

## WB for downward revision in aid disbursement target

The World Bank, amidst poor aid disbursement performance in Bangladesh during the current fiscal, has signalled that the disbursement target requires a downward revision, reports UNB.

In a recent note to the government, the Bank cautioned that poor disbursement performance during the current year placed Bangladesh in a "highly disadvantageous" position in competing for the future allocation from IDA (International Development

Advocate for Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Barrister Syed Ishtiaq Ahmed said yesterday that the present caretaker government had been giving top priority to the maintenance of law and order in the country, reports BSS.

Speaking at a meeting with the members of the Supreme Court Bar Association, he said that the government had already taken steps to recover unauthorised arms and to investigate the irregularities in granting licences for arms.

Bangladesh has been a major beneficiary of fund from the IDA, the soft loan window of the World Bank.

The World Bank note insisted on arranging a full-scale review of all projects immediately to make a "realistic" disbursement target during 1995-96.

The note pointed out that the Bank's project credit disbursement during the first eight months of the current fiscal (July-February) amounted to a poor 135.82 million US dollar, a little over 10 per cent of the undisbursed opening balance.

The disbursement by the Bank was lower by about 20 million US dollar than the same period of the last fiscal year (1994-95).

The World Bank resented that disbursements against all projects during the current year were "well below" the projections.

When contacted, a senior official of the Economic Relations Division (ERD) said that a prolonged political uncertainty was a major factor behind the poor aid disbursement during the current year.

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was repeatedly rescheduled, according to official sources.

So far, the Dhaka WASA has fulfilled four out of five conditionalities. They include: enactment of the new WASA Ordinance; appointment of a new board of directors and a chairman; reduction of total arrears to no more than five months of billings and appointment of a managing director on contract basis.

The other condition — contracting out two WASA zones to private hands for collection of bills — has so far been strongly resisted by the unions of WASA.

The two zones generate and annual revenue collection of between Tk 4 to 6 crore each. WASA sources, requesting anonymity, said some unscrupulous union leaders are involved in huge pilferage and therefore have been resisting the contracting out.

The unions, after repeated requests from the authorities, have softened their stance and now have tagged their own condition that they would not resist the issue if the WASA workers were given pension.

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Rifle snatched from cabinet secy's sentry not recovered

The rifle, snatched from a police sentry posted at the Dhanmondi residence of Cabinet Secretary Muhammad Ayubur Rahman Sunday night, could not be recovered till late last night.

Police said, they were investigating the incident. They had started a manhunt to nab the gunmen and recover the rifle. A case has also been filed in this connection.

A gang of about eight armed men attacked constable Abdul Alim at around 9.45 pm and took away his 303 rifle brandishing fire arms. The two other sentries were not at the gate of the house at the time.

Soon after the incident, family members of the cabinet secretary left their house at Dhanmondi Road No. 9/A and took shelter in a relative's residence. The secretary himself was not at his house at that time and did not return home till late Sunday night, according to reports.

This correspondent made repeated phone calls but there was no response from the cabinet secretary's house.

Meanwhile, the Officials Coordination Council of the Republic expressing concern over the incident condemned the attack at the residence of Ayubur Rahman.

**Cong-I expels 3 ex-ministers**  
**15000 candidates for Lok Sabha polls**

NEW DELHI, Apr 8: Indian political parties have hit the campaign trail in the world's largest democracy, with a record 15,000 candidates in the parliamentary polls, officials said today. reports AFP.

The Election Commission said the number of candidates for the 545-seat Lok Sabha (lower house of parliament) was the highest in an Indian general elections since Independence in 1947.

A total of 8,699 candidates fought the last polls in May-June 1991.

Most parties launched into their election campaigns as soon as the deadline for candidates withdrawal ended Saturday, election officials said.

The first phase of the election battle was expected to be low key with public rallies and house-to-house canvassing. But "things will pick up very soon," said Sushma Swaraj, a leader of the opposition Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP).

The staggered polls will be held on April 27, May 2 and May 7. Balloting in Kashmir will also be held on May 23 and 30.

Meanwhile, the governing Congress Party today expelled three former Cabinet ministers, including one of the top architects of India's economic

reforms for anti-party activities, according to AP.

Former Commerce Minister Palaniappan Chidambaram, junior Industry Minister M Arunachalam and Human Resource Development minister Madhavrao Scindia were expelled for being nominated to run against the party's candidates in a national election to be held in April and May, said Congress spokesman Ved Prakash.

He also said another party dissident, G K Moopanar, had been suspended for spearheading a revolt against Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao in the southern state of Tamil Nadu.

Chidambaram and Arunachalam resigned from Rao's government last week after he announced a surprise election alliance with Tamil Nadu's governing All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam Party, better known by its acronym AIADMK, a move they oppose.

AIADMK, and its charismatic leader Jayaram Jayalalitha, often are accused of corruption, but the Congress Party needs to win as much support as possible in the election, which many pollsters expect will fail to give any party a parliamentary majority.

**Indian held with smuggled goods**

JESSORE, Apr 8: The BDR seized smuggled goods worth about Taka one lakh eighty thousand and arrested one Indian national from Murali near Jessore town last night.

According to reports a special patrol party of 22 Rifles Battalion, while going to Benapole, saw a private car overtaking and moving them in high speed towards Khulna.

This made the patrol party suspicious. The BDR team, changed the direction of their jeep and chased the speeding car which was later intercepted at Murali.
