168 file nominations defying party  
**BNP warns of stern action**

The ruling BNP has instructed party leaders who have filed nomination papers to contest the coming parliament elections against party nominees to withdraw their candidature immediately and warned of disciplinary action for non-compliance.

The instruction from party Secretary General Abdus Salam Talukdar came against the backdrop of resentment in the rank and file of the party over nomination.

According to BNP sources, disgruntled party leaders, mostly at district level are preparing to contest the polls against party nomi-

nates in at least 168 of the 300 constituencies. At some places, the leaders and their supporters observed hartals and staged demonstrations to protest nominations by the party's high command.

Issuing the instruction through a statement, the BNP Secretary General warned that disciplinary action would be taken against the violators as per the constitution of the party.

Salam Talukdar hoped that all leaders and workers of his party would abide by the instruction in the greater interest of the organisation.

He also requested the

presidents and general sec-

retaries of the party's district, thana and municipal committees to take necessary steps so that the order was carried out.

A BNP source said that the "rebel" leaders might be expelled from the party if they did not withdraw their candidature by January 23, the last day for withdrawal of nomination papers.

Despite the warning for disciplinary action by the party, the source added, many of the candidates, who are optimistic of winning the polls, being held without the participation of the major opposition parties, might not withdraw their candidature.

PM's reception to SAF Games gold winners

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia yesterday accorded a reception and gave away monetary incentives to the 7th SAF Games gold-winner sportsmen of the country, reports UNB.

At a function in the International Conference Centre (ICC), Begum Zia hailed the seven gold medalists for their success in the regional games and gave them cash award of Taka one lakh each.

Three coaches of the gold-winning disciplines — shooting, athletics and swimming — were also given Tk 50,000 each at the function for imparting effective and tireless training to the sportsmen who brought laurels for the nation.

Addressing the Bangladesh athletes who clinched the gold medals in the SAF Games held last month in the Indian city of Madras, Begum Zia said the government had taken massive plans for developing the sports sector so that the country could

Opposition asks partymen

**Mobilise people in agitation**

The three major opposition political parties yesterday directed their workers at district, thana and union levels to intensify the on-going agitation against the ruling party's bid to hold "one-party" election.

The Awami League, Jatiya Party and the Jamaat-e-Islami also called upon their workers to mobilise people in the agitations.

Briefing newsmen after a meeting of the liaison committee of the three parties last night, AL Organising Secretary Mohammad Nasim said that contacts would be made with other smaller parties boycotting the February 15 elections to bring those in the agitation.

Abdus Samad Azad and Tofael Ahmed of AL Moudud

Ahmed and Anwar Hossain Manju of JP and Ali Ahsan Mohammad Mujahid and Kader Mollah of Jamaat were present at the meeting.

The meeting also reiterated the call of the mainstream opposition to the candidates who have filed nomination papers to withdraw their candidature by January 23, Nasim said.

He said that Chief Election Commissioner Justice A K M Sadeq had mentioned the night of the Lailatul Qadr as one of the reasons for not shifting the elections date beyond February 15.

"But being a faithful Muslim he should know that any odd night during the last 10 days of the Ramadan can be the night of the holy Lailatul Qadr," Nasim pointed out.

**N'ganj lawyers boycott court**

From Our Correspondent NARAYANGANJ, Jan 20: Lawyers boycotted a Class 1 Magistrate's Court here after police assaulted one of them in the court room and baton charged some others in the room of the OC of Narayanganj thana.

Witnesses said, police intervened as some lawyers were talking to some accused persons in the court. A police sub-inspector assaulted an advocate at around noon, which was protested by some other advocates instantly.

A team of 20 lawyers then met the court inspector but the meeting failed when the inspector called police. Witnesses alleged that police charged batons on the lawyers there.

It was also alleged that police charged baton on two lawyers in front of the Court Building in the afternoon.

Earlier, lawyers of the court held a protest rally in the hall room of Narayanganj District Bar Association.

**4 Bangladeshis among 36 held in Malaysia**

KUALA LUMPUR (Malaysia), Jan 20: Police said today they have arrested 26 Thai and Indonesian illegal immigrants in the Kemaman and Besut districts off Trengganu state in northeastern Malaysia Friday, reports AP.

On Tuesday police arrested six Indonesians and four Bangladeshis at a plantation near Kemaman, he said.

Police public relations officer Mokhtarruddin Idrus said 19 Thai nationals, including nine children, were arrested in Besut, the National News Agency Bernama reported from Kuala Trengganu the capital of Trengganu state.

Mokhtarruddin said seven Indonesians, aged between 22 and 36, were arrested in a plantation near Kemaman following a tipoff.

**64 SSC examinees under Jessore Board punished**

JHALAKATHI, Jan 20: Jessor Secondary and Higher Secondary Education Board has punished 64 SSC examinees of five centres of the district for adopting unfair means in examinations held in 1995, reports UNB.

A meeting of Disciplinary Committee of the board held recently cancelled the examinations of the students by reviewing the answer papers. reports of the examination conducting officials and other show cause notices.

Of them, 21 were punished for one year and one for two years.

Of the total students, 14 were expelled from Sadar, 11 from Naichhiti, 24 from Rajapur, 10 from Kathalia and five from Amua centres.



**Maoists storm Bihar police station, kill 7**

NEW DELHI, Jan 20: Maoist guerrillas today stormed an isolated police station in the eastern Indian state of Bihar and shot dead seven officers, the Press Trust of India reported, reports AFP.

The attackers set the police station in the district of Gaya on fire before escaping, the news agency said. It gave no further details.

Maoist guerrillas, known in India as Naxalites, are very active in Bihar.

**Drivers' negligence caused Chandpur train mishap'**

CHANDPUR, Jan 20: The one-member inquiry committee to probe the causes of the January 8 train accident at Kangai in Hajiganj thana concluded its inquiry today.

Talking to the UNB correspondent on board a train, Mohammad Shamsur Rahman, member of the committee, said the accident definitely occurred due to human failure (negligence of drivers).

Rahman, the Government Inspector of Railways under the Ministry of Communications, informed that a total of 25 people, including an injured woman, had appeared as witnesses before the committee in the affair.

He said so far, he received information on 11 deaths and 22 injured seriously. Six of the bodies were identified while the identity of the remaining five were yet unknown. Two of the injured

**Parties for funding Rooppur N-plant being shortlisted**

The government is shortlisting parties willing to fund the Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant (RNPP), official sources said.

"We are considering private firms along with government agencies for Rooppur plant as the government is now encouraging the private sector to fund such projects," said M A Qayum, Chairman of Bangladesh Atomic Energy Commission (BAEC).

The BAEC is also considering implementation of the project with supplier's credit, he added.

The government wants to ensure the best safety measures in implementing the project, the BAEC Chairman pointed out.

Without disclosing the names of those willing to

fund, he said that records of the firms were being evaluated for consideration and approval.

Prospective financiers from a number of countries had shown their interest but later backed out because of the political situation, sources noted.

Qayum said the proposed plant will be a part of optimum generation mix where nuclear power, fuel and natural gas would be used to generate electricity.

The International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) was willing to provide consultancy in installing and operating the plant safely, he said.

Kazi Abul Hasnat, Director and Chief Engineer, Nuclear Power and Energy Division of the BAEC, pointed out that

nuclear technology was considered one of the safest power generation systems.

Environmentalists, however, argue that such technologies cause thermal pollution.

"Although the initial cost of a nuclear plant is double that of the conventional gas-burned plant, the fuel cost is much lower than a coal or a oil-burned plant," said a scientist.

He said a typical 300 MW nuclear plant costs about 600 million US dollars and its annual fuel cost is 20 to 25 million dollars while an oil-burned plant and a coal-burned one need fuel worth about 100 million and 65 million dollars respectively.

The RNPP, conceived in 1961, was approved four

**Five key MQM activists shot dead in Karachi**

KARACHI, Jan 20: The opposition Mohajir Quami Movement (MQM) today accused the government of carrying out "virtual genocide" of its people as police killed five of its activists and violence claimed another seven lives, reports AFP.

Two policemen were also injured in the "encounter," a term used by police to describe armed confrontations.

One Kalashnikov, three handguns and one rocket launcher were recovered from the slain militants, police said.

Rehan was wanted in connection with some 100 murder cases, police said, and a reward of one million rupees had been offered for his capture. senior police officials said Rehan's killing was a major breakthrough in cracking the city's terrorist network.

Police shot dead five key MQM members in the volatile central and western districts as news spread of the killing.

Japan to recognise Bosnia
