SRINAGAR, India, Feb 14: A Kashmiri guerilla group today issued "shoot-at-sight" orders to kill five former rebel leaders who want to start peace talks with India. reports Reuter.

"All militants have been asked to shoot at sight Babar Bader, Bilal Lodhi, Imran Rahi, Ghulam Mohideen Lone and Ahsan Dar." the Muslim Janbaz Force (MJF) said in a statement.

Four of the targeted men. jailed by Indian authorities and later released, said last week they were ready to hold direct talks with New Delhi. and without Pakistan's participation, to end the separatist crisis in the state.

The fifth, the jailed Chief Commander of Muslim Mujahideen, Ahsandar, has given his support to the others.





"We have APEC, which may be one of the most progressive regions in the world but we cannot afford to ignore other parts of the world, in the same way Europe cannot afford to ignore Asia," he said.
