(The Professor does)

That boxing has been described both a "the noble art of self-defence" as well as a "show business with blood." Over the gears several boxers have succumbed to injuries sustained in the arena or due to illnesses attributed to long hours of sparring.

In olden times boxing was a form of combative sport. From Mesopotamia to Rome. and from Crete to the Pacific. there is evidence of fighting purely for diversion. Early fighters apparently liked to cover their fists with all manner of lethal attachment - shark's teeth, metal studs and spikes. Reminds you of the modern Bangladeshi onthe-street "rangbaaz". Actually, our people are very respectful to history.

#### Japan finish atop in Asian karate

MANILA, Sept 24: Japan finished with nine gold medals in the second Asian Karate championships, but found their dominance has slipped since the first Asian meet in their native martial art, reports AP.

The Japanese, with four world champions in their ranks, also captured two silver and five bronze medals in the meet that ended Saturday, well ahead of the 7 four golds, three silvers and one bronze won by Iran.

But the Japanese had taken all but one of the 18 golds in the first championships of the Asian Union of Karatedo Organizations, in Taipei in 1993.



Appearing as favourites among the two most popular outfits in the country and with the hereto to unprece-



dented treble just a win away for Mohammedans following their triumph in the DMFA and Federation Cups, they were dumbfounded by their sloppy defense.

In the high-voltage drama, marked also by two sending offs in the second half, Mohammedans misery was compounded when their Nigerian recruit Bode Baba got the marching order for a cynical foul against Abahani's captain Monem Munna ten minutes after the tall striker had pulled one goal back for his

This not only allowed Abahani, who had earlier painfully watched their nimble winger Jahangir sent off for kicking the Mohammedans custodian Ponir, to balance the strength but also rejuvenated them to maintain the slender lead till the final whistle.

The win enables Abahani to assume the top slot alone with 42 points at the end of their penultimate league engagements. The defeat in many ways almost shatters Mohammedans' hopes of winning the league title. They remain stuck to their previous collection of 39 points with one match to go against relegation-bound Rahmatganj Muslim Friends Society.

On the other hand holders Abahani, who are to meet Muktijoddha in the last league engagement, need only a draw to retain the league title, the most prestigious crown in the domestic football circuit. This was Abahani's 13th

league win against Mohammedans' 12. The others ended in draws. Red card Jahangir (Aba-

### China rule Asian track



24: China won four of the finalday's nine events Sunday. including three

relays, and finished the Asian track and field championships with 20 gold medals in 41 events, reports AP.

Qatar and Japan each won two golds Sunday, with Japanese finishing 1-2 in the battle for top all-around male athlete. Hitoshi Maruono won the decathlon with 7,333 points, teammate Takashi Kiyokawa was second with 6,706 and Ibrahim Nasser of the United Arab Emirates took the bronze with 6,186.

Kazakhstan's Svetlan Zalevskaya won the women's high jump.

Qatar finished second in the medal standings with five golds, two silvers and four bronzes, followed by Japan with 3-7-5 and Kazakhstan with 3-4-4.

Chinese quartets won the men's and women's 4x100metre relays and the women's 4x400, while China's Zeng Lizht won the triple

In the men's 4x100, the Chinese beat Thailand 39.49 seconds to 39,85. In the women's Kazakhstan took the silver, trailing the Chinese 44.27 to 44.69. India was the runner-up in the women's 4x400, trailing 3:32.73 to 3:33.43.

Qatar's Muhammad Sulaiman won the men's 1,500 metres in 3:41.33, followed by China's Song Mingyou in 3:42.79, and the Qataris won the men's 4x400 in 3:05.78. Japan took the silver in 3:06.16.

Japan's Kumiko Okamoto outran two Chinese in the women's 1,500, winning in 4:18.69. For China, Zhang Jian was second in 4:19.87 and Wang Qingfen third, in 4:21.99.

In the men's triple jump, Zeng leaped 16.78 metres (55 feet, 3/4 inch), ahead of two jumpers from Azerbaijan. Aleksey Fatianov was second with 16.68 (54-8 3/4) and

Vasif Asadov third with 16.53  $(54-2 \ 3/4).$ 

Kazakhstan's Zalevskaya and Japan's Miki Imai both cleared 1.89 metres (6-2 1/4) in the women's high jump, but Zalevskaya took the gold because of fewer misses. More than 700 officials

and athletes from 37 countries participated in the fiveday championships. The next Asian Athletic



Mohammedans Sporting Club, the only team so far remained silent about the refereeing in the ongoing Premier football league, finally roared with one voice when they accused the Malaysian referee of dubious decisions.

In a press release issued late last night the club officials said, "It was the biased refereeing that cost us the match". It further added that the match which was scheduled for a 5.30 pm kick-off surprisingly delayed for fifteen minutes for reasons best known to the organisers, the Dhaka Metropolis Football Association (DMFA). Besides, they claimed they were deprived of at least three penalties and also added that their Nigerian recruit Bode Baba was shown the red card in a bid to balance the previous marching order against Jahangir of Abahani.

The press release also was not read, it Mohammedans but Abahani, who got undue favour from the men in black throughout the league.

But surprisingly they kept on censuring the local referees as well as the foreign

Not only that, Abahani also made an heinous propaganda against Mohammedans and the DMFA that was widely publicised in leading dailies vesterday, they blamed. This sort of statement is a sheer violation of the league byelaws, it pointed out.

The club will demand the resignation of the DMFA if they fail to take necessary actions against the culprits, they vowed.

All-Africa Games

#### Veni, vidi, vici for SA

HARARE, Sept 24: The sixth All-Africa Games ended on Saturday after 10 days peppered with drug scandals, temper tantrums, organisational mix-ups and a smattering of top class sport, reports Reuter.

South Africa, taking part for the first time, ended at the top of the medal table with 62 golds - nearly half of them won in swimming pipping Egypt who garnered 60 including the prized soccer crown.

Four athletes failed doping tests during the Games -South African long jumper Karen Botha, Nigerian sprinter Paul Egonye, Egyptian wrestler Mohy Abdel Hareth and Ghanaian long jumper Andrew Owusu.

The quality of competition was hit by the absence of most of the continents top athletes although Nigeria sent a full-strength sprint squad and swept the board in the shorter track events.

The West Africans finished third in the medal log with a total of 37 golds.

Mozambique's world beating 800-metre athlete Maria Mutola and South African pole vaulter Okert Brits took part but had no competition to push them to their best ef-

Many visiting teams complained of poor organisation. Some events were cancelled at the last minute and others were downgraded to exhibition status because expected participants did not pitch up.
