

cultural function titled 'Rabindranather Barshar Gan O Aalap Alochona' was organised at the Isfendiar Zahed Hassan auditorium of Viswa Shahitya Kendro on August 29 evening. Participants in the show were: Mustafa Nurul Kalim Sharafi. Mohammed Anisur Rahman. Maleka Azim Khan, Tajin Chowhdury, Mohiduzzaman Chowdhury and Mansura Begum. Production responsibilities were carried out by

Anisur Rahman. "We adore Tagore songs. not only for their music, but also for the mirth of epic qualities," said Rahman at the outset, adding: "There's a philosophy of life in these."

Discussing briefly on inspirational aspects of Tagore's rainy season songs, Mustafa Nurul Islam said : "There's no exact explanation, or definition of songs. It is a medium that can easily communicate; it doesn't need somebody else to make you understand."

The function empahsised in exploring the intrinsic val-

ues of Tagore's season-based songs. The discussants explored avenues finding out reasons behind the Nobel poet's composition of rainyseason songs.

Islam's elaboration was followed by a chorus \_ Of Ott Bhairab Harashe - in appraisal of the rainy season. The singles of Kalim Sharafi, Monsura Begum, Tajin Chowdhury, Maleka Begum, Mohiduzzaman Chowdhury and Anisur Rahman enchanted the listeners who left the Kendro, warm hearted.

The nomination, sponsored by former Soviet Union leader Mikhail Gorbachev and German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, recognises the community's commitment to the peaceful resolution of worldwide conflicts.

Last January, Sant'Egidio brought to the convent the main Algerian opposition parties - including the outlawed Islamic Front of Salvation (FIS) - to approve the socalled Rome Platform, a proposal to end the violence that has gripped the North

African country since 1992. Neither the Algerian government nor the armed Islamic groups participated in the talks, but former Algerian president Ben Bella described dialogue as the only way to stop the civil war. Anwar N. Haddam, a FIS spokesman, said the meeting was historic. The Rome platform is one of the few peace

initiatives for Algeria. Whenever Sant'Egidio makes the front page of the international press the same Questions arise. Is the Vatican behind it? Is the Italian government interfering in other countries' internal affairs? Who are the pow-

erful friends of Sant'Egidio? Mario Marazziti, one of the community's leaders, smiles as he answers: "We are a voluntary charitable organisation committed from the outset to fight for justice and against any form of poverty. At an international level, it's ust the same kind of work

continuing." Now in his forties, Marazziti was a young student when he joined the community, founded by a group of students who dedicated themselves to spread the gospel and serve the poor.

"We acted in the spirit of the recently-concluded Council Vatican II that provoked a wave of reform and innovation through the Church," he recalls. "We founded popular schools for the children of poor families, we visited the elderly, the Gipsies, the mentally ill."

The convent remains the heart of the community of 15,000. Half of them live in Rome and meet for social service, worship and prayer. Another 5.000 live in other Italian cities and the rest in America.

"Sant'Egidio's members Pope. have all different sorts of social and cultural back grounds, but they all spend some of their time with the poor, serving in our soup kitchen, helping AIDS patients, or teaching Italian to newly arrived immigrant,"

says Marazziti. The soup kitchen, founded six years ago, serves 'hot meals four nights a week to almost 2,000 people, most

of them Eastern Europeans. The jump to international involvement was not intentional, says Marazziti, denying that former students wanted to play amateur peace brokers. He says their involvement is a natural extension of what he calls Sant'Egidio's mission - to work against social injustice.

Sant'Egidio's Roman location — an international crossroads and the seat of the Pope, with whom they have good relations - is advantageous. Bishops from around the world, heads of states

Sant'Egidio frequently organises meetings of religious leaders in Rome and an annual all-religion prayer service for peace, part of its ongoing search for global understanding.
