

Blasts rock Pabna Mental Hospital

PABNA, Nov 15: The Mental Hospital at Hemayetpur, eight kms off the town, was rocked with bomb explosion Monday night, reports UNB.

Some unidentified people hurled at least 40 handbombs at the hospital at about 11 pm, damaging several doors and window-panes of the 500-bed hospital, officials said. Some panic-stricken patients received minor injuries while running helter skelter for safety.

Superintendent of the hospital Shah Mir Chowdhury told the news agency that the incident might have occurred for inviting tender for the second time for supply of medicine and equipment worth Tk two crore.

The first tender was cancelled on October 10. Authorities will receive tender a fresh on Thursday.

Old man murdered

From Staff Correspondent SYLHET, Nov 15: An old man was killed in broad daylight at village Staishwar under Beanibazar thana recently.

The victim, Abdul Mannan, 60, had an exchange of hot words with his cousin brother, Abdus Salam, regarding a long standing dispute over sending some people abroad. At one stage Abdus Salam hit the victim with a spade. Mannan succumbed to his injuries while being rushed to the hospital.

A case has been lodged with the Beanibazar police, accusing Abdus Salam. No arrest has yet been reported.

Lack of bullocks hampering cultivation in Netrokona

NETROKONA, Nov 15: Cultivation in all 10 thanas of the district has been hampered due to acute shortage of bullocks, reports UNB.

Local sources said, 60 to 70 per cent farmers have no bullocks to till their land. As a result, vast tract of land remained uncultivated causing huge loss to the farmers.

According to Livestock Department, the shortage of bullock has been prevailing in the district due to indiscriminate slaughtering, increased cattle lifting and its large scale death due to outbreak of various diseases.

Rampant lifting of cattle-head by an organised gang has aggravated the crisis of bullocks. These gangs sometimes slaughter the animals or dispatch them to other district to earn money if the owners of the cows fail to give their demanded ransom, the farmers alleged.

The recent flood and natural calamities have also caused to decrease the number as fodder scarcity and different diseases in epidemic form have been prevailing in the areas.

On the other hand, the marginal farmers of the rural areas are sometimes seen ploughing the land by hiring bullocks on share basis which increases the production cost.

Besides, milch cows are used for tilling the land causing gradual reduction of milk production in the district.

Local elites urged the authorities to look into the matter and take immediate measures in this regard.

Tk 25cr allocated for bridge, road construction

From Our Correspondent JAMALPUR, Nov 15: The government has sanctioned Tk 25 crore for construction and re-construction of roads and bridges in the district during the current fiscal year.

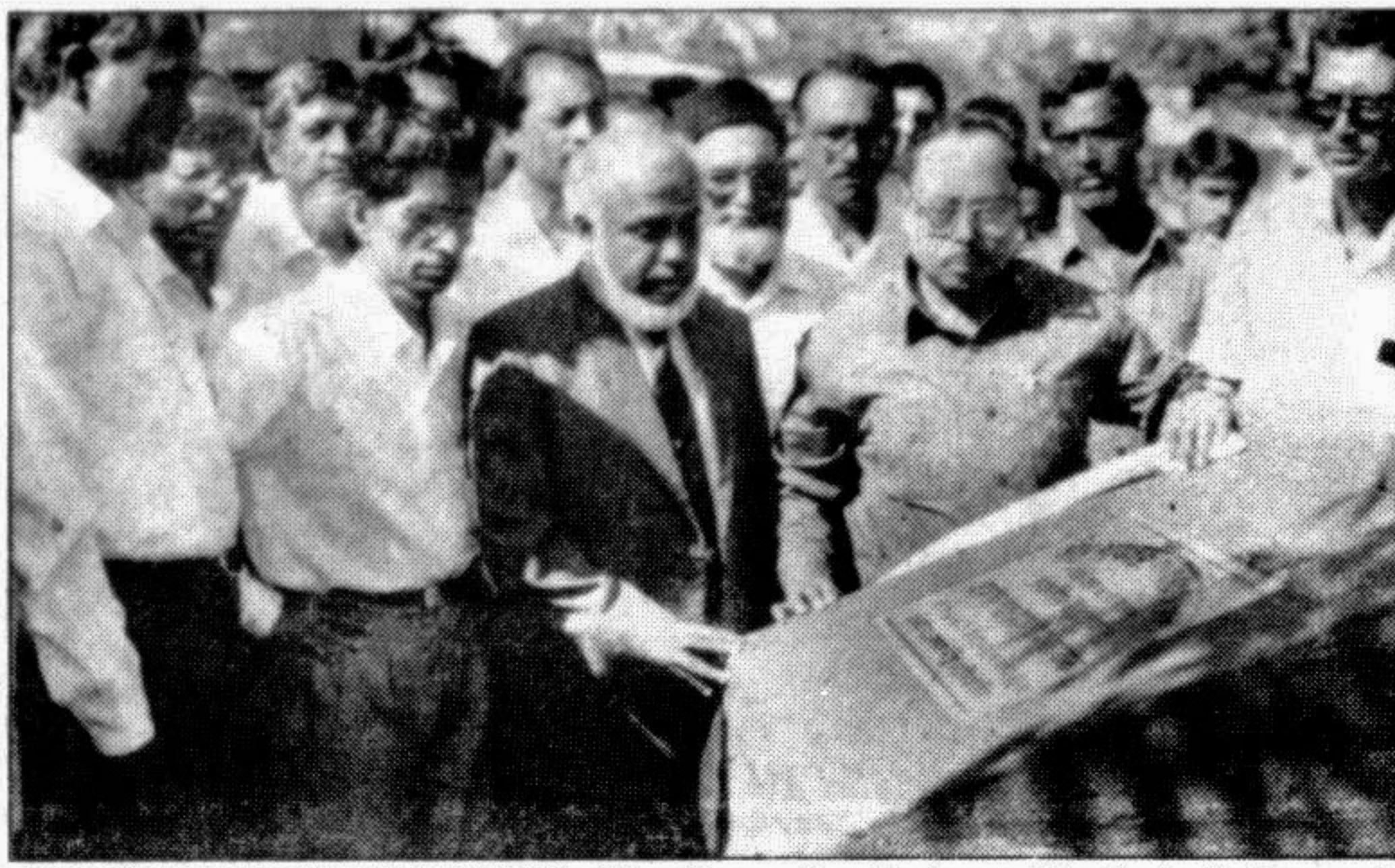
Officials informed, the development works on Jamalpur-Melandah-Dewanganj, Jamalpur-Madarganj, Jamalpur-Mymensingh, Jamalpur-Sarishabari roads have already been taken up under the programme.

Meanwhile, local Roads and Highway Department and LGED has also received Taka 12 crore for development of the Jamalpur-Madarganj, Jamalpur-Melandah, and Melandah-Madarganj road.

Carpeting works on Melandah-Madarganj via Mahmudpur road is expected to be completed by this year.

Further, the government has sanctioned Taka 512 crore for construction of a bridge on the river Jhenai. The construction work will be started this year.

A total of 93 bridges and culverts will be constructed in the district during the current year, according to official sources.

Pests attack aman paddy on 45,000 acres of land in Sherpur

SHERPUR, Nov 15: The transplanted aman paddy on 45,000 acres of land are under pest attack in five thanas of the district.

The pests locally known as *lal-poka*, *lada poka* and *pamri poka* which have attacked the paddy field in various parts of the district.

According to source, of the above mentioned post attacked areas 18,000 acres of land in sadar thanas, 8000 acres of land in Nakla thana, 7,000 acres of land in Jhenagati thana, 4000 acres of land in Nalitabari thana and rest 8000 acres of land are in Srebordi thana of the district.

The District Agriculture Office, however, confirmed that about ten to twelve thousand acres of land have been affected by the pests in these thanas.

An affected farmer, Sheik Mainuddin Nayan told The Daily Star that the affected green paddy plants have turned yellowish.

It was reported that the staff of the Agriculture Extension Department prepared the report on the basis of the information supplied by the block supervisors who did not inform the concerned department about the pest attack. The pests are continuously attacking the

new fields. The farmers informed that the spray machines supplied by the Agriculture Extension Department have been inoperative for lack of spare parts. Only ten to twelve per cent spray machines are operative.

Experienced quarters expressed that if the government and concerned department do not take any effective measures immediately, the situation may get out of control.

The farmers of the affected areas can not afford to purchase the required quantity of pesticide which are being sold in the local markets at an exorbitant price.

The District Agriculture Office, however, confirmed that about ten to twelve thousand acres of land have been affected by the pests in these thanas.

An affected farmer, Sheik Mainuddin Nayan told The Daily Star that the affected green paddy plants have turned yellowish.

The flood hit poor farmers are selling their standing paddy between Taka 120 and 130 per maund whereas the paddy is now selling between Taka 310 and Taka 320.

The peasants of these areas are not getting loan from the Krishi Bank, Sonali Bank, Agrani Bank, including other commercial banks as some dishonest bank staff harass them on various grounds, it was learnt.

A total of about 81,710 hectares of land has been brought under Aman Cultivation this season in five thanas of the district.

Besides, crops on 40,860 hectares of land under five thanas of the district has become uncertain due to erratic power supply to deep and shallow tubewells. The PDB and Palli Biddut Samity said that it is not possible to give new connections to the deep tubewells and shallow-tubewells for want of transformers, polls, cable, electric metre etc. As a result, current Aman paddy targeted production may not be achieved in the district.

It was informed that 60 per cent transformers in five

thanas of the district under PWD are totally inoperative. Some farmer alleged that if they (farmers) went to local PDB office for fresh transformer or for repair the in-operative transformer PDB staff claiming Taka 20 thousand to 25 thousand.

While others alleged that their transformer were installed in the aforesaid site but power supply has not yet been given.

Reliable sources said that a scheme was submitted to the higher authority of PDB under annual development programme for providing power connections in the new areas including irrigation projects in Sherpur district. But the scheme has not yet been approved for unknown reasons.

Urea and other fertilizer is being sold at exorbitant price in different thanas of the district despite the government's decision to reduce price during the current fiscal year, it was further alleged by the people. The government had re-fixed the price of fertilizer from July 1, this year. But in the markets fertilizer dealers and traders are selling the fertilizer between Taka 225 and Taka 230 per bag instead of new price of Tk 186.25 per bag.

The drugs including phensidyl and sedative injections are available at medicine shops. The law enforcing agencies are almost silent about the illegal sale of banned syrups.

Local people alleged that the drug addicts are engaged in various anti-social activities causing deterioration of law and order situation in the district.

Idris was beaten up by the arbitrators at the venue in his in-law's house as the verdict of the arbitration desired so, the villagers alleged.

Agonised Idris unable to shoulder the frustration ended his life by taking poison at his in-law's house, making both the feud-locked wives widow and the innocent kids orphan, police quoted the witnesses as saying.

Timber worth Tk 75,000 seized

The timber recovered were allegedly extracted illegally from the reserved forest of Shishak range in Chittagong Hill Tracts North Forest Division and being smuggled out to Rangamati by river reportedly for onward transit outside the district, sources said.

The arrested accused Abdul Haque, 60, Nurul Alam, 25, Joy Prokash Chakma, 30, and Proshanta Chakma, 26, were sent to Rangamati court.

The raids were conducted by Manirul Karim, an officer of Mainimukh Forest Check and Tolls Station in Chittagong Hill Tracts North Forest Division, the officials said.

Mathabhanga bridge needs immediate repairs

From Our Correspondent CHUANDANGA, Nov 15: The bridge on the river Mathabhanga adjacent to local Barabazar popularly known as Mathabhanga bridge needs immediate renovation.

Due to lack of maintenance and repair for several years, innumerable potholes and breaches have developed on the bridge causing great inconvenience to the people.

The quarter mile long Mathabhanga bridge was constructed at a cost of Tk 10 lakh in 1962. This bridge connects the road from Chuadanga to Meherpur and a large number of vehicles ply on it every day.

Gradually the bridge is becoming unfit for all kinds of vehicular traffic causing impediments to the development of trade and commerce of the district of Chuadanga and Meherpur.

An ideal family planning programme

SATKHIRA, Nov 15: Anannya Mahila Samity (AMS) has been extending extensive services in the field of family planning which has earned special attention of public in the district. Anannya Mahila Samity is a Non-Government Organisation (NGO) established here at Satkhira town in 1984 with the financial assistance from the Path Finder, an international organisation, working in all the three wards of Satkhira pourasava.

AMS under Anannya Family Planning Project has been providing family, Maternal and Child Health (MCH) care services in its operation areas. The project covered approximately 60,000 population of the community of whom 12,684 are registered eligible couples who are being regularly visited and supplied with different contraceptives through 15 field workers and 4 supervisors. All these field staff have basic knowledge in family planning and are undergoing training in workshop, organised by the women folk from time to time.

The field workers have gained confidence of the people specially the women folk in their respective area in motivating them about

planned parenthood to bring the Contraceptive Prevalence Rate (CPR) to 62 per cent in its operation area in October this year. The CPR was 65 per cent in 1994, 64 per cent in 1993 and 61 per cent in 1992.

The project arranged orientation for newly wed couples (NWCs) in order to have them plan their families from the very beginning of conjugal life. The staff of AMS working in Anannya Family Planning Project regularly visited the NWCs and advised them not to take baby within two years of marriage. CPR among NWCs increased to 92 per cent as of October '95 from 24 per cent of 1994, 22 per cent in 1993 and 19 per cent in December 1992.

Besides, supplying conventional methods, the workers motivate their clients to accept VSC and Clinical Contraception. The workers have so far referred 556 VSC cases to different clinics. More over, the AMS has its own arrangements for clinical service delivery where 229 copper-T insertion was performed and 1013 injectionables were provided this year. At present it has also arrangement for clinical service delivery on the spot in three wards. AMS

maintains one permanent clinic, situated in its headoffice at Katia under the pourasava.

In addition, Anannya Family Planning Project organised 64 Extended Programme of Immunization (EPI) sessions in 1993, 48 sessions in 1994 and 39 sessions in 1995 (till October). AMS maintains three mobile clinics. The date of their function is fixed at the beginning of the year. AMS has a community clinic which is situated at its main office

AMS through its field workers sells contraceptives to the clients and till 1994, a total of 344 clients collected contraceptives from field workers of AMS. As a measure to meet varying choices of methods by clients, SMC and other market brand were also made available to the clients by field workers of AMS.
