They each actually get one hour's time on air, which is far better than the measly 30 minutes indifferently assigned to Northern Exposure. God forbid, they consider dubbing that too! The half hour thing is bad enough. but to be deprived of the NE characters interesting vocabulary would be absolutely unbearable. It's a relief we get to see nypd blue on Star Plus, now that's a channel attentive to people's feelings.

sion of Maugham, Forster or even Agatha Christie can never be compared to their authentic works. Similarly, the Bangla adaptation of any non-Bangla programme will undoubtedly ruin the originality of the dialogues and replace the sense of humour, the slangs with inappropriate, peculiar sounding

If the shows were in any other language i.e. French, German, Arabic or Chinese, the proposal to dub them would be certainly needed and appreciated. In this case, however, it was totally unnecessary.

Throwing disparagement at BTV wasn't my intention. This write-up merely tried to reflect the feelings of the outraged viewers Many believe that it's the final blow among all the infuriating 'innovations' our national channel has so far introduced. One would imagine that in this age of competition. BTV will be more tentative about the changes. After all, we still have Star Plus, but pretty soon BTV will only be left with fewer and fewer audience.


Dhaka seeks ITU assistance

Bangladesh has sought International Telecommunication Union's (ITU) assistance in devising a suitable model of a regulatory body for the country's telecommunication sector, reports UNB.

Post and Telecommunications Minister Tariqui Islam sought ITU help when he met ITU Secretary General Dr Pekka Targanne at the latter's office in Geneva on Saturday.

Tariqul is leading Bangladesh delegation to the Telecom-95 conference and exhibition in the Swiss city. He also sought ITU assistance in development of human resources in this sector.

Issues like distribution of licences to the private sector in rural telecommunications cellular communications and paging were also discussed.

Moderate rain likely

Many places of Chittagong, Khulna, Barisal and a few places of Dhaka, Rajshahi and Sylhet divisions may experience moderate rain or thundershower with temporary gusty wind in the next 12 hours till 6 pm today, reports

Met office forecast moderately heavy falls at places over Chittagong, Khulna and Barisal divisions during the period. No remarkable change in day temperature is expected over the country.

Meantime, Khepupara experienced the highest 56 mm rain yesterday. Mymensingh had 46 mm rain, Bogra, 41, Khulna 36. Dhaka and Jessore 33 each, Chittagong 23. Barisal 18, Faridpur 10 and Tangail 8 mm shower during the period.

Country's highest temperature 33 degree Celsius was recorded at Cox's Bazar and the lowest 22.2 degrees at Srimangal.
