Crackdown on Bengali workers

Karachi fish exporters losing Rs 40m a day

The recent crackdown on the Bengali-speaking workers in Pakistan has led to massive losses in export earnings mainly affecting the fishing industry in Karachi, accord ing to reports reaching from Pakistan.

When thousands of Bengali-speaking workers em ployed in the Karachi fishing industry stayed away from work recently during the swoop on illegal immigrants. fish stock worth millions of rupees lay rotting at the Karachi Fishing Harbour, reported the Pakistan daily. The News.

Seafood processors and exporters claim that they faced a loss of around Rs 30 to 40 million each day because of the police action against the Bengali-speaking workers, termed by the authorities as illegal immigrants, it added.

The recent drive on illegal immigrants began when the Pakistani Interior Minister. Nasirullah Khan Babar, told the National Assembly that all illegal workers will be deported from that country.

The Pakistan govern ment's crackdown focused primarily on the Bengali speaking although hordes of Afghans, Iranians and Urduspeaking Indians also illegally live in the country, besides a small number of Burmese, Sri Lankans and Arabs, the reports alleged

The crackdown landed hundreds of Bengali-speaking workers behind bars. Those arrested were released after police allegedly extorted money from them. Some of the workers claimed that they paid upto Rs 50,000 for their release.

According to a Bangladesh Foreign Ministry official. most of these Bengalees are not holding Bangladeshi passports. However, they may apply for a passport and obtain one after establishing their Bangladeshi origin, he added.

On the other hand, the Pakistan interior minister under pressure from the business quarters and members of parliament changed his tone and later issued another statement in that re-

In his statement on November 5. Babar said, ille gal workers will be given till April 1996 to apply for work

Around 10,000 Bengalispeaking workers are employed on the fishing boats and processing factories in Karachi, while around one lakh work on daily wages as labourers and contractors at the harbour, reports say.

Exporters in Karaehi were quoted in The News report saying that before the induction of the Bengali speaking workers in the business, they were exporting seafood worth Rs 114 million annually. Since 1986, when these workers were first employed exports have almost doubled to Rs 200 million annually.

Many of these Bengalispeaking workers have bonafide Pakistani ID cards and passports and thus are in fact Pakistani citizens. While there is some hostilities towards them for having snatched jobs from the locals, observers point out that they have created jobs for themselves rather than taking away the jobs.

The processing industry sources say the local fishermen are not skilled enough to maintain the quality of the catch as per international standards, they charge much more than Bengali-speaking workers and moreover, there simply aren't enough local fishermen available to handle the highly perishable catch.

The Bengali-speaking workers are predominantly employed in fishing industry carpet factories, jute mills and production, garments manufacturing and as domestic cooks and servants, the reports pointed out.

Unclaimed luggage conaining contraband medicine worth Tk 761,000 was confiscated by the airport Customs yesterday.

According to officials at the Zia International Airport, a false sticker of Thai Air was tagged with the luggage. Customs authorities, however, suspected that the luggage might have come through an Emirates flight that had a stopover in Pakistan, as the medicine were manufactured in that country.

According to the Customs officials the confiscated luggage contained 10,000 tablets of Valium 10 mg, 1400 tablets of Brimox, 11,800 tablets of Diamox and 16,650 tablets of Ribater.

Bosnia peace accord to be signed next month

WASHINGTON, Nov 22: The Bosnia peace accord. initialled by Balkan leaders in Ohio on Tuesday, will be officially signed in Paris. US special envoy Richard Holbrooks said on CNN today.

A peace conference is to be held in Paris in mid-December and is widely expected to be the venue for the formal signing of a Balkan peace accord.

A US official, however, suggested that a full-scale ceremony to sign the accord could take place in the United States and not in France as earlier planned.

Presidents of Bosnia, Serbia and Croatia initialled the detailed document of peace on Bosnia at the conference room of the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton.

The talks, initiated by the US and supported by European Union and Russia, ends the 43-month long Balkan civil war which killed more than 2.5 lakh people and made another 20 lakh home-

According to US State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns, the dramatic breakthrough came after the Americans laid down the final draft on the table regarding major territorial issues. which Serbia and Croatia agreed to sign - leaving only the Bosnian delegation reluctant to go along the pact.

The key parts of the much-sought-after deal, born under intense deadline pressure by the US are:

- Division of territory, giving the Muslim-Croat federation 51 per cent of land and

-A single federal state with one president, a bicameral legislature, a constitutional court and a single currency;

 Pullback of troops behind NATO patrolled ceasefire zones within 30 days of formal treaty signing:

- Sarajevo reunified within the Muslim-Croat federation and open to all citizens. Gorazde will be linked to Sarajevo by a secure land corridor. Brcko's status to be determined by arbitration within one year:

 No indicted war criminals can hold political or military office in new Bosnia.

The agreement — third in a series after Cutileiro Peace Plan and Vance-Owen Plan -was announced here in Washington by US President Bill Clinton.

LTTE downs air force plane with 60 aboard

COLOMBO, Nov 22: Tami Tiger guerillas today shot down a Sri Lankan air force plane with about 60 people on board, as soldiers tighte ened the noose on the rebel bastion of Jaffna by capturing a key highway, officials said, reports AFP.

The Antonov-32 plane crashed into the sea after being hit by a missile or heavy machinegun fire off the wartorn Jaffna peninsula, four days after an air force transporter was downed in the same area, the officials said.

The An-32 disappeared from the radar at 6:40 pm (1310 gmt) as it was due to land at Palaly, the main military base in the region, about an hour after it had taken off

acceptable: Suu Kyi

YANGON, Nov 22: Aung San Suu Kyi warned today that her opposition National League for Democracy (NLD) might boycott Myanmar national convention because it is "unacceptable" to most citizens, reports AFP.

She told a news conference at her lakeside home, where she was held for almost six years under house arrest until last July, that the NLD was still looking for dialogue with the ruling military junta.

"We continue to keep the door open for dialogue and discussion, but the conven tion in its present form totally unacceptable to the vast majority of the people of Myanmar," said the Nobel Peace Prize winner.

However, a fresh diplo-

matic move is now underway to begin the third phase of repatriation during this winter season, according to sources. Bangladesh high commissioner to India Shafi Sami recently visited the CHT to review the overall rehabilitation of the refugees. A total of 5.163 refugees

belonging to 1023 families had returned during the first and second phases of repatriation, according to official reports. Among them, 1841 mem-

bers of 379 families came back during the first phase of repatriation from February 15 to 22 and 3.322 members of 644 families during the second phase from July 20 to August 2, last year official reports said.

Tofael Ahmed, giving his reaction to the PM's offer of a national government, said: "It is an absurd and unrealistic idea. By broaching this idea. the PM has admitted that no election will be free and fair under her government."

Moulana Matiur Rahman Nizami termed the announcement of the schedule for by-elections as a "farce" He added: "It's a ridiculous and provocative move against the Opposition."

On the PM's offer of a national government, Nizami said. 'It can't be an alternative to a neutral caretaker government. Our demand is clear ... elections will have to be held under a non-party neutral caretaker authority."
