Opposition plans to announce 'tough' programmes today

The three major opposition parties plan to announce a series of 'tough' grammes today to force the government to concede to their demands, a top opposition leader said yesterday.

JAMADI-UL-AWAL 2, 1416 HIJRI

"This time we shall throw such programmes that the government would be compelled to concede to the Opposition demands," Awami League leader Tofael Ahmed told The Daily Star last night. He, however, declined to elaborate.

The programmes will be announced at the grand rallies of the three parties -Awami League, Jatiya Party and Jamaat-e-Islami — in the city this afternoon.

Sources said, the three parties would sit this morning at the residence of AL leader Abdus Samad Azad to finalise their identical programmes. The parties may call for allout agitation programmes including non-stop hartal, rail-road barricades, gherao of the Secretariat and residences of ministers, the sources added.

The three parties, after a series of action programmes over months, called threeday hartal from September 16 to 22 to press home their demands for dissolution of Parliament and holding of elections under a neutral caretaker government.
