# **Education system** to be recast'

The education system in the country will be recast giving more emphasis on vocational training to ensure gainful employment for youths and to improve the overall standard

This was stated by Er shadul Haq, Secretary, Ministry of Education while talking to journalists during a demonstration of the computer system for checking answer scripts of examinees at the computer centre of the Dhaka Education Board at Dhanmondi in the city yes-

befending the newly introduced system he said, it ensures impartiality in results as the code given in the cover sheet of the answer script cannot be manipulated. "But if the computer is provided with incorrect information it cannot be helped."

Commenting on a case of anomaly in which some students scored 38 marks each in one subject he said, "It was the fault of 4 moderators who prepared the answer scripts of that particular subject".

By Staff Correspondent "Actions have been taken against them," he said

"These answer scripts will be re-scrutinised", he assured. The education secretary said, plans are underway to integrate class 12 in high schools and popularise vocational training.

Measures are being taken so that all the education boards in the country have same question papers. To ensure transparency in examinations, only the educational institutions in thana headquarters will be made centres for board examinations and senior teachers will be made examiners, he added.

Institutions having large number of students like the Eden College, BM College, Karmichal College and Victoria College may be given the 'degree awarding status in near future to increase man agement efficiency', he said.

## Tk 470cr foreign portfolio investment in 2 yrs

CHITTAGONG, Nov 4: Total market capitalisation has increased to Taka 5,700 crore from Taka 1200 crore in last five years.

This was disclosed by Sultan-uz-Zaman Khan, Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, today while addressing the inaugural function of Chittagong Stock Exchange at Hotel Agrabad.

He pointed out that the number of listed securities has now reached 198 from 138 in 1990.

The SEC Chairman said "our capital market has experienced an unprecedented growth during the past several years". He mentioned that the trading volume increased 51 times and the share price index also grew three times to 903 from 296 in the last five years.

He also said that in the past two years Taka 670 crore worth of foreign portfolio funds poured into the country and the companies raised Taka 470 crore through primary issue of securities.

From Page 1 lion US dollars worth of agrochemicals used in 1988. rice was the single-most important crop for pesticides.

Speaking on health hazards, Dr Ahmed said prolonged exposure to pesticides could cause cardiopulmonary disorders, neurological and hematological symptoms and skin diseases. Any of these symptoms could lower crop productivity due to farmers' absence from work.

Referring to the findings of Bangladesh Rice Research Institute (BRRI) on the use of chemical fertiliser, Dr Ahmed said use of urea fertiliser has increased to 99.3 kg per acre in 1991 from 64.9 kg in 1987 in Kishor ganj villages.

The use of TSP rose from 30.5 kg per acre to 41.8 kg, MP from 21 kg to 36 kg, Zinc 11.8 kg to 39.2 kg over the same period in the same villages. Dr Ahmed said and informed that the production came down to 1665 kg per acre in 1991 from 1991.3 kg in 1987.
