BUP survey shows

71.2 pc for polls under caretaker govt

A total of 71.2 per cent of respondents in an opinion survey felt that a free and fair election was possible only under a neutral caretaker government.

The survey also revealed that 21.2 per cent of those interviewed felt that there was no alternative but to complete the February 15 election for upholding the constitutional

obligation. But 47.5 per cent said there were other options and 31.4 per cent refrained from giving any opinion on the polls. Conducted by a leading pri-

vate research organisation, Bangladesh Unnayan Parishad (BUP) under the supervision of economist Dr Qazi Khaliquzzaman Ahmed, the opinion poll was conducted in 15 Jatiya Sangsad constituencies 13 in Dhaka, and one each in Gazipur and Narayangant

Fifteen thousand people from a cross section of society were interviewed for the opinion survey.

Sixtyeight point 3 per cent said the election was a shame as most major political parties did not participate in it.

On the implications of the February 15 election, 82.7 per cent said it was pushing the country towards a grave crisis Sixty three point 4 per cent said the way the election was handled proved the validity of the demand for non-party caretaker government while 16.1 per cent did not respond. In response to a question as

to how the impasse could be resolved. 92.1 per cent said the ruling and the opposition parties should come to a settlement. To another question. 68.7 per cent said the President should send a reference to the Supreme Court about the February 15 elec-

Shop owner beaten to death in city

A shop owner at Bangabazar, reportedly beaten up by a group of extortionists near Malitola in the old part of the city Friday, died at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) yesterday.

Manik Miah, 25, son of Ali Sarder of Suritola, was picked up by a gang of about five extortionists from Bangabazar Friday night after he refused to give toll.

The gang took Manik near Chitra Mahal cinema hall under. Kotwali thana and assaulted him severely. He succumbed to his injuries at around 6 am yesterday. However, police could not confirm the incident.

Vitiating the debate on the three above issues is the ques-

Failure to adhere to the Constitutional provisions that elections to all 300 seats will have to be completed within 90 days after the dissolution of the last parliament (elections in 10 of them not being held at all within that time frame), has added a whole new dimension to the 'legitimacy debate'. These, we think, are very serious questions, and ones that should not be glossed over, either for the sake of a quick solution or for the sake of convenience for all or any of the contesting

So, the bottom line is that many questions have been amicably solved, and yet many fundamental ones remain. However, we would like to argue that for no reason should the dialogue process be delayed any further. The opposition must respond positively to the invitation by the President and should start the process of negotiations on all the above points. There should not be any precondition for the start-

Rickshaws were on the roads since morning.

In Chittagong, three persons including a boy were killed in separate clashes at Pahartali, Nazirhat and Sandwip. Over 20 people were fjured in the clashes.

Cargo handling and delivery of goods at the post remained suspended despite a minister's efforts to keep the port opera tive as the stevedores and port workers abstained from duty.

Nizam Uddin, a motorgarage worker was fatally injured in a cross-fire when some activists of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal and Chhatra League were locked in a gunbattle over possession of a meeting venue at Pahartali Alanker cinema crossing at about 3 pm, police said. He died at the Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH).

Ten people were injured in the gunfight that continued for about two hours from 2-30 pm. Scores of bombs were also blasted during the clashes and chase and counter chase. The injured persons were

admitted to the CMCH and different clinics in the city. The clashing groups dis-

persed after police intervened. Abu Taher, a Chhatra League activist, was gunned down allegedly by some Chhatra Shibir activists at noon in front of Jankar Cinema hall at Nazirbat under Fatikchhari thana, police said. Taher was talking to his friends when the gunmen suddenly arrived, shot him and fled away: police added.

An unidentified boy, aged about 12 years, died on the spot when he was caught in a crossfire during a gunfight between some Awami League and BNP activists at Musapur village under Sandwip thana at about 2-30 pm, police said. The boy was a passerby.

Five persons were injured in, the gunfight. They were rushed to Sandwip health complex.

A police constable was injured when a patrol team came under bomb attack by Opposition activists at Sadarghat area at about 10 am today, police said. The injured constable was rushed to the hospital.
