Esperance clinch Afro-Asia Cup

TUNIS, Oct 15: Tunisian Club Esperance won the Afro-Asian Cup here on Saturday, after cruising to an easy 3-0 victory over Thai Farmers Bank in the second leg of the final, reports AFP.

Farmers Bank, the defending champions who had only managed a 1-1 draw in Thailand, were under pressure right from the start, and never created any serious goal scoring opportunities.

Loughran defends WBO crown

No upsets in eighth round

Norm-hopeful Rahul Shetty of India took the solo lead in the Beximco 13-round 12th QM Hossain International Masters' chess tournament after the completion of the eighth round's play at the National Sports Council (NSC) conference room yesterday.

Shetty, who has been leading the meet since the first round, increased his tally to 6.5 points with an emphatic 28-move victory over Ziaul Qader Tuhin after blasting through the latter's Petrov Defence.

The win pulled Shetty half a point ahead of compatriot R B Ramesh, his co-inhabitant at the top slot for the last three rounds. Ramesh now has 6 points to his credit following an all-Indian battle that ended in a draw. His match with International Master (IM) Parna Sharma Mitrakanth lasted for 23 moves with the latter failing to penetrate Ramesh's French Defence.

Mitrakanth drops back a place to third where he joins Bangladeshi IM Ziaur Rahman and Pakistani IM Mahmud Lodhi. All three have collected five-and-a-half points each.

Zia overcame another IM from Pakistan, Shahzad Mirza. The masterly local player's Queens Gambit Decline game was more than the bespectacled veteran could handle as he surrendered after a paltry 23 moves.

Lodhi, two times former champion and a familiar figure in the local chess scene, defeated Saifuddin Lavlu in 50 moves.

Sudhakar Babu, who completes the Indian quartet in the competition, could only manage a draw with Abdul-lah-al-Rakib in dropping back from third to fourth position. Rakib, who has performed lowly throughout the meet, played creditably to salvage a 56-move draw.

In the two all-local engagements of the day, Enamul Hossain Rajib defeated Khorshed Alam in 46 moves while two no-hopers, Khondokar Kayes Hassan and Ali Amjad Mintu, agreed to a draw.

Pfister drops 9, keeps 30

German football coach of the Bangladesh national team Otto Pfister has axed nine booters from the primary selection of 39 players for the South Asian Federation (SAF) Games, scheduled to begin in the Indian city of Madras on December 22.

Among the booters, notable omissions are Brothers Union's diminutive midfielder Bakhtiar, striker Jamal of Abahani Krira Chakra and Agrani Bank's Mossarraf Hossain Tutu, a leading scorer of the recently concluded Premier Division football league.

Besides, two Arambagh midfielders Tushar and Shoaib, defender Ibrahim and Asif Yousuf of Youngmens Club Fakirerpool, Bipal Marmar of Rahmatganj and East End's nimble forward Saurav Majumder also failed to impress Otto Pfister during the just-concluded four-day training session at the Mirpur Sports Village.

But unheralded booters, such as Kazi Nazrul Islam, the Farashganj right back, and Azimuddin of Rahmatganj were surprise inclusions in the elusive list of 30.

Nine Muktiyoddha booters dominate the list, followed by Mohammedan Sporting Club and Abahani Krira Chakra with eight and seven respectively.

Three Fakirerpool youngsters and one each from Arambagh, Farashganj and Rahmatganj Muslim Friends Society occupy the remaining slots.

Otto Pfister, who succeeded Korean coach Mann Young Kang after the Bristol SAARC Gold Cup in Sri Lanka earlier this year, will pick 18 players for the four-nation meet to be held in Myanmar in the last week of this month.

Apart from the Myanmar tourney the illustrious German coach will undertake a Malaysia tour with 25 booters in November before making the final selection of the success-lorn country for the regional extravaganza.

The selected 30 players are — Monem Munna, Sohel Reza, Saheed Hossain Swapan, Jahangir, Hasan-al-Mamun, Dulal Hossain Dhanu and Farhad of Abahani Krira Chakra; Alfaz Ahmed, Ponir, Jewel Rana, Arman, Shahidul Ahmed Ranjan, Nurul Huq Manik, Monwar Hossain Munna and Ruhul Amin of Mohammedan Sporting Club; Imtiaz Ahmed Naqib, Rakib Hossain, Arif Hossain Moon, Arifur Rahman Pannu, Mamun Joarder, Mizan, King Shuk Chakma, Masud Rana and Barun Bikash Dewan of Muktiyoddha Sangsad Krira Chakra; Maksudul Amin Rana, Sohel-al-Masum and Askar Khan Babu of Youngmens Club Fakirerpool, Jahangir (Arambagh), Nazrul (Farashganj) and Azim (Rahmatganj).

Bayern round the bend

BONN, Oct 15: World Cup villain Stefan Effenberg scored a spectacular goal on his old hunting ground to hand German league leaders Bayern Munich their first home defeat of the season on Saturday, reports Reuter.

Former Bayern star Effenberg, who was sent home from last year's World Cup after making an obscene gesture at the crowd during a game, struck a superb long-range shot in the 20th minute as Borussia Moenchengladbach clinched an historic 2-1 victory.

An own goal from Bayern's Austrian international Andreas Herzog in the 81st minute helped the visitors seal their first Bundesliga triumph in Munich after 30 years of trying.

Bayern, who scored a consolation goal in the last minute through French striker Jean-Pierre Papin, saw their lead in the Bundesliga cut to three points after second-placed Borussia Dortmund, the champions, drew 2-2 at Werder Bremen.

After starting the season with seven consecutive wins, Bayern have lost their last two games.

Saturday's performance provided poor preparation for their visit to Scotland's Raith Rovers in the UEFA Cup on Tuesday.

Moenchengladbach and Bayern have traditionally been fierce rivals, especially when they shared eight championships between 1970 and 1977.

Although Moenchengladbach ceased to be a major power in German football in the 1980s and 1990s, their failure to win at Bayern was still a surprising statistic to many followers of the Bundesliga.

The historic significance of Saturday's result was not lost on their coach Bernd Krauss.

The six group champions will qualify for the next phase (robin league) which will again be divided into two groups. The fixture of the tournament is likely to be finalised within the next few days.

WI come back in style

SHARJAH, Oct 15: West Indies upset the form book in the Champions' Trophy here today with an emphatic four-wicket victory over favourites Pakistan in a crunch encounter, reports AFP.

Winless so far in the three-nation tournament, the West Indians stayed afloat with a do-or-die effort against the strangely subdued world champions.

The West Indies restricted Pakistan to 194 for nine in the stipulated 50 overs, then raced to victory with 10.5 overs to spare at the Sharjah Cricket ground.

Pakistan suffered a double blow as star batsman Saeed Anwar was sent home today after an attack of typhoid. He will be replaced by Zahid Fazal.

Today's defeat still kept Pakistan on top of the league table with two wins and a match in hand against Sri Lanka on Tuesday.

The West Indies and Sri Lanka, with one win each, clash in the next match tomorrow. The top two teams will advance to the final scheduled for Friday.

Richie Richardson's decision to field first appeared to backfire as Pakistan, lifted by opener Salim Elahi's top-score of 66, moved to 139 for one by the 35th over.

But they ran themselves into trouble, losing their next eight wickets for the addition of only 42 runs to slip to 181 for nine.

Inzamamul Haq's 34 was the next highest score as four batsmen ran themselves out attempting risky singles, three in succession in the space of two runs.

The West Indian bowlers undid the good work of their colleagues in the field by sending down 17 wides, 10 of them by fast bowler Ian Bishop.

Pakistan sorely missed all-rounder Aamir Sohail, who opted out of the match because of a sore shoulder, as the West Indians made light of a victory target of less than four runs an over.

Stuart Williams and Sherwin Campbell provided a rousing start, adding 44 for the first wicket by the sixth over.

Campbell fell for 20, but Williams (57) and Brian Lara (52) carried the West Indies to a healthy 109 for one in the 19th over.

Lara, who survived a stumping chance before he had scored, struck five fours and two sixes in a 58-ball innings which ended when he holed out against leg-spinner

Inzamamul Haq even though he has not fully recovered from a strained thigh muscle," he said.

"But this is no excuse. The West Indies played better and deserved to win. Hopefully we will pick up again for Tuesday's match against Sri Lanka."

France in semis

BEIJING, Oct 15: France reached the semifinals of the biennial bridge World Championships today after a nail-biting close-win over hosts China, reports Reuter.

At the end of the 96-board quarterfinals of the Bermuda Bowl, USA 2 managed to pull easily ahead of Indonesia after a tough battle in earlier sets. Sweden won comfortably against Netherlands and Canada easily defeated South Africa.

In the Venica Cup, all four favourites ended with comfortable margins of victory against their opponents.

USA 1 started the day after 64 boards, just behind their USA 2 compatriots, but pulled ahead while Germany at the point lost most of its lead against Japan but concluded with a strong win.
