WC cricket live on Star TV

The Hong Kong-based STAR TV network will broadcast 37 matches of the cricket World Cup, which begins later this month, officials said Tuesday, says a press release.

The channel will broadcast 400 hours of programming, 224 of them live, STAR TV officials said in Bombay.

A familiar face on STAR TV and lead cricket anchorman, Sunil Gavaskar, will head a team of expert commentators for the World Cup which include Ravi Shastri. Richie Benaud, Ian Chappell, Tony Greig. Danny Morrison. Ian Smith, Grant Nesbitt, Tony Cozier, Michael Holding. Robin Jackson, Mike Haysman, Lee Irvine, Iftikhar Ahmed and Asif Igbal.

And for the first time in the history of the STAR TV Network, Hindi commentary will be available for the broadcast of the World Cup. Gene Swinstead, manag-

ing director, STAR TV India says, "It was four years ago when STAR TV first caught the eyes of Indian television viewers when the 1992 World Cup from Australia was broadcast in its entirety. "Sir Bobby has made an approach on our behalf," said Ferguson. "We are hoping that Mark will come over to Old Trafford.



Atherton is the first name on the English team-sheet in every form of cricket, yet is now ironically facing a tougher time in India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka than on his previous visit.

The strain of propping up a struggling team is already showing before the World Cup starts. He admitted last weekend that "It's hard to keep on captaining a losing side" and even hinted his in-

Sri Lanka on their ill-fated 1992-93 tour under Graham Gooch, yet Atherton was deemed surplus to his side's requirements each time.

In the Test arena. too. England decided they could do without him. He was omitted from the first two Tests against India, even in Madras when Gooch was absent with food poisoning and the touring team were weeks. soundly beaten, to quoted wisdom, " by 11 men and a plate of prawns".

Through little fault of his own, Atherton became a frustrated, peripheral figure, and it was Alec Stewart who led England on the Sri Lanka leg of the tour after Gooch had returned home early.

"Our record's good. We've reached three of the last four World Cup finals. But in oneday cricket anyone can beat anyone.

Even before his mammoth 185 not out in Johannesburg in December, "Iron Mike" rated among the world's finest Test openers, and there was also evidence of a growing one-day pedigree before the disappointing end to the South African tour.

Prior to the seven-match one-day series in the republic. Atherton had played only 25 limited-over internationals, around half the number, for example, of his county teammate Neil Fairbrother.

Yet his last two limitedovers innings against West Indies in the 1995 English summer were 92 at the Oval and 127 at Lord's, a memorable first one-day international hundred.

It took him 27 balls to get off the mark, but by the end he was irresistible, hooking Ian Bishop for six and smacking the same bowler high over extra cover in time-honoured Caribbean fashion.

He subsequently described it as "one of those days when everything went right", but it enabled his team to win the one-day series 2-1 and establish a blueprint for England manager Ray Illingworth to follow in the World Cup.

That master-plan currently has a blurred look, but the top-of-the-order batting debate is now simply a matter of who will open alongside Atherton, who average 41.86 in one-day internationals.

There is still the possibility of a lower-order "dasher" being elevated to make the most of the early-innings fielding restrictions, and the captain knows the road to World Cup glory, will not be straight forward.

Winning the toss is not the least of a one-day captain's duties, yet Atherton knows from experience that things can still go disastrously wrong for the successful skipper.

"I remember the one-day international at St Vinncent in 1994. Geoff Boycott advised me to field, while a local Rastafarian with a huge spliff told me to bat while the tide was out. I put West Indies in, and we lost by 165

Aussies remain adamant




SYDNEY, Feb 6: The Australian Cricket Board (ACB) rejected on Tuesday a Sri Lankan offer of extra-tight security for a World Cup cricket match in Colombo but said it still awaited a former answer to its request for a change of venue, report agencies.

Srí Lanka said it would

provide the Australian team with security normally reserved for a visiting head of state and they would have to remain in the country only as long as it takes to play the one-day match on February

Sports minister S B Dissanayake also agreed to fly out the Sri Lankan cricket team to neighbouring India to play a scheduled practice match before the actual oneday game here.

The Australian Cricket Board Monday pulled out of

ing security concerns. The bombing occurred just a few blocks from the hotel here where the Australians had been scheduled to stay. Lankan Foreign Minister

Kadirgamar said the Australians could stay in India or the Maldives instead of Colombo. Helicopters would fly

them from the international airport to their hotel, 35 kilometres (21 miles) away. the day of the match and the route from the hotel to the Premadasa Stadium would be declared out of hounds.

The government was planning blanket security cover for the cricket grounds and the immediate neighbourhood while no spectator would be allowed to bring parcels to the stadium.

The minister also warned Australia that any attempt to persuade other three countries scheduled to play here - Kenya, West Indies and Zimbabwe — to join the boycott would be treated as a "hostile act".

Meanwhile, from Sydney, Australia's Foreign Minister Gareth Evans Tuesday denied Australia was encouraging other countries to boycott World Cup cricket games in Sri Lanka and expressed surprise at a suggestion from there that such action would be treated as a "hostile act". Evans said Tuesday that

he was surprised by the "strength of that expression". A latest ACB statement reaffirms the board's decision not to allow its players to compete in Sri Lanka and appeared to rule out any

chance of compromise. "A proposal received from Sri Lanka to transport the Australian team to the stadium in Colombo by helicopter under maximum security was considered and declined by the ACB today." the ACB statement said.

Signed by ACB chairman Denis Rogers and chief executive officer Graham Halbish, the statement said the ACB would make no further comment until PILCOM had ruled on Australia's request for the match to be moved to another venue.

Bodyguards for Aussies

BRISBANE, Australia, Feb 6: Two bodyguards watched over the Australian cricket team here Tuesday as they trained before their Friday departure for the World Cup in India, reports AFP.

After death and bomb threats in the lead up to the World Cup, the Australian Cricket Board has hired security guards to look after squad members before they leave for Calcutta.

Two bodyguards, formerly with the Australian Federal Police, watched over the training camp and while they may have looked like distant observers their duties were far greater.

The Australians are normally relaxed in their own country but Tuesday the cricketers left by the back door of the Gabba Cricket Ground. The two minders checked all exits before they

Another security guard was stationed in the dressing room door while the Australians trained.

Team manager Ian Mc-Donald played down the extra presence. "I've got no comment.

McDonald said. "The thing about security is you don't talk about it." McDonald said the side

must try to forget the security concerns and concentration cricket, leaving protection up to the experts.

Several players looked tense even though most have downplayed the worries since the ACB decided not to travel to Sri Lanka for their scheduled opening World Cup against Sri Lanka on February 17.

Benjamin belongs to Hampshire

LONDON, Feb 6: West Indian fast bowler Winston Benjamin has told Hampshire he will fulfill his contract as their overseas player this summer, reports Reuter.

Benjamin, sent home from last year's tour of England for disciplinary reasons, was omitted from West Indies' squad for the World Cup starting on February 14. But Hampshire's com-

mercial manager Mike Taylor said Benjamin has been in touch with the county to reassure them that he will report for pre-season training under new captain John Stephenson.

"Winston's had a few problems and now appears to be totally out of the picture with the West Indies," said Taylor. "But he is halfway through a contract with us and he intends to see it out.

"He has been playing for the Leeward Islands and was disappointed to be left out of the West Indies World Cup squad. He now sees Hampshire as his main outlet for cricket which could make things interesting."

Hollanders riding high

NEW DELHI, Feb 6: Dutch Davis Cup captain Stan Franker on Monday predicted a 5-0 whitewash of India in their world group first round tie in Jaipur this weekend, reports AFP.

"We are aware of India's good record against strong countries in the Davis Cup. but we hope for a 5-0 result," Franker said, soon after the team's arrival for the February 9-11 tie at the Jai Club grass courts.

"We have not played on grass for some time, but the world class players in our ranks should not find it difficult," the visiting coach said.

World number 11 Vichard Krajicek leads the Dutch challenge, supported by Jan Siemerink and the crack doubles combination of Paul Haarius and Jacco Eltingh, all ranked below 30. Krajicek said he had re-




