Hall slams playing conditions

HERNING, Denmark, Apr 18: England's Darren Hall, the 1988 champion, criticised the playing conditions after struggling to overcome Norway's Erik Lva and reach the last 16 of the European Championships on Wednesday, reports Reuter.

The 30-year-old third seed was relegated to be secondary arena for the match against a player ranked 122 in the world, and he reckoned the lack of atmosphere contributed to a performance in which he dropped the opening game before winning 11-15, 15-6, 15-5.

Playing in the minor hall was a real comedown. I bet none of the Danes have to play there," said Hall, who was also suffering from a sore throat. "It was really a mental thing that I blew a 9-3 lead in the first game. Also I probably underestimated Erik."

Another English seed, Peter Knowles, also had to fight back from dropping the first game to Welsh schoolboy, Richard Vaughan, who had celebrated his 18th birthday on Tuesday.

At 8-11 down in the second game, Knowles, the eighth seed, was handed a conduct warning for swearing, but it proved to be the turning point in a match he went on to win 2-15, 18-13, 15-7.

Rani ascends her throne

International Women's Master Rani Hamid added yet another feather to her illustrious career when she clinched her tenth national women's chess title at the NSC chess room yesterday.

In the final round of the 17th version of the meet, Rani, the most experienced campaigner in the local eve's chess arena, had little trouble to beat Syeda Afsana Parveen Nira.

Playing with white pieces, Rani penetrated through Nira's Petrol defence after 38 moves for her seventh victory in the nine-round Swiss league tournament.

With yesterday's win, Rani earned a total of 7.5 points which gave her a clear one point lead over former two-time champion Tanima Parveen who confirmed the runner-up spot with 6.5 points.

In yesterday's round, Tanima, the bespectacled 18-year old from Chittagong who had a flying start in this tournament with victories over Rani Hamid and defending champion Syeda Shabana Parveen Nipa but eventually failed to keep the momentum, defeated Faizunissa Poly to ensure at least the second position in the ten-player final round.

Talking to The Daily Star, Rani Hamid, one of the most seasoned eve's chess player of the country who in her 18-year old chess career won the British Women's Championship three times, said: "I am happy to win the championship again after three years. Though I did not play for the title but I also can not deny the dream I had of making it for the tenth time. This is really a great moment in my life."

Regarding the standard of women's chess, Rani said, "I am happy to see that a lot of girls are participating in chess tournaments these days. The standard has also risen quite high. But what they actually need is to play more and more and that too, with the boys which will help them in gaining further confidence."

Talking about her future plan, Rani said, "I do not play for winning tournaments nowadays. I play for my own happiness. As long as I get pleasure out of playing

chess, I will continue to do just that."
Masuda Begum earned third position with six points while Afroza Khanom Bably clinched the fourth spot securing 5.5 points. In the final round, both agreed to a draw against each other after only eleven moves.

Among others, defending champion Syeda Shabana Parveen Nipa finished a disappointing fifth in the standings with five points. Nipa beat Nazrana Khan Iva in the ninth round.

Biman U-14 nat'l football from today

The qualifying rounds of the Biman Under-14 national football championship will begin from today in eight zonal venues.

A total of 47 districts will take part in the knock-out qualifying rounds. Eight zonal champions will join the defending champions Khulna in the final round yet to be scheduled.

In a press briefing at the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) conference room yesterday, the chairman of the tournament committee Saifuddin Ahmed Manik informed that 9,90,560 taka is the budget for this year's tournament. Biman, the sponsor, will pay 6,60,000 taka while BFF will provide the remaining amount.

The following are the participating districts and the zones.

Manikganj zone: Tangail, Narsingdi, Munshiganj, Faridpur, Madaripur, Gopalganj and Shariatpur.

Tangail zone: Mymensingh, Netrokona, Gazipur, Narayanganj, Dhaka and Manikganj.

Khulna zone: Jessore, Bagherhat, Patuakhali, Barguna and Jhalakathi.

Jessore zone: Satkhira, Magura, Jhenidha, Chuadanga and Barisal.

Pabna zone: Natore, Rajshahi, Nilphamari, Naogaon, Sirajganj, Bogra and Chapai Nawabganj.

Nilphamari zone: Kurigram, Gaibandha, Pabna, Lalmonirhat, Dinajpur, Panchagarh and Rangpur.

Moulvibazar zone: Sylhet, Habiganj, Comilla, Brahmanbaria and Chandpur.

Chandpur zone: Moulvibazar, Chittagong, Cox's Bazar, Bandarban and Khagrachari.

World Gymnastics Romania, Russia to the fore

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Apr 18: Romania and Russia made strong showings Wednesday night when the women's preliminaries ended at the World Gymnastics Championships, reports AP.

Gina Gogean, the defending world champion in the floor exercise, led the way for Romania, earning the top qualifying spot in the floor. She also tied for third in the balance beam with teammate Alexandra Marinescu.

Lavinia Milosivici, meanwhile, finished second in the floor exercise and fifth in the uneven bars for Romania. Teammate Simona Amanar was fifth in the vault.

Svetlana Chorkina, the defending uneven bars gold medalist, led the way for Russia as she began the defense of her title by topping the standings along with China's Xuan Liu. Both finished with a 9.825 score.

Russian Dina Kochetkova, meanwhile, topped Xuan in the beam as they finished 1-2.

"It was a good all-around effort," Gogean said.

Not too far behind, however, were the Shannon Miller-less Americans, who managed to reach the semifinals in all four events.

Amy Chow, one of several US gymnasts hoping for an Olympic team slot, qualified seventh in the vault while Jayci Phelps and Dominique Dawes advanced in the uneven bars in 13th and 14th place, respectively.

Phelps and Dawes who earned the semifinals in the balance beam while Kristy Powell finished an eye-opening fourth in the floor exercise.

Miller, the United States' most decorated gymnast, stayed home nursing several injuries in preparation for June's US Olympic trials.

Wilander in last eight

PAGET, Bermuda, Apr 18: Mats Wilander advanced to the quarterfinals of the Bermuda Open on Wednesday with a 7-6 (7-0), 6-3 win over Patrick Rafer of Australia, reports AP.

Wilander failed to convert seven break points in the first set, but dominated the tiebreaker. Rafer broke Wilander for a 3-2 lead in the second set, but the 31-year-old Swede won the next four games to close the match.

Wilander, who has won seven Grand Slam titles, will meet second-seeded Javier Frana of Argentina on Friday. Frana, a finalist in this event last year, beat Bryan Shelton 6-7 (3-7), 6-2, 6-2.

Democracy in Sports - I Polls not only remedy!

SPORTS administration in Bangladesh has always been run by bodies appointed by the National Sports Council, the sports authority in the country. The NSC in itself appointed by the government, has enforced direct government control in each and every aspect of sports which has done augmented well for the healthy development of sports in the country.

It has been the long demand of organisers and players that sports should be run by people directly concerned with and involved in it. The fight to free sports from shackles of bureaucracy has been initiated each time there has been hints of political democracy, only to be buried by self-interest and narrow political interests.

Today, with a caretaker government busy upto its neck in holding a free and fair general elections within its 90-day term, the demand for democracy in sports has been raised, curiously by the very people who have been holding posts, often multiple, in various federations, olympic committees, etc almost throughout the terms of all previous governments. Nevertheless, their concern, if not judged along

side the facilities they themselves have this far enjoyed, can be appreciated with guarded optimism.

As a matter of fact, after the BNP government came into being in 1990, the NSC, headed by the State Minister for Sports, formed ad-hoc committees in different federations projecting the ideal that persons included in such committees shall be ineligible to run office in the federation elections to be held soon. That 'soon' never came and the ad-hocists continue to hold office till date.

Let us assume that there will be elections, election commissioner, schedule, nomination, campaign, voting, results and the whole gamut that goes with it. What chances are there that persons 'in office' or those who during the past 26 years were at sometime or the other members of different federations will NOT be elected? The answer is 'very slim'. Almost everybody who is somebody now or who was someone someday will fill the posts of the different federations should there be an election.

So, what will be the difference? Today, they are nomi-

nated, tomorrow they will perhaps be elected. That's all! There will be no new input of ideas, there will be no fresh thoughts; for if they were capable of doing so, the fact that they were nominated, and not elected, should not have stopped them. It may do our sports arena a whole lot of good if each of us remember that it is not the post which makes a person, rather a person makes a given position important.

If our present sports organisers are sincere to the cause of sports, and till now, I have only petty reasons to believe otherwise, they should really strive to bring people, many of whom have left the arena because of its heat and dirt, and others who in their own judgment would be able to better deliver the goods. The most erroneous and suicidal path for our sports would be to restrict the elections within personalities already involved in running it for the past several years.

The need of the hour is supreme sacrifice from the very people who love sports most, that is the people who are in office now.

At the City Club ground, Ganobhaban HS recorded a narrow one-wicket victory over Mohakhali Model High School.

Chasing 147 to win in 35 overs, Ganobhaban lost nine wickets before reaching the winning mark in the 34th over with opener Ibrahim Khalil scoring highest 28 runs.

Earlier sent into bat, Mohakhali Model HS were bundled out for 146 in 34 overs.

At the Residential Model School (RMS) ground, Armanitola handed Jurain Ashraf Master High School a two-wicket defeat.

Winning the toss Armanitola opted to use the pitch first and restricted Jurain for only 102 in 27.2 overs.

In reply, the winners took only 20 overs to reach the target conceding eight wickets with Masud hammering 23 off 29 balls.

In the remaining match at west ground of RMS, Segun Bagicha High School beat BC-SIR High School by 23 runs.

Sent into bat, the winners piled up a huge 202 in 34.3 overs after losing all the wickets. Opener Raju Roy hammered 87 off 80 deliveries while Monir added 43 to Segun Bagicha account.
