Accord to ban export of toxic waste

GENEVA, Sept 22: Some 100 nations today agreed to ban the export of toxic waste from industrialised to developing nations by January 1, 1998, reports AFP.

The agreement, announced by delegates, followed a week of divisive talks.

Delegates of several developing nations, including India, Brazil, Malaysia and several Eastern European states, were opposed to the deadline, along with a number of industrialised countries, including the United States, Australia and South Korea.

PARIS, Sept 22: France clear testing in the South will conduct a second, more powerful nuclear test in the South Pacific sometime within the next 10 days, a trophe. French official said today.

This test should be 'more powerful' than the first conducted on September 5 and is designed to test submarine launched nuclear warheads. Baumel said.
