Malik, who was cleared of the bribery charges last month by an internal inquiry in Pakistan, fell cheaply when he was stumped for 16 in Pakistan's tour match against South Australia.

His departure left Pakistan struggling at 79 for four on the fourth and final day at the Adelaide Oval.

But an unbeaten century by Basit Ali steered the tourists to a draw in their last match before the first Test against Australia, which starts in Brisbane on Thursday.

Chasing a victory target of 366 in three sessions, the tourists were 298 for five at the close.

Basit Ali, who scored 101 not out, shared a crucial century partnership for the fifth wicket with Inzamamul-Haq, who was eventually trapped lbw by South Australia fast bowler Mark Harrity for 96. May, who has threatened






