### Heading for a Sonic Boom?

There has yet to be a greater measure of industrialisation and urbanisation before Dhaka may be labelled as a danger zone as regards sound pollution. Yet there is enough clutter and din to distract a man from less than mere meditation or serious preoccupation. Sitting in shops, offices and residential flats, one is invaded by the sound of constantly honking cars. Along with the restless cars are the chugging, puffing and panting vans, buses, lorries and rows of rickshaws. It is bad enough that there is pressing and pushing for space on the road but when the overloaded and steaming buses trundle along for room, the milling and the din of the daily pandemonium on the roads become a series of ear-splitting noises.

Along with the baffling and overwhelming noise of the traffic on the roads and lanes, there are the sounds emanating from the customers on the roadside who throng the marketplaces with their wives and children. Chatting and buying or window shopping at a frenzied pace these buyers naturally lend to the ensuring din and bustle among the stalls in the emporiums and market places. Calculating prices, evaluating the worth of the commodities, the people with their various bargaining power add to the engulfing din.

It is perhaps noise more than anything else that puts aside the white and blue clouds and soft, green grass in Dhaka and brings to notice the condition of the lichen shopping places and workshops. Compared to other cosmopolitan cities, Dhaka is a small one with some areas of billowy velvet green. However, looking at the gloomy faces of the bus drivers, watching the sullen faces of the rickshaw pullers, and judging from the sad and confused fronts of many sniffling beggars on the waysides, near traffic lights, and places like the entries to New Market and Gousia, one would conclude that there is no idyll.



To the noise of the mini fleet of rickshaws and pushcarts, and the occasional beeping and crying of the motor horn, is the steady voice of the whistling traffic police at the central crossroads. While the signals and spoken instructions of the police are carried out, the vendors conveniently shout out their wares. Thus the flower sellers and hawkers with armload of magazines are there to add to the overwhelming sounds. Beggars with their skinny tanned limbs pot-bellies and jug ears

can add to the sound explosion with their tales of woe and hurling of obscenities when they do not get the expected coins or one-taka notes. The process of building construction with cement, bricks, and iron rods too are an addition in the perpetual pouring forth of sounds in to the environment. The expansion of offices are routine methods of existence and the ensuring loud work in progress can hardly ever be toned down. Like the roads being dug, and the water or electricity supply line being carried to various parts

of the city, amidst much hue and cry, the addition of stories to the already sandwiched and squashed blocks of commercial and residential houses all end in further spilling of the noise boom.

Domestic peace is shattered by high-decibel Hindi and rock music played at cassette players and indiscreet use of loud-speakers and mikes in every neighbourhood.

Added to this is the noise attached to every house, with the 'lady of the manor' giving instructions for dusting, cleaning, washing, cooking. The handful of maid servants, boy servants and children in these households contribute to the accumulation of sounds. The pet dog barking, the murr-ualla crying out his wares at the gate add to the commotion.

Dhaka has yet to develop in many directions as a city. One wonders what the ensuing noise pollution will be like, in say, another ten years.

### Weather

#### Rain at few places likely

Rain or thundershower accompanied by temporary gusty or squally wind is likely at a few places over Chittagong, Barisal, Dhaka and Sylhet divisions and at one or two places over Rajshahi and Khulna divisions in the next 12 hours till 6 pm today, reports UNB.

Met Office says day temperature may remain nearly unchanged across the country.

In its outlook for subsequent two days Met Office predicted little change. Giving extended outlook for another five days weathermen forecast rise in day temperature.

Meantime, Rangamati experienced the highest 98 mm rain in the last 36 hours till 6 pm today. Kheupara had 60 mm rain, Chittagong 49, Sitakund 45, Cox's Bazar 41, Teknaf 33, Bhola 28 and Feni 22 mm shower during the period.

Country's highest temperature 37.0 degrees Celsius was recorded at Rajshahi and the lowest 21.3 degrees at Kheupara.

The sun sets today at 6:31 pm and rises tomorrow at 5:22 am.
