Some solace for minnows

NEW DELHI, Feb 19: Former Australian captain lan Chappell said today cricket authorities were right to expand the World Cup to include minor countries because otherwise the game would wither, reports Reuter.

"Why should we expand the World Cup and have 12 teams? for the same reason that we no longer have Test cricket only being played by Australia and England," Chappell said in an article in the Indian Express newspaper.

"The authorities are correct to try and broaden the footprint of cricket and include countries like Kenya. United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Holland in the World Cup.

"Without expansion the game of cricket will wither and die in the ultra-competitive global village that we have become through rapid changes in technology.

Some commentators have declared that the expansion of the 1996 tournament has resulted in some farcical one sided matches.

They argue that it has devalued performances such as South African Gary Kristen's record Cup score of 188 not out against the UAE at Rawalpindi last Friday.

"Be that as it may, it's only 20 years ago that Sri Lanka played its first World' Cup match and were dismissed by the powerful West Indies for a score in the 80s," said Chap-

"However, 21 years later Sri Lanka is considered by many to be a dark horse to win the World Cup."

KARACHI, Feb 19 (AFP) World Cup kingpin Brian Lara was given a top rating by Pakistan cricketing legend Hanif Mohammad here on Monday ... before being told that he would never measure up to the greatest player of them all. Hanif has no doubts.

There was only one true monster of the game. And that man was Sir Garfield Sobers. No matter that Lara broke Sobers' Test record of 365 for an individual innings, before going on to erase Hanif's own first-class mark of 499.

"Lara is a world-class batsman," says Hanif, now 60. "But Gary Sobers was something different. He was four-in-one. "A great stroke-player. medium-fast bowler, a left-arm spinner who could bowl leg-

breaks as well as chinaman. and a brilliant close-in fielder. The former Pakistani captain and world class opener's views are fired not by regret at losing his place in the record books but by his reverence for Sobers.

Lara scored 375 against England in April, 1994, in Antigua, then 501 for Warwickshire against Durham in June to underline his pretensions to the title of the world's best batsman.

even if it is one-dimensional. "There are similarities between Lara and Sobers. Both are West Indians and left-handers as well. Lara is also a stroke-player and does not like to be pinned down, just like Sobers," he says.

"Lara is a match-winner and Sobers was. The West Indies must definitely be looking forward to seeing Lara take them through to the final of the World Cup, just as they used to pin their hopes on Sobers' form in the past

"Lara, like other strokeplayers, sees the ball early and hits the ball with perfect timing. He has all the strokes. But I have yet to see a player like Sobers.

Hanif himself, who was known as the little master, had all the strokes himself. But his true greatness came with his back firmly to the wall. The elder brother of former

Pakistani Test cricketers Mushtag Mohammad and Sadiq Mohammad (they all played together in his final appearance against New Zealand in 1969-70) and the father of Shoaib, Hanif was all guts and stickability when the going got tough. Considered one of the

game's greatest defensive players, he still holds one world record that even Lara is unlikely to break, rooting himself to the crease for 16 hours and ten minutes during his rearguard 337 against the West Indies in the 1957-58

Such a stand leaves cricket supporters stunned and while admitting Lara is not bigger than the game - his loss would be dreadful to everyone - not least the man himself who has put his living on the line. And a West Indies World Cup side without Lara is drastically weakened but the team needs a happy Lara, not just for his own good, but for the state of morale among the rest of the squad. The comforting thought is that 1996 can hardly be worse than 1995 for Caribbean cricket. Or can it?
