

Khaleda's appeal over Radio, TV

Cast votes ignoring all provocations



Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia yesterday appealed for calm and massive turnout of voters at polling centres on February 15 ignoring anti-election activity and provocation, reports

"This is the best way you can retaliate all sorts of antielections activity and provocation," she said in her address to the countrymen over radio and television ahead of the general elections fraught with tension and trouble because of Opposition boycott.

She said casting votes is a sacred duty of all of us and called upon the people to ex-ercise their right of franchise duly in the coming national election.

The BNP chairperson asked all to keep patience and remain peaceful in the face of all sorts of anti-election provocations.

Seeking vote for her party the BNP chairperson said only if continuity of the democratic process could be maintained through elections, an environment ensuring participation of all parties in future elections would be created.

"Our sincere efforts to that end will continue," she said holding out the assurance to those staying out of the fray.

Begum Zia observed holding of the coming election is mandatory as per the constitutional provisions. "Otherwise, there will be no legitimate government and the country will plunge into a constitutional crisis."

Ban on meetings, processions from midnight today The Election Commission

(EC) has banned all sorts of public meetings, processions and rallies for 48 hours from midnight today in the runup to general election on Thursday, reports UNB. Under Section 78 of the

People's Representation Order 1972, nobody can hold or join any such meeting, procession or rally in the concerned constituencies during the prohibition period. Besides, all have been di-

rected to refrain from acts of violence or indiscipline, intimidation or threat to any voter or person on election

Use of arms and muscle power has also been prohib-

ited strictly. An EC press release yesterday cautioned that violators of the taboo would be punished with maximum seven years and minimum 2 years imprisonment along with fine.

Casting of votes without ID cards allowed

identity card for casting vote, reports UNB. Following the ordinance. the Election Commission announced vesterday that the enlisted voters who were not

given identity cards would be able to cast their votes without cards in the February 15 elections. However, those who were issued identity card will have
