhu Avenue. Youths as well as teen aged boys were seen playing cricket and soccer on wide city streets as these were deserted by all modes of vehicles, excepting a handful of rickshaws in certain areas.

The capital Dhaka remained cut off with other parts of the country as no inter-district buses plied from and to city terminals.

Railway sources said that all trains which operated before 6 am in the morning could reach Dhaka. Several trains which left Kamalapur after 6 in the morning were intercepted by pickets at different places. Communication was also hampered as the pickets blockaded roads and rail tracks at several places around the country.

The rail communication was hampered by pickets at Laksham. Maynamati in Comilla, Feni, Akhaura, Kulaura, Manglabazar, Mymensingh, Hasanpur, Joydevpur and Dhala stations by putting barricades. At Laksham, the signal system was damaged by a group of protestors in the morning, agencies reported.

During hartal hours, only a few launches left Sadarghat terminals with less passengers, while all international and domestic flights of Biman operated on schedule except one domestic flight to Saidpur.

The attendance in government offices was thin, while the private business organisations and educational institutions remained closed.

In some cases, government employees stayed in their offices Friday night.



Abdul Malek Jano lodged a police report Friday against Tenaganita claiming the group had defamed him and his men who were running the camp.

Bangladesh has called for a realistic expansion of the Security Council to include Third World countries like itself and to make the activities of the United Nations and its budget more participatory and transparent, as among measures, to reinforce and democratise the structures for international cooperation, reports BSS.

Dr A Q M Badruddoza Chowdhury, the Deputy Leader of the House, moved the proposals at the convocation of the "Special session on the inter-parliamentary council on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the creation of the United Nations" at the UN headquarters in New York on

Thursday. Speaking at the convocation Dr Chowdhury made a six-point proposal to reinforce and democratise the

The Security Council, he proposed, must be expanded realistically.

Countries committed to the security of the world specially third world countries, including countries like Bangladesh, contributing practically in security and peace-keeping, he proposed, should be represented in the Security Council.

Dr Badruddoza observed that despite having a United

Nations for the last 50 years. and despite its past successes, there still remained certain sad realities.

He said that the Bangladesh proposals aimed at further democratisation of the United Nations as well as to make it and its agencies stronger, more authoritative, credible, functional, realistic to save the planet.

Badruddoza suggested that the proposals for setting up of international criminals court and an international environment court deserved examination.

Bangladesh proposes Badruddoza said, that all United Nations agencies in regions and countries should have an advisory body, includ ing elected parliamentarians and technical experts. The UN Economic and

Social Council (ECOSOC) Bangladesh proposed, should have better representation from under developed countries - as they need all socioeconomic agenda as a priority for benefit of this planet.

Badruddoza called for support from the United Nations to the agreement between UN and the Inter Parliamentary Union (IPU) to make the IPU and hence all elected parliament of the world a direct partner with the United Nations.

#### Saddam orders seizure of Uday's property?

DUBAI, Sept 2: Iraqi Pre sident Saddam Hussein has ordered the seizure of property belonging to his oldest son, Uday, amid growing criticisms against him, the Iraqi opposition in exile said today.

Among the goods seized are a transport company and a food processing factory where employees were told not to turn up for work any more, the Iraqi National Congress (INC) said in a statement sent to AFP in

The INC added that guards had been deployed around the companies' buildings.

An independent confirmation of the report was not available.

A committee headed by Saddam's second son Qussay has been set up to carry out the confiscation of Uday's property, the statement said.
