the meeting but his Bangladesh counterpart when asked, had replied that it was likely to be held within the next two months, in August last.

It is, however, learnt reliably that both New Delhi and Dhaka in the subsequent months had failed to come up with an agreed date for the re-convening of the meeting of the JRC. It is also learnt that the Indian side had come up separately with two sets of dates while Bangladesh had put forward one set of dates for the proposed JRC meeting.

Officials in the Bangladesh foreign ministry, on condition of anonymity, said that Dhaka could not agree to the two sets of dates given by Delhi and the latter could not accommodate the one set of dates given by Dhaka and for this it was not possible to hold a meeting of the JRC. In reality it was "domestic political compulsions on both sides which prevented the holding of the JRC meet," one official noted.

It was then stated by a top official of the foreign ministry that "bringing the Indians to the negotiating table was an arduous task and we intend to move from here."

Later, former foreign minister Mostafizur Rahman, when asked about the fate talks told newsmen in early December that both countries have elections round the corner and it was not possible to arrange any meeting.

Officials of the JRC said that they did not receive any data from the Indian side for a long time and due to lack of a joint

monitoring system it was impossible to estimate the actual quantum of water being released from the other side.

"Although it was impossible to reconcile the figures, the difference would not be much," added one official.

Besides, it is also learnt that the bulk of water coming during the peak of the lean season is due to seepages and not any actual release.

The last Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the two countries, effective till 1988, stipulated that Bangladesh was to receive 34,500 cusecs of water at the lowest. The normal flow of water at the Hardinge Bridge during the lean period was 74,000 cusecs before the commissioning of the Farakka Barrage in 1974.

Dhaka Nancy Powell. The survey had a total of 27 respondents, and its results were presented by the Forum's Executive Secretary A Gafur.

Asked about the inflation rate in 1996, almost half of the respondents felt it would be between five and eight per cent. About two-thirds of the form members believe that the exchange rate will be in the range of Tk 40 to 43 for one US dollar, which is a little different from the existing level, a change of not more than five per cent.

Asked about the greatest problems they had encountered, most of respondents referred to hartals.

About law and order, more than 90 per cent said that it had a negative impact. "With respect to the operation of labour unions, 40 per cent reported negative impact. The degree of negative impact of unions on the ABEF members is higher than the results from the similar surveys of the entire manufacturing sector," the survey noted.

The members of the Forum found the port and the Railway unsatisfactory. On electricity supply most felt it was acceptable but some were not satisfied.

"What is clear is that the opinion on the infrastructure is not favourable. This is not the type of response that one wants if foreign investment is sought or if the economy is trying to grow rapidly," the survey noted.

Workers threaten to gherao BGMEA office Apr 27

Garments workers have threatened to gherao the BGMEA office on April 27 unless their demands for payment of salaries and Eid-bonuses are met by tomorrow, says a press release.

Leaders of the "Combined Garments Workers Front (CGWF)" at a meeting in the city yesterday said that unless the country's 12 lakh garments workers were paid their arrears this month's salary and Eid-bonus by April 26 they would gherao the BGMEA office at Kawan Bazar the next day.

The leaders of the CGWF alleged that the owners of the factories have not been paying the salaries of the workers for the last 4 months, causing them innumerable suffering.

British navy ship in Ctg

eliminating the 'low-priority projects'.

For accelerating implementation of the existing ADP, the WB also advised the government to continue administrative actions including approval of project proposals and technical assistance proposals.

The Bank also urged the caretaker government to take appropriate measures for 'preventing new bad loans' to maintain discipline in the financial sector. The Bank suggested review of all recent loans sanctioned by nationalised commercial banks.

On food situation, the multilateral donor agency said the government should assess the extent of food shortage, resulting from short supply of fertiliser and fuel and take immediate steps to ensure adequate supply of those agricultural inputs.

Regarding privatisation, the Bank urged the government to give necessary instruction to the Privatisation Board to complete the technical aspects of projects for privatisation by the next government.

Parliament to probe charges against Tansu Ciller

ANKARA, Apr 24: The Turkish parliament today decided to open an inquiry against former Prime Minister Tansu Ciller, who has been accused by Islamic politicians of corruption in the privatisation of a state-run company, reports AFP.

UN offer to train Bangladesh polls officials

The Secretary General of the United Nations is closely watching the political developments in Bangladesh, UNDP Resident Representative in Dhaka Eimi Watanabe said yesterday reports UNB.

Watanabe, while meeting Chief Adviser Muhammad Habibur Rahman at his office, also mentioned the interest of the United Nations to support the electoral process in Bangladesh.

She also apprised the Chief Adviser of the offer from the world body to train the electoral officials and support the election mechanism in the country.

The UN would also support the government in facilitating the free movement of international polls observers during the forthcoming election, Watanabe said.

The Chief Adviser welcomed the proposals.

Earlier, the UNDP resident representative congratulated the Chief Adviser on his assumption of the office.

Launch dacoity at Homna

NARYANGANJ, Apr 24: Dacoits looted gold, money and other valuables worth Tk 10 lakh from the passengers of a Narayanganj bound launch at Homna of Chandpur on Tuesday.

The launch, ML Ratchi, according to passengers, left Ramchandrapur for Narayanganj. Shortly afterwards, a group of 15 to 20 dacoits disguised as passengers attacked the other passengers. During the robbery they snatched two rifles from the Ansar personnel and started attacking the passengers with rifles, axes and other arms. At least 35 passengers were injured.

Ten of the injured have been admitted to the Sonargon health complex. The condition of one Atindra Nath was said to be critical.
