committee for the coming VII South Asian Federation (SAF) Games gave the green signal for the conduct of the Games after finalising the schedule of events, and scrutinising the infrastructure and equipment to be utilised.

The Games technical conduct committee meeting held here today made a few adjustments in the already drawn up schedule and decided to drop certain athletic events due to lack of the mandatory number of entires (three countries).

Among the major decisions was the one on advancing the start of the five-day hockey event by two days to December 19, apparently to give more time for India which leaves for the pre-Olympic qualifier at Barcelona soon after.

The meeting, the last major deliberation before the Games, dropped the women's event in swimming — besides diving - and basketball apart from the centrefire pistol shooting event due to lack of sufficient entries.

In athletics, slated to be held from December 20 to 24, six of the proposed 24 events in the men's section-20 km and 50 km walk, high jump, pole-vault, hammer throw and decathlon - and four out of the 19 scheduled women's events. Marathon, 100-metre hurdles, 10 km walk and hepathalon - have been deleted owing to lack of entries.



To know more about the present and future activities of the Bangladesh Chess Federation, The Daily Star (DS) had a brief interview with the federation general secretary Mujibur Rahman this week. The following are the extracts of the interview:

tournament where ten GMS DS: What all are the latest The QM Hossain Interna-Bangladesh in recent days? tional Masters tournament is

achievement of chess in Mujib: We have earned our biggest achievement this year

in Madras last April when our pride GM Niaz Murshed qualified for the second phase of FIDE World Championship. Only seventy players from across the world will play in the prestigious event of the world chess which will be held next April in Armenia.

DS: What are the plans you have for the future to promote the game?

Mujib: We arranged a 3month long coaches course this year which was conducted by Russian GM Mikhail Krasenkov. Around 40 top players of the country including girls took part in the course. We will send them to five divisional headquarters from next month. Beside, we are now planning for a year long training which will also be conducted by GM Krasenkon. We have asked an additional money allotment to NSC for the purpose.

DS: What are the main problems you are facing at

present? Mujib: Money is the main problem. We don't get the necessary amount from the NSC as per our requirements. We have also a problem with the space. Our office and chess-room are very small which is not sufficient to organise big events. We need an independent chess complex for our country where we can have everything permanent including a chess library.

DS: You said about money problems. Do you have any other sources to gather funds?

Mujib: Yes, we do have corporate sponsors wno provide as funds for various tournaments. Beside, the sponsors' money, who get NSC grants every year. This year NSC has granted Taka 4 lakh for our federation.

DS: Unlike other federations, you are also running the organisation on ad hoc basis. Would it be not better if you were elected? Mujib: Of course, no doubt

about that. As an ad hoc body, our hands are tied. We can not think anything independently without NSC's approval. Without democracy, the sports arena will always remain in dark as it is now.

WC woe of Swiss referee compounded

GENEVA, Nov 15: Swiss referee Kurt Roethlisberger who was sent home in disgrace from last year's World Cup finals, has been handed a three-month ban by FIFA, soccer's world governing body, for mis-using his position as a FIFA referee in a campaign to win a seat in the Swiss parliament, reports Reuter.

FIFA said in a statement that Roethlisberger used a photograph of himself in an official FIFA uniform with the logo of his political party super-imposed on his shirt beside FIFA's own emblem during an election campaign earlier this year. His suspension from in-
