5 killed in fresh Karachi violence

KARACHI, Mar 16: At least five people, including a policeman and two activists of the ethnic Mahajir National Movement (MQM), were killed in renewed violence in the Pakistani city of Karachi, police said today, reports Reuter.

20 injured in Lalbagh clash

At least 20 people, including women, were injured during a clash between two groups of local bullies in Lalbagh area of the city yesterday.

The sporadic clashes that began at around noon continued till 7pm creating panic among the people of the locality.

At least 50 rounds of gunshots were fired and dozens of home-made crackers exploded during the clash between the two groups, one reportedly led by Annu and the other by Titu. The angry armed men also stormed in to some houses near Killar Mor.

Of the injured seven persons — Kawasari Begum, 40, Md Saber, 30, Rafiqan, 15, Safaruddin, 35, Moin Akhter, 18, Sujon, 16, and Imran, 17 — were admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), medical sources said.

The incident was a sequel to enmity between the two groups.

Identities of 7 Bangladeshis killed in Bahrain

The seven Bangladeshis who were killed on Thursday's bomb attack by a masked group in Bahrain have been identified, reports BSS.

Bombs hurled at Mizan's residence

Several bombs were hurled at the Gulshan residence of Jatiya Party acting Chairman Mizanur Rahman Chowdhury last night, reports UNB.

Two bombs were exploded with big bang in the lawn while another near Chowdhury's bedroom at about 10:45 pm, his family sources said.

Chowdhury was not in his residence at the time of bomb blasts. Two youths riding a motor cycle hurled the bombs. They left the place exploding more bombs when JP workers chased them.

Hartal observed in Siddhirganj

NARAYANGANJ, Mar 16: A dawn-to-dusk hartal was observed in the Siddhirganj thana area today.

All modes of transport were off the roads, shops were shut and houses flew black flags during the hartal called by a section of Adamee Jute Mills (AJM) workers to protest the killing yesterday of Shahin, 28, a worker of Mill No 2 and reportedly an Awami League (AL) activist.

However, the AJM operated normally and some workers were seen wearing black badges.

Floods in Sylhet

SYLHET, Mar 16: Standing crops on about ten thousand acres have gone under water in three thanas of Sylhet due to heavy rains and onrush of water from the upper stream during the last four days. The thanas are, Jakiganj, Gowainghat and Companyganj.

In Gowainghat thana, boro paddy on several thousand acres in Nimna Haor, Meuwa Beel, Katia Haor, Chiru Haor, Boula Haor, Pubsair Haor, Panichhabra Haor and Goala Haor have already gone under water as the rains continued for the last four days.

Sudden onrush of water from the hilly areas across the border has also caused flooding.

In Companyganj thana, standing crops in Patharchau Haor, Telikhail Haor and the low-lying areas of Islampur Ronikhal and Talikhail unions have been inundated. Jakiganj thana, boro and rabi crops on several thousand acres have been inundated.

Avalanche kills 35 in Pak-held Kashmir

MUZAFFARABAD, Mar 16: At least 35 people were killed when an avalanche struck a remote mountain village in Pakistan-administered Kashmir, administration officials said today, reports AFP.

The mass of snow and rocks swept over at least seven mud-and-stone houses Friday night in the Kail-Neelum Valley, located 150 kilometers (93 miles) northeast of Muzaffarabad, the state capital, an official report said.

WP to resist JS session

BASA demands security for employees

The Bangladesh Administrative Service Association has strongly demanded of the government to ensure full security to all employees.

The central executive committee of the association in an emergency meeting yesterday expressed deep concern over the current political crisis and observed that members of the association at the field level were being victims of violence.

The meeting, held with the association president Ataul Haq in the chair, also demanded a high level judicial enquiry into the irregularities in the February 15 polls saying the association members — Deputy Commissioners (DCs) and Thana Nirbahi Officers (TNOs) — had merely discharged constitutional responsibilities under the direction of the Election Commission.

It asked the authorities to compensate those members of the association, who were affected in various ways while discharging their duties.

The association also demanded that unreasonable interference at all levels of administration be stopped immediately.

Iqbal Sobhan Chowdhury, President of the Bangladesh Federal Union of Journalists (BFUJ), Principal Kamaruzzaman of the Bangladesh Teachers Association, Dr Shahidul Alam of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA), Md Shahidullah of Secondary School Teachers Association, Mohammad Yunus of the Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industries (DCCI), Amir Hossain of Bangladesh Shop Owners Association, Ruhul Amin of Restaurant Owners Association and Muztaz Begum, a grassroots NGO worker addressed the rally. FBCCI vice-president Rashiduzzaman Dudu presided over the rally held at Motijheel in the city.

"After 24 hours, it will be too little and too late. There is hardly any time left, any further delay will only put the existence of the nation at stake," said Salman F Rahman, amidst thunderous applause and anti-government slogans.

Although the speakers maintained that the rally was purely a non-political one, full-throated anti-government slogans punctuated the two-hour proceedings that ended in a sit-in demonstration near the President's office, Bangabhaban.

The rally over, a group, led by Salman marched towards Bangabhaban, for a sit-in but was intercepted by security-men near the Jiban Bima building. Heavy contingents of riot police and paramilitary BDR were guarding the entrances of Bangabhaban.

The organisers claimed the attendance exceeded 100,000 but, according to independent counts, the figure could be around 50,000. Mostly small traders, their employees and members of NGOs made up the audience.

Salman said the rally was not to back up any particular political group but to seek a way out of the 22-month-old political crisis which, he observed, threatened the economy with ruination.

50 hurt in city during non-cooperation

At least 50 people were injured, three of them with bullet, in scattered bomb blasts and clashes between rival political groups at various places on the eighth day of non-cooperation programme yesterday.

Our DMCH correspondent reports: Thirteen injured persons were admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital while some others were released after first aid.

Mohammad Saber, 30, and Sujon, 16, received bullet injuries in an armed clash between two rival groups at Lalbagh area while another person, Ali, 21, suffered bullet wounds at Kamrangirchar in the morning.

Two passengers were injured when a petrol bomb was hurled at a speeding tempo near Jatrabari at around noon. They are Asauddin and Zahurul.

Near Shahjahanpur Railway Colony, a bus driver and two persons were injured when a bomb was hurled at the speeding vehicle at around 7 pm.

Several other persons were also hurt in bomb blasts at Nimtali, Curzon Hall, Islambagh, Mirpur and Kathalbagan areas.

Rickshaws remained normal in the city streets while all modes of motorised vehicles except some tempoes and buses were off the roads.

Shops, educational institutions and other private offices remained closed in the first hours of the non-cooperation programme.

Rail communications across the country has virtually collapsed.

Railway sources said passenger train communications remained halted from Thursday in all routes, excepting the Poradaha-Khulna section, amidst increasing obstructions at various places.

In Khulna, the eighth day of non-cooperation movement was marked by bomb blasts and clashes, according to our correspondent there.

Bombs were exploded in a room of the office of the Regional Controller of Food at noon causing damage to important papers and files.

At about 12:20 pm, unidentified persons exploded bombs in the Divisional Passport Office. Over two hundred passports and other important documents were destroyed.

At least 15 hand-bombs were also exploded in front of the Customs Collectorate building.

In another incident, two persons were injured in bomb blasts in the Khalishpur Industrial belt during a clash between JP and BNP activists.

Police resorted to lathicharge to disperse the rival groups.

He said clauses should be included in the Constitution banning hartals and such programmes for the next 15 years so that businesses can run smoothly.

Anisur Rahman Sinha, an executive committee member of BGMEA, also demanded the resignation of the government within 24 hours if it fails to take steps to open the businesses.

"I tell the opposition parties, keep the ports and factories out of your programme," said Sinha. "Otherwise, we will not let you go scot free. We will die, but we will take you with us."

"There is now very little difference between the stands of the government and the Opposition," noted Sinha. "You should now give some concessions and come to a solution."

After the rally, the BGMEA leaders led a procession to the Bangabhaban and handed over a memorandum to the President urging him to "resolve the crisis at any cost."

They also urged the President to take an initiative to save the garments sector.

Feb 15 polls has no acceptability, says Dr Kamal

Gano Forum President Dr Kamal Hossain yesterday urged the BNP government to hand over power to a caretaker government, showing respect to the public opinion, reports UNB.

Addressing a rally in front of the Jatiya Press Club in the afternoon, he said the February 15 election, boycotted by the people, has no acceptability, nor it is representative.

Dr Kamal said President Abdur Rahman Biswas, who took initiative to resolve the crisis through discussion, ended his mission by issuing a statement after holding one round of talks. This was not expected by the people, he added.

The Gano Forum leader suggested resumption of the talks.

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
