Tribulations of Parents at School Premises

Children of schools in the nearest footpath under the lower classes in the city. in shade of trees, while others most cases, are required to be seek out other suitable shelescorted to their schools and ters nearby back home. This sometimes creates a problem. In this situ-

This daily routine, except on holidays, goes on interminably. To break the monotony of their vigil, some of the waiting mothers or their representatives are found to display resourcefulness. They spread out plastic sheets and taking their places thereon, engage themselves in end endless sessions of gossiping on all subjects under the sun. Some others come equipped with pocket radios or flasks of tea or other drinks to while away the time of waiting. An atmosphere of bonhomie develops among the waiting members of the same sex, irrespective of considerations of their age. education or social backgrounds.

The dark side of the situation emerges during inclement weather. Driving rain or gusty winds send them to the neartest places of refuge. When the inclement weather conditions remain for short spells, it may seem pleasant that exiting to the waiting groups but when the duration of such un favourable conditions becomes longer, they along with their wards suffer.

Talks with some mothers

who regularly do such vigils reveal tales of silent suffering under adverse conditions. Mrs. Baker is a resident of Mirpur. Her daughter is a student of a lower class of a good school in the Dhanmondi Residential Area. At present, in view of inordinate competition for admission in a good school, it was considered as a stroke of good luck when her daughter qualified for admission in her present school, even though it was situated some miles away from her place of residence. As the girl is of tender age, she can't be left alone, without escort, to go to her school and

come back. Her mother, therefore, bears with fortitude the daily grind of taking her daughter to school. Because of the distance and the high cost of conveyance involved, she cannot afford multiple trips to and from her daughter's school Hence the need for her to keep vigil outside the school precincts till the end of the school hours of her daughter. A similar story was told by one Mrs. Alim who lives at Khilgaon. She comes with her minor son reading at a school at Nilkhet

School buses are nowadays operated by some school authorities. That provides some sense of security to the guardians of the students using such bus service. But that system is limited in use. Hence the worry of guardians for their minor school going wards is understandable.

Lately, a crop of private schools, particularly so-called kindergarten schools for small children have come up in most localities. But, regrettably, in most cases such schools are housed within limited space which precludes the provision of facility for the guardians who are required to wait for their wards. It is however, felt by observers that the schools in the city, both in the public and private sectors should given serious consider ation to the question of provision of facility for waiting guardians. At present it is seen that some schools provide some benches under the open sky outside the school premises for the waiting guardians in the midst of a crowd of waiting rickshaws and cars. Such practice does not seem to be in good taste and certainly not conducive to the dignity of the waiting guardians, most of whom belong to the fair sex.

A foreign bank had borrowed from the central bank against its foreign exchange deposit in the recent past. But it was also discontinued since many banks lined up in the same queue, they mentioned.

Banks have virtually stopped sanctioning any new loans since cost of fund became too high because they had to bor row from inter-bank at rates much higher than lending rates. Some of the foreign banks even deterred disbursement against commitment, one source said.

"Why should I lend a company, even the best one, at the rate of 12 per cent while borrowing from the call market at 20 per cent or above," said an executive banker of a private bank on condition of anonymity.

Many bankers suggested that the central bank should change its strategy in overseeing the operations of the banking system. They now feel that the central bank should be more active in the market to ease the situation by intervening even through government owned banks.

They complained that the central bank does not allow any bank to temporarily overdraw their accounts with it even with a penal interest, which it used to do in the past Bangladesh Bank even does not allow banks to issue any cheques or make payments against any remittance through

its branches. The commercial banks are not allowed to make any payment to another bank against any anticipated receipts even with same day value, they said.

The bankers were of the view that the central bank should allow banks to overdraw their accounts up to a certain level which may be predetermined. To ease the market they can consider allowing rediscount facilities to the nationalised commercial banks so that all banks do not seek the facility at the same time and crisis does not crop up

"The long-term opportunities of the UR notwithstanding, some of its agreements pose a number of potential problems for LDCs in the short term, including preference erosion, tariff escalation and higher food-import costs."

The fact that increased competition in global markets poses dangers for LDC economies reflects the very weak supply of capacities in these countries, says the UNCTAD 1996 Report, the 12th such issue focusing on the key development issues confronting the LDCs.

As it is pinpointing the opportunities and dangers of increased global integration in the post GATT-era, the UNC-TAD observes a more significant policy response from the LDCs to the globalization pro-

The report says, globalization has boosted the premium on good economy policies and exacerbated the repercussions of inappropriate policies, as evidenced by Mexico's financial crisis in late 1994.

The increasingly competitive nature of the world economy, it says, has diminished the latitude that governments may have once had to pursue inappropriate policies, such as overvalued exchange rates. without inflicting serious damage on their economies.

And now, the focus of economic policies is increasingly shifting away from direct government intervention in markets and participation in production and trade, towards the creation of enabling environment for the private sector and efficient operation of market economy, the UNCTAD

70 lakh children under 14 engaged in jobs

About 70 lakh Bangladeshi children, nearly one fifth of the population under 14, are engaged in a variety of jobs ranging from agricultural farms to chemical factories in violation of both national and inter national conventions, a team advocating children's right claimed in Dhaka yesterday, reports BSS.

Leaders of the Liaison Committee for Workers international, the advocacy group told a press conference that around 30 per cent of these child labourers are employed in several hazardous obs like welding, vehicle repair and match factories.

Tofazzal Hussain, a trade union leader and bureau mem ber of the committee, called for creating greater public awareness about the health hazards of the children - who are being deprived of their childhood due to the exploitation of heartless greedy entrepreneurs.

He said had the parents of these children been employed there would have been no need for them to look for job at a time when they should be in schools. He regretted that large number of boys and girls leave schools before finishing primary level to take up job for their livelihood.

Hussain said the factory owners and entrepreneurs employ children because they can earn maximum profit from child labour. It is easy to cheat children and get them do difficult job without much com-

Bonus for garments workers demanded

The Bangladesh Garments Workers and Employers Federation (BGWAEF) has warned that non-payment of Eid bonus and other dues to garments workers will have serious consequences on the country's lucrative ready-made garments industry, says a press

At a meeting of its members yesterday in the city, the Federation's president, Abul Hossain said that the workers have been facing hardships due to non-payment of wages in some garments factories for the last three months.

He urged factory owners to settle the workers dues, including Eid bonuses, immediately to avoid a labour unrest which will greatly harm garments production and exports.

Hossain called upon the government and banks to bailout small and medium-sized garments units through soft oans.

The Federation president also accused some political parties of being indifferent to the workers' plight, saying that the workers were in dire straits today because they had responded to the call of those parties during recent political movements.
