Graf wins 18th Grand Slam

Seles stoops to Steffi

NEW YORK, Sept 10: Steffi Graf defeated Monica Seles 7-6, 0-6. 6-3 on Saturday to win the dre-

am final for the US Open women's championship and claim her 18th Grand Slam title, reports Reuter.

In a showdown that tennis fans have waited nearly 32 months to see. Graf captured her fourth US Open crown on the strength of a single service break in the third set of a taut struggle between two of tennis' greatest champi-

When Seles netted a forehand at match-point to end the one hour. 52-minute battle. Graf jumped for joy, covered her face and then raced to a courtside box where she reached in for a congratulation before returning to the net for a warm embrace with

The confrontation between the co-world-number ones promised tension, drama and emotion, and it delivered.

Seles, playing her first Grand Slam tournament since defeating Graf in the final of the 1993 Australian Open, just last month ended a 28-month absence from the circuit following a knife-attack by a deranged fan of Grafs in a match in Hamburg. Germany.

The top-seeded Graf has been battling both injuries and intense emotional strain caused by her father's continuing imprisonment in Germany on charges of tax

NEW YORK, Sept 10: Andre Agassi unloaded some of his best shots against Boris Becker after the defending champion's four-set win over the German in the US Open semifinal on Saturday, reports Reuter.

Agassi opened his postmatch news conference by firing some criticism at the loser in response to comments made by Becker after their Wimbledon semifinal match this summer.

After he beat me at Wimbledon he said some things that bothered me on a very personal level." Agassi

"It was just so many comments about players not liking me, me not hanging out in the locker room, me not practicing with the guys. I couldn't understand it," said the 25-year-old Agassi.

At the end of his threehour, seven-minute 7-6, 7-6, 4-6, 6-4 victory, Agassi exchanged only a cursory hand shake with the loser.

"It is hard for me to respect anybody who is going to beat me and say so many things that are not only wrong, but meant to hurt, Agassi said.

"I don't understand that and I don't respect it. It is real simple. I respect his tennis play. But, once a match is over, you know it ends there," snarled Agassi. A diplomatic Becker tried

to soothe the bad blood. "I personally always liked Andre. I respected him as a player. And I respected him as a person," Becker said of the world number one.

"What happened two months ago is something which very few people stil care about. I may have said a few things which aren't right, he has said maybe a few things which aren't right but we are all not perfect.

"In the heat of the moment you say some things, a couple of days later you may think about it again and you say, 'maybe I shouldn't have said that." said Becker, who added that he had not spoken to Agassi since the incident. Becker shrugged off the

feud, saying their actions on the court spoke louder than words. The bottom line is that

we are both great champions and we showed a great tennis match out there today."

De La Hoya retains WBO title

LAS VEGAS. Sept 10: It was a new Oscar De La Hoya, but the same old result, reports AP. De La Yoya, showing he

can be a boxer as well as a puncher, won his second straight battle of Los Angeles lightweights Saturday night when Genaro Hernandez quit after the sixth round with blood flowing from his broken nose.

La Hoya retained the WBO version of the lightweight title when Hernandez turned to referee Richard Steele after the bell sounded to end the sixth round and motioned he would go on no further.

"He broke my nose. Hernandez said. "I messed up. It's stupid to stay in there and make it worse. There's always tomorrow.

De La Hoya seemed determined from the opening bell to play the role of skillful boxer rather than the hard punching style that earned him 16 knockouts in his 18

Agassi's sweet retaliation! War of world's top two

NEW YORK, Sept 10: Defending champion Andre Agassi held off a thrilling comeback by Boris Be-

cker on Saturday to reach the final of the US Open where he will meet Pete Sampras in the eagerly-anticipated showdown of the top two players in the world, reports Reuter. The top-ranked Agassi finally ended the pitched bat-

tle more than three hours after it began by breaking Becker with consecutive ferocious service return winners to clinch a 7-6, 7-6, 4-6. 6-4 semifinal victory. A beaming Agassi then pointed his racket at the

television camera and issued a challenge: "Pete, if you're watching, I'm coming. 'I'm happy to be in the final on Sunday and Pete being there

makes it all the more special." said Agassi who has not lost a



match since falling to Becker in the Wimbledon semifinals, a

remarkable 26-match winning streak.

Second seed Sampras

opened the super Saturday programme by launching 27 aces and smacking 70 winners to score a 7-5, 4-6, 6-4. 7-5 victory over 14th-seeded fellow-American Jim Courier Sampras, whose most

lethal weapon has accounted for 118 aces in six victories, will be going for his third US Open title today and said he was hoping it would come against

"When you win the US Open, you want to beat the best player in the world," said Sampras, who lost the Australian Open final to Agassi but rebounded by winning his third consecutive

Wimbledon crown in July. Agassi got himself out of trouble early, facing break points in his first three service games and saving them

"I had a few chances early on somehow wasn't able to pull it off to break him," lamented the three-time Wimbledon champion.

They battled dead even after that as the first two sets went to tie-breaks without either player dropping serve.

But Agassi came up big in both, taking the first 7-4 and dominating the second 7-2 with the help of two of Becker's 11 double faults.

"To lose two sets in a tiebreaker without losing your serve once is very hard to swallow," said the fourthseeded German star, who belted 25 aces for the match.

Clearly frustrated and further agitated by a few questionable line calls, Becker seemed ready to go down in straight sets when Agassi scored the first break of the match for 3-1 and held for 4-

But with the top seed just eight points from the final, Becker started booming in serves and volleying brilliantly.

With the pro-Agassi crowd suddenly chanting "Boris, Boris" in hopes of extending the drama, he ran off five games in a row to take the third set. "He deserved to win third

set with the way he raised his level of play," said Agassi, who looked a bit shellshocked before bearing down to hold serve to start the fourth set. "It's sort of came back

from the dead again like in

Wimbledon," said Becker,

who rallied from a set and

two breaks down to beat

Agassi in July. The fourth set was filled with wondrous winners on both sides.

But with the combatants deadlocked 4-4. Agassi raised his game yet again, reeling off eight straight points and ending the battle with a blazing forehand return down

"He just played typical Andre Agassi shots to finish off the match," said 1989 Open winner Becker, "three winners and I didn't even see

the ball. Said the victorious American: "It was a great match all around, there is no other way of looking at it. It

was great tennis." Sampras and Courier also gave the fans their money's worth in a match in which all four sets turned on the conversion of a single break

In the end, it was Sampras' uncanny ability to come up with a huge serve or winning volley each time he faced a break point that carried the day.

In all, he saved eight of nine break points he faced. including running off five winners in a row after facing triple break point early in the



third set

"I think that was a huge

turning point of the match." said Sampras, who finished his match some six hours before Agassi's victory following the women's final won by Steffi Graf 7-6, 0-6, 6-3 over Monica Seles. And now, the match ev-

Asked again about the prospects, Graf replied: "I think very slight. The thing is I have not talked a lot with my lawyers or his lawyers in the last few weeks, so I think am going to have a lot of catching up on that issue." Asked one more time about getting a chance to talk

to her father about everything, Graf muttered: "I don't think so, doesn't seem like it," and left in the middle of the next question, sobbing. Graf has beaten Seles six of 10 times they had played, but had not faced the player

who once replaced her as number one since losing to her in the final of the 1993 Australian Open. Seles, making an amazing return after overcoming the physical and emotional af-

fects of being stabbed in Hamburg, had shown her old fire and power in winning every match in straight sets since reappearing in Toronto last month. The two champions squared off for the fantasy fi-

nal and fought a fascinating duel, stretching each other to their limits in a gruelling contest that saw Graf win 96 points in all to 95 for Seles. After the match there was

an emotional hug with her mother, Heidi, and a long embrace at the net with Seles.
