Deadliest phase of battle soon

Lankan troops a km away from Jaffna

COLOMBO, Nov 1: Sri Lankan security forces today braced for the deadliest phase in a battle to capture the rebel-held town of Jaffna as a humanitarian crisis in volving tens of thousands of war refugees unfolded, reports AFP.

Some 7,000 government troops made slow progress and advanced less than a kilometer towards Jaffna, the final bastion of the separatist Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), the military

President Chandrika Kumaratunga told state run ra dio today that the current offensive was the biggest military drive aimed at capturing Jaffna and warned that there could be rebel reprisal attacks in the capital.

"The LTTE attacks in Colombo will also be in proportion to the intensity of the offensive in Jaffna," Kumaratunga said adding that police have arrested "two dozen LTTE hit squads" here making it more difficult for the rebels.

Two killed in road accident
