Ian Botham scored 114 and took 6/58 and 7/48 against India at Bombay in the 1979-80 series.

Imran Khan matched 117 and finished with 6/98 and 5/82 also against India at Faisalabad in the 1982-83 series.

Barring tests, three other players outdid the feats in first class matches, scoring a century in an innings and claiming all the wickets in an innings of the same match.

V E Walker of England scored 108 and wiped out Surrey with figures of 10/74 at the Oval in 1859.

W G Grace put on 104 for MCC in 1886 at Oxford against the university team and claimed 10/49.

F A Tarrant was unbeaten with 182 and took 10 for 90 for Moharajah of Cooch Bihar's XI against Lord Willingdon's XI at Poona in 1918-19.

That is not the end. Two cricketers scored centuries in each innings and took ten wickets in the same match in first class cricket.

G H Hirst had scores of 117 not out and 111 to follow up with 6/70 and 5/45 while helping Yorkshire against Somerset at Bath in 1906.

B J T Bosanquet made 103 and 100 not out and finished with 3/75 and 8/53 for Middlesex against Sussex at Lords in 1905.

G Giffen of South Australia scored 217 and took 9/96 and 7/70 against Victoria at Adelaide in 1891/92.

Grenda rout Guyana

ST GEORGE'S, Grenada, Apr 8: Kevin Fletcher had a hat-trick as Grenada took the lead early and never looked back, posting a 6-0 victory against Guyana Sunday in Caribbean Zone World Cup soccer qualifying action, reports AP.

The match was the second leg of a home-and-home series, which Grenada wins with an 8-1 score. The first leg was won by Grenada 2-1 on March 29.

Grenada will take on Haiti in the second round of qualifying, which began on April 1 with Jamaica defeating Suriname 1-0.

Other second-round pairings include Dominican Republic-Netherlands Antilles, Cayman Islands-Cuba, St. Kitts and Nevis-St. Lucia, Puerto Rico-St.

Gijon dent Real pride



MADRID, Apr 8: Real Madrid continued their downward slump Sunday losing 1-0 against Sporting Gijon in a 35th round match that also saw No. 2 Barcelona closing in on leaders Atletico Madrid, reports AP.

Booted continuously by some 40,000 spectators — less than half the capacity of the team's Santiago Bernabeu Stadium — Real showed little spirit from the outset and could not prevent Sporting taking the lead in the 14th minute on a goal by Jesus Velasco.

The result, which followed by side's exit from the European Champions league last month at the hands of Juventus, left Madrid with 54 points from a record of 15 wins, nine draws and 11 defeats and seriously weakened chances of garnering a place in the next UEFA cup.

Meanwhile, cross-town rivals and league leaders Atletico Madrid — with 73 points — stumbled slightly in their title chase by only managing a 1-1 draw Saturday against Oviedo, allowing No. 2 Barcelona, who defeated Real Sociedad 1-0, to narrow the gap separating the top two teams to three points.

Atletico meet Barcelona in the final of the Spanish King's

Cup on Wednesday.

Other 35th-round results Sunday were: Athletic Bilbao 3, Salamanca 1; Compostela 0, Tenerife 2; Valencia 1, Albacete 0; Rayo Vallecano 0, Sevilla 0; and Valladolid 2, Deportivo La Coruna 2; Merida 2, Celta 0; Betis 2, Racing Santander 2. On Saturday, Espanyol drew 1-1 against Zaragoza.

Valencia 1, Albacete 0. Valencia kept their slim title hopes alive by defeating lowly Albacete 1-0 on a goal, five minutes from the end by the captain Fernando Gomez. The side has 67 points, six less than Atletico de Madrid.

Athletic de Bilbao 3, Salamanca 1.

In Bilbao, Athletic ended a rash of seven home games without a goal when Carlos Garcia got his fourth of the season in the 27th minute. Jose Angel Ziganda then got two in the 60th and 65th to make it 3-0 while Salamanca came back with one by Joan Barbara in the 78th. Athletic now have 39 points while Salamanca stay bottom place in the 22-team division with 27.

Compostela, 0, Tenerife 2. Tenerife went into the lead in the 26th minute on a goal by Carlos Aguilera. Ten minutes later Argentine-born Spanish

international Juan Antonio Pizzi scored his 26th of the season to push the side two ahead and secure his position at the top of the leading scorers table. Tenerife now have 58 points while Compostela stay with 54.

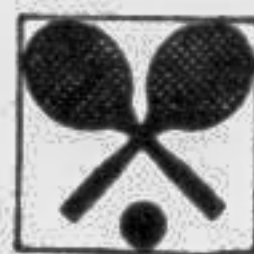
Valladolid 2, Deportivo de La Coruna 2.

Valladolid got off to a good start taking an early lead on a goal by Jose Maria Quevedo in the 15th minute followed five minutes later by one from Croatian striker Alen Peternac. Deportivo, however, bounced back 10 minutes later when Donato slotted home from the penalty spot. The Brazilian-born Spanish international slotted home a second from a penalty in the 59th minute to seal the draw.

Betis, 2, Racing de Santander 2.

Racing Santander, down to nine men following two expulsions, managed to hold Betis to a 2-2 draw away from home. Betis went into the lead in the 43rd minute with a goal by Alfonso Perez. David Villabona equalised in the 65th but Alexis Trujillo put Betis ahead again two minutes later only to have Russian striker Ilisha Faizulin score his first of the season to ensure the draw from Racing. Betis moved into No. 5 with 58 points while Racing edges up with 42.

Czechs abase Americans



UNDATED, Apr 8: The Czech Republic stunned reigning champions the United States 3-2 in the Davis Cup quarterfinals in Prague on Sunday, leaving an American delegation and the team's fans searching for answers, reports Reuter.

While the Czechs celebrated Petr Korda's 7-6, 6-3, 6-2 win over Michael Washington in the fifth and deciding match, the question on people's lips was why the Americans sent what has been referred to here as the "B" team.

In winning the Cup last year, the US rode roughshod over their opposition with the likes of Pete Sampras and Andre Agassi spearheading their assault on the trophy.

But for their tie against the Czechs, the best player they could muster was world number 17 Todd Martin, who won both points for the Americans. Washington lost twice and doubles pair Patrick McEnroe and Patrick Galbraith went down to defeat.

Non-playing US captain Tom Gullikson refused to comment on the absence of the country's best players, nor to make it an excuse for losing. "They beat us on the tennis court, they played very well and they deserve to win," Gullikson said.

The players that we had here did their best and we can't really worry about who's not here, he added.

But Campbell an official with the United States Tennis Association (USTA), looked exasperated as he searched for answers as to what the USTA could do to coax top players to represent their country.

The USTA cannot issue an edict demanding that its players participate in the Davis Cup. There's not lot of control on our side it's the players' decision, he told.

"But I think that Gullikson would rather be here with four guys who are enthusiastic and want to play rather than a group of players who would prefer to be somewhere else and feel as though they were being forced into playing," he added.

Sampras and Agassi along with Michael Chang and Jim Courier, declined to play for their nation for reasons ranging from their pursuit of the world number one ranking to their wish to play in the Olympics in Atlanta this summer, and the congested schedule that could result if they also played Davis Cup.

One player who has found Davis Cup participation particularly satisfying this year has been Korda.

Martin beat Daniel Vacek 7-6 (7-1), 6-3, 6-1 in the first of Sunday's reverse singles to set up the crucial contest between Korda and Washington, who lost to Vacek on Friday.

The two players felt each other out for most of the first set, trading service games until Washington looked to be on

the brink of winning the set at 6-5.

But Korda staved off two set points, broke Washington's serve in the first point of the break and held that advantage to win it 7-5, sending the near-capacity crowd at Prague's Sportovní Hala into a frenzy.

The win breaks a drought for the Czechs against the US, who had gone on to win the cup all three times they previously faced the Czechs (then Czechoslovakia).

"Finally we have advanced past them (the USA) and now we can look forward to playing Sweden in September," Korda added.

Meanwhile, Enzo Furlan beat Wayne Ferreira of South Africa on Sunday to send Italy into the Davis Cup world group quarterfinals for the first time in 16 years.

Cheered on by 6,000 fans at Rome's Foro Italico Tennis Stadium, Furlan won 3-6, 6-0, 7-6, 6-2 in two hours 42 minutes to give Italy a 3-1 victory and an appointment with France in September's semifinals.

France completed their 5-0 rout of Germany who were

without Michael Stich through injury and for whom an ailing Boris Becker played only in the doubles on Saturday. He lost in partnership with Marc Goellner.

Their place in the semis gives Guy Forget, who played when France beat the United States in the memorable 1991 final and who won points this weekend, a chance to play in another final if the French can beat Italy.

"I have only a few years left in my career and it would be great," Forget said.

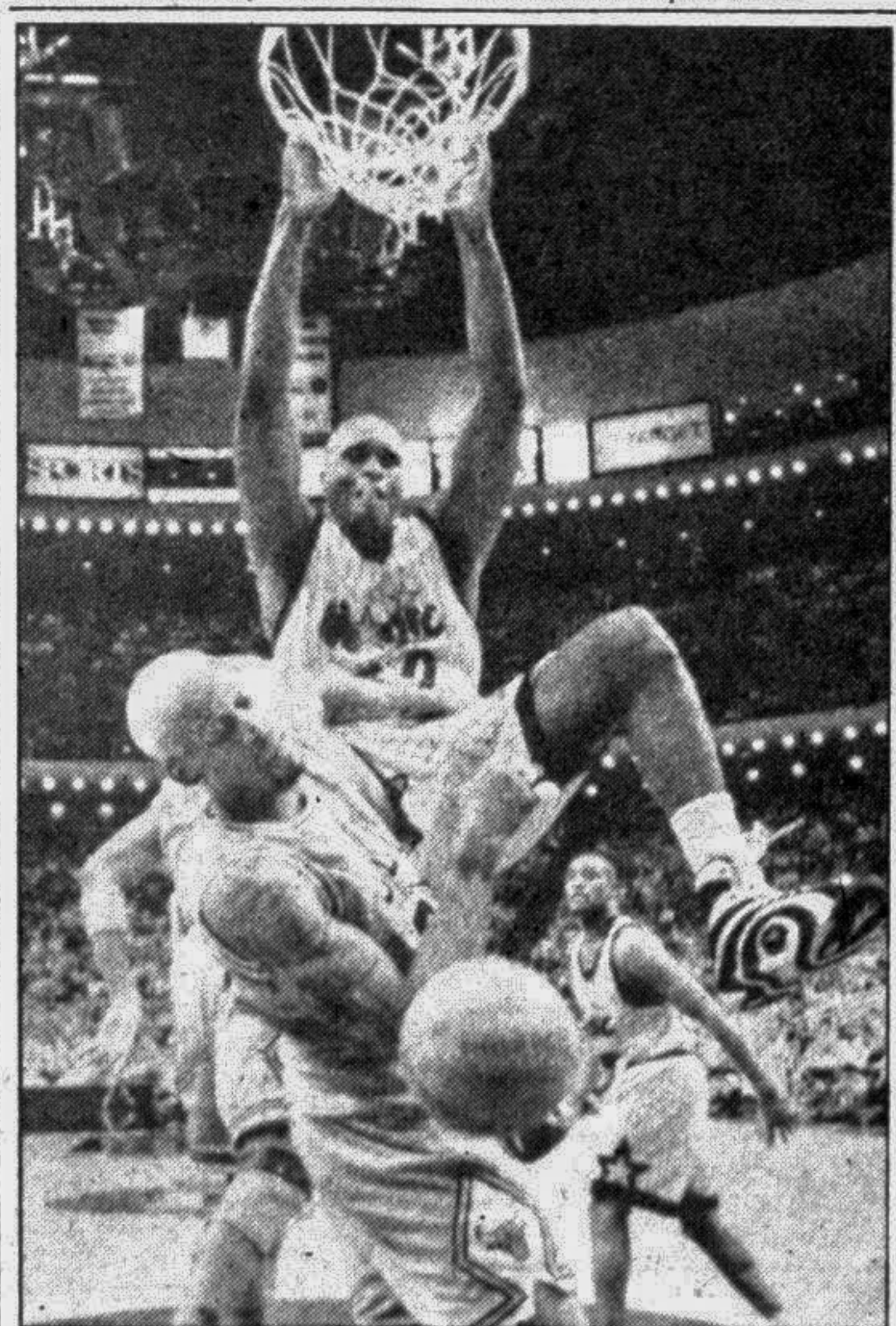

Laudrup carries Rangers into final

GLASGOW, Scotland, Apr 8: Brian Laudrup ended Glasgow Celtic's reign as Scottish Cup holders Sunday with Rangers' second goal in a 2-1 semifinal victory at Hampden Park, reports AP.

The Dane swapped passes with Gordon Durie and ran through to lob the ball over goalkeeper Gordon Marshall in the 65th minute after Ally McCoist had scored the first a minute before the half time break.

Dutch striker Pierre van Hooydonk gave Celtic hope with a glancing header eight minutes from the end and Simon Donnelly lifted a close range shot over the Rangers goal four minutes later.

But Rangers, which has won the trophy 26 times to Celtic's 30, held on and will meet Hearts in the final May 18. Hearts downed Aberdeen 2-1 Saturday in the other semifinal.

Four nations hockey results

HAMBURG, Apr 8: India scrambled to a 2-2 draw against Australia in the second round of a four-nation Olympic warmup field hockey tournament Sunday, reports AP.

Mukesh Kumar put India ahead after 11 minutes. Jay Stacy scored on corner penalties in the 23rd and 40th to give Australia the lead, but Kumar leveled the score again in the 62nd minute.

Olympic champions Germany struggled to a 2-2 against Spain in Sunday's other game. Javier Arnau scored twice for Spain; Carsten Fischer and Stefan Saliger tallied for the hosts.

In Saturday's opening matches, Germany defeated India 3-1 and Australia beat Spain 2-1.

Germany leads the tournament on goal difference ahead of Australia, followed by Spain and India.

At the Summer Olympics in Atlanta starting in July, the men's field hockey tournament is divided into two six-team pools for the preliminary round.

Pool A includes Argentina, Germany, India, Pakistan, Spain and the United States. Pool B has Australia, Britain, Malaysia, the Netherlands, South Africa and South Korea.

Chinese Olympic trials ends

TIANJIN, China, Apr 8: World champion Liu Limin was relegated to second place by Qu Yun in the women's 200 metres butterfly on the seventh and final day of the Chinese Olympic trials on Sunday, reports Reuter.

Qu clocked two minutes 09.66 seconds with Liu, the world 100 and 200 metres butterfly gold medalist, second in 2:09.88.

Qu, who finished third in the 100 metres butterfly, said she had not been surprised at her placing.

"It was expected. The 200 metres is my strongest event," she said.

Asked about her prospects at this year's Atlanta Olympics, Qu replied: "There is a chance but I will have to fight for it."

World record holder Le Jingyi won the women's 50-metre freestyle in 24.93 seconds with Shan Ying, winner of the women's 100 and 200 metres freestyle, second in a personal best of 25.36 seconds.

Le's coach Ming said he was satisfied with her performance.

"We stand the same chance as the United States," Zhou said when asked about Le's Olympic medal hopes. "It depends on training in the next three months."

"I'm satisfied with her performance... she was expected to finish within 25 seconds."

Meanwhile, China's former head swimming coach Chen Yunpeng said on Sunday there was a chance China would not win any gold medals at this year's Atlanta Olympics.

The Chinese women won four gold medals at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics but overall performances have slumped since seven swimmers tested positive for banned substances at the 1994 Hiroshima Asian Games.

Asked how many gold medals China expected to win in Atlanta, Chen replied: "It will definitely be less than in Barcelona and may even be none."

Chen, who retired last year but still advises the national swimming team, told reporters that US, Australian and Japanese swimmers had performed better than the Chinese in their respective Olympic trials.

Capitalism in Sino sports

SHANGHAI, Apr 8: Eager to raise capital and escape from government control, China's sports teams are becoming shareholding firms and some may apply to list on the stock market, the China securities newspaper said today, reports Reuter.

The shareholding system is penetrating into China's sports circles and is expanding there," the paper said.

Leading the pack is the football team of the northeast province of Liaoning, once the best in China, that was demoted from the country's premier League last year in part because of its reluctance to reform, it said.

Jansher's fifth in a row



CARDIFF, Apr 8: Jansher Khan of Pakistan took his fifth successive British Open title by beating Australian second seed Rodney Eyles 15-13, 15-8, 15-10 on Sunday, reports Reuter.

Australia's top-seeded Michelle Martin won her fourth successive women's title with a 1-9, 9-5, 9-1, 9-7 defeat of second-seeded compatriot Sarah Fitzgerald.

Jansher had his work cut out against Eyles, who opened at a furious pace, chasing every shot and carving his own shots to all corners of the court.

The Australian sternly demanded the referee's backing for access to the top corners and won a series of early penalty strokes from the appeal referee.

Jansher denied he had blocked in those corners. "I don't block," the 26-year-old champion insisted.

"Sometimes I had to run into Rodney's back, sometimes he runs into mine. It's just part of the game."

Eyles, 28, moved from 7-5 down to 8-7 in the first game, fought back from 11-8 down to

11-11, 12-12 and 13-13 but lost it to a wonderfully delayed backhand drop shot nick and then, after three heavily debated let calls, crashed a back-

hand crosscourt volley into the tin.

Jansher knew the worst of the match was over and in the second game his confidence and speed increased as he advanced from 5-5 to 14-6 in a single hand.

In the third game Eyles recovered from 6-1 down to trail 11-8 but the champion always seemed in control and finished imperiously with a fearsome forehand straight kill into the back corner.

"That first game was very important," Jansher said. "Until I won it, while you wouldn't say I was nervous, I was certainly tense."

The British Open Title is a very important title, not just to me but the whole of Pakistan. I have actually been playing this tournament for the past month."

It was Jansher's 21st win over Eyles against only one defeat and kept him on course for his ambition of challenging the record of compatriot Jansher Khan, who won 10 British Open titles.

In the women's final, Fitzgerald blitzed to the first game in just three hands and it seemed Martin's run in the world's premier event might be over.

But the 28-year-old Sydney-based world champion, who lost to Fitzgerald twice in the far east last year, showed her steady determination to take control.

Running around the court to shake herself up, she took a 4-0 lead in the second game and soon levelled the match.

The third game was deeply competitive, even though Martin won it in just nine minutes, and when she led 8-3 in the fourth, it seemed to be all over.

But Fitzgerald raised her pace again and struck a series of will hugging, deep drives to peg the champion back to 8-7.

But at the vital moment, she pulled away from a volley on the backhand, chose instead a defensive shot and hit the tin.

The decision gave Martin her third match ball and Fitzgerald broke her racket against the floor in fury.

Russians rule the ring

VEJLE, Denmark, Apr 8: World champion Alexei Lezin, rested after winning his semifinal on walkover, captured the super heavyweight title Sunday as Russia dominated the 31st European Amateur Boxing Championships, reports AP.

Lezin, 26, defeated Ukraine's Vladimir Klitschko 6-1 in the over 91 kilo class, one of Russia's three gold medals in 12 finals.

Russian boxers also won one silver and three bronze medals in the meet, that also was a qualifying event for the Summer Olympics in Atlanta.

Germany finished second in the medal standings at 3-1-1.

Arantxa opens her account



HILTON HEAD, South Carolina, Apr 8: Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario of Spain won her first title of 1996 by outlasting unseeded Barbara Paulus of Austria 6-2, 2-6, 6-2 at the 926,250 dollars Family Circle Cup tennis tournament on Sunday, reports Reuter.

Sanchez-Vicario's 200,000 dollars winners cheque brought her 11-year career earnings to more than 10 million dollars.

In the semifinals, played earlier on Sunday because of rain on Saturday, Sanchez-Vicario easily defeated doubles partner and sixth seeded Jana Novotna of the Czech Republic, 6-2, 6-2.

In a brilliant display of power and patience Paulus came from behind in both sets to upset top seed and two-time defending champion Conchita Martinez of Spain in a two-hour cliff-hanger 7-6 (7-2), 6-4.

Just an hour later, Paulus played her first major championship final against Sanchez-Vicario, who had beaten her five times previously.

The 25-year-old Austrian, a former top 25 player who missed three years of play due to surgery on both wrists, her left ankle and left knee, showed early signs of nerves. Paulus won just 5 points in the first three games, and

Sanchez-Vicario jumped to a 3-0 lead.

Although Paulus managed to hold serve and then break to get backon serve at 2-3, she was broken again after several volley errors. Sanchez-Vicario then held for 5-2 and broke Paulus' serve again for the quick 6-2 set.

In the second set, following

numerous errors by a mentally fatigued Sanchez-Vicario, Paulus was able to establish her aggressive, baseline style. Armed with an unorthodox,

heavily top-spin forehand, strong backhand and terrific movement on court, the Austrian broke Sanchez-Vicario in the third game for 2-1 and again in the fifth game for 4-1.

The Spaniard regained one of those breaks with strong play in the sixth game, as Paulus made mistakes on several forehands. But Paulus held on to her lead on another break in the next game for 5-2 and then held her own serve for the 6-2 set.

Sanchez-Vicario, pumping her first at every point won, grabbed the only break in the third game with a cross-court backhand passing shot off a weak Paulus volley.

Up 3-1, the feisty Spaniard never looked back. Firing the ball deeper and attacking at every chance, Sanchez-Vicario took the match by breaking Paulus again, with a punched forehand volley to the open court.

"The first games of the third set were very important," said Sanchez-Vicario, runner-up here in 1993. "We were both tired, but I put my energy into being aggressive."

Paulus, runner-up earlier this year at Auckland, won 100,000 dollars. Her strong showing this week, with a second round victory over 7 ranked Magdalena Maleeva as well as the win over Martinez, will push her ranking to 17 from 24.
