


**Dhaka Day by Day****Looking for Entertainment When Stuck in Traffic Jam**

**BCL demands autonomy of radio, TV**

Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL), the student wing of Bangladesh Awami League Thursday demanded that the National Broadcasting Authority air neutral news on radio and television.

They also submitted a memorandum to the DG of NBA in this regard.

Earlier, BCL brought out a procession on the Dhaka University campus and then held a rally there. The BCL rally was addressed by Enamul Haq Shamim, Ishaque Ali Khan Panna, Bahadur Bepari and Mazhar Alam.

Enamul Haq Shamim said that Khaleda had not granted autonomy to radio and television as was envisaged in the declaration of three-party alliance in 1990.

Rather, he said, she had made radio and television a partisan media.

Even after the fall of BNP regime the radio and television authorities had hardly changed their attitude, he continued.

He urged the caretaker government to take necessary measures for making radio and TV neutral. Otherwise, BCL will launch movement to realize the demand, he said.

Meanwhile, Enamul Haq Shamim and Ishaque Ali Khan Panna, the president and general secretary of BCL respectively in a statement Thursday condemned the attack on the BCL rally at BAU allegedly by JCD.
