40000 troops to be deployed : CA Nothing going to jolt chances of fair polls

Chief Adviser Muhammad Habibur Rahman has categorically dismissed apprehensions that troubles might affect the coming parliamentary elections, reports UNB.

The caretaker government would nip in the bud any trouble threatening to erupt either before or after the elections, the Chief Adviser said.

He was talking to members of the Overseas Correspondents Association in Bangladesh (OCAAB) at his office yesterday morning.

All political parties are promise bound to cooperate with my government in holding a free and fair poll," Habib said.

About neutrality of the caretaker administration, the Chief Adviser said that neutrality of his government had been questioned by all parties. "There is legal mechanism and an aggrieved person should

follow the rules", he said.

He informed that some 40,000 armed forces personnel would be deployed along with law enforcing agencies to maintain law and order during the June 12 election.

About 4,000 unauthorised arms were recovered and 40,000 illegal arms possessors and trouble makers were arrested for peaceful holding of the polls, he said.

The whole country is now set for the election, the Chief Adviser said and warned that he would nip in the bud any trouble threatening to erupt either before or after the election.

All executives starting from the President down to a government functionary to the lowest level are assisting the government for conducting the polls, he said.

The Election Commission, the Chief Adviser said, is work-

ing with a group of dedicated people to hold a free, fair and neutral election.

Regarding adverse impact on the election of the report of an enquiry committee, probing into the May 20 incident in the army, which press reports indicated might be placed before the President today, Habib hoped that "nothing of that sort which would jolt chances of a fair polls would happen."

The incidents are still under enquiry and it would be a pre-committal report, he said and hoped that appeal of the former Army Chief's mother for a fair trial will be considered. "She has done what a mother is expected to do," he said.

Lt Gen (Retd) A S M Nasim's mother on Monday called for a high powered judicial committee headed by a Supreme Court judge to probe

Economy will be self-reliant within 5 years: Hasina

BARISAL, June 4: Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina today said if voted to power, her party will make the national economy self-reliant.

"Awami League had re-built the war-ravaged economy in three and a half years after independence and if we get a chance, we will make the economy self-reliant within five years," Hasina said at a huge public meeting at the Bangabandhu Uddyan in the town.

"Nothing has been done for the farmers, workers, students and the common man in the last 21 years," she claimed. Those who were in power only made promises but in reality revised fertiliser prices, closed down mills and factories and enhanced taxes," the AL chief said.

Hasina reiterated her party's pledge to give subsidy to agriculture, make female education free up to HSC level, remove illiteracy and develop the economy by adopting appropriate investment-friendly policies. Local bodies will be strengthened and run by people's representative, she said adding this will help solve local problems.

"Did they solve any of the national problems? she posed the question without naming any party.

Awami League had realised 44 thousand cuses of Ganges water for the country but the Padma-Jamuna have now dried up, she said.

On her first day of a three-day electioneering tour to

southern districts the Awami League chief addressed rallies and public meetings at Babuganj, Barisal, Jhalakathi, Rajapur, Kathalia, Bhandaria and Pirajpur.

Heavy downpour delayed Hasina's arrival at most of her meetings. But she sought apology for her unwilling delay, due to bad weather. "You have bourn me by a debt of gratitude to you, I'll certainly pay back your love, if necessary I'll sacrifice my life to bring peace to you," she said.

She claimed that the percentage of people living under the poverty line rose to 86 per cent from 49 per cent after 1975. The number of unemployed people jumped to 30 per cent from 15 per cent while landless to 70 per cent from 39 per cent, she added.

The AL chief introduced the party candidates including Abdul Hasnat Abdullah (Bakerganj-1), Syed Manirul Huq (BK-2), Abdul Bari (BK-3), Mohiuddin Ahmed (BK-4), Mahbubuddin Ahmed (BK-5), Syed Masud Reza (BK-6), Mainul Huq (Bakerganj-Pirajpur), and Sudhansu Shekhar Haldar (Pirajpur).

PPRC opinion poll

Sixty-eight per cent of respondents in a countrywide opinion poll have expressed their overwhelming confidence that the June 12 parliamentary election would be fair and neutral.

Only six per cent of them feared that the polls would not be fair and neutral while 26 per cent saw a 50 per cent possibility of fair and neutral election.

The survey released yesterday was conducted by the Power and Participation Research Centre (PPRC). It covered a sample size of 6,607 persons selected at random from 64 constituencies of rural, urban and metropolitan areas, spreading across 20 greater districts.

Compared to the 1991 election, the BNP would lose: 5.4 per cent while the Awami

League would gain 3.5 per cent, the Jatiya Party one per cent and the Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) 0.5 per cent in vote share of 97 decided voters.

In the urban vote share, the BNP would lose eight per cent while the AL would gain 3.8 per cent, the JP and JI 2.5 per cent respectively.

In rural areas, the BNP and JP would lose 2.5 per cent and 0.5 per cent respectively while the AL and the JI would gain 3.1 per cent and 0.2 per cent respectively.

As of end May 1996, the BNP would bag 29 per cent of votes while 31 per cent respondents of the survey would vote for AL, 12 per cent for JP and six per cent for JI. Some 17 per cent of the respondents were yet to decide while five per cent would vote for

Refrain from making illogical comments: ISPR

Inter-Services Public Relations yesterday urged all patriotic citizens to desist from creating unnecessary debates and making illogical comments on the recent happenings in the army without an understanding of the army rules, reports BSS.

The ISPR said statements by different quarters, news and write-ups are being published these days on the recent undesirable happenings in the army and the Court of Enquiry formed to probe the matter. Many of the statements and articles on the matter might create misunderstanding in the public mind, ISPR said, adding it is not unnatural that these might also have impact on the army.

The ISPR statement said in the interest of national independence and sovereignty, all responsible citizens should refrain from making any statement or comment which might create division or disunity in the army which is the symbol of our national unity.

The ISPR said no patriotic citizens could accept any activity of any quarter against national security, sovereignty and constitutional structure. Nobody should have any objection to legal actions against anyone violating of rules and

People want to see the BNP back in power: Khaleda

COMILLA, June 4: Former Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia is hopeful about her party's return to power in a resounding victory in June 12 election as people like the BNP for its commitment to democracy and development, reports UNB.

"People want to see the BNP back in power because they are getting the benefits of my party's politics of development and production," she said addressing a series of huge public meetings and way-side gatherings in different parts of Comilla district.

"Inshallah, BNP will again go to power in the June 12 parliamentary polls. There is now an unprecedented wave in favour of Sheaf of Paddy throughout the country," Begum Zia said.

During her day-night electioneering in Comilla and Chandpur districts, the BNP chairperson told the people that only her party was committed to protecting the country's independence and sovereignty and called upon them to help the BNP perform that task by giving mandate in the coming election.

Begum Zia said vested quarters had attempted to

jeopardise democracy in the country, but her party with the help of people foiled the bid.

"We have not given in to any conspiracy, we are going ahead upholding the banner of democracy by smashing all machinations," she said.

Rescheduling of Beximco loan: HC rule on BB, IFIC bank

The High Court on Monday issued a rule nisi against the Bangladesh Bank, IFIC Bank and others on rescheduling of loan liabilities of over Tk 118 crore in 112 accounts by Salim Rahman and Sohail Rahman of the Beximco Group, reports UNB.

Issuing the rule, the court asked the respondents to show cause within two weeks why the Bangladesh Bank order dated April 4, 1996 approving the loan rescheduling shall not be declared to be without lawful authority and of no legal effect.

The rule was issued by the HC division bench comprising Justice Md Mozammel Hoque and Justice Md Abdul Matin on two separate writ petition filed by two shareholders of IFIC Bank.

The petitioners alleged that Salim Rahman, a former director of IFIC Bank, his brother Sohail Rahman, vice-chairman of IFIC Bank, and

9 killed, 32 injured in road accidents

Nine persons were killed and 32 others injured in road accidents in Feni and Jhenidah yesterday.

According to UNB, five members of a bridal party died and 10 others sustained injuries in a head-on collision between a microbus and a coaster at Kasba on Feni bypass road yesterday.

Police said the Chittagong-bound microbus carrying the bridal party from Comilla met with the accident at 11 am.

The dead were identified as Moli Basak, 62, Shishir Pal 62, Ashish Ray Chowdhury, 50, Kartik 60, and the driver of the microbus.

Correspondent reports: Jhenidah. At least two persons were killed and seven others injured in a head-on collision between a truck and a tempo on the Magura-Jhenidah highway at Hat Gopalpur at around 9 pm.

The dead, passengers of the ill-fated tempo, have been identified as Modhu, 40 and Sadar Ali, 60. The injured have been admitted to the Sadar hospital.

The driver of the truck fled the scene. The truck (Dhaka Metro-Na-8125) was seized by police.

In another accident at Jhenidah two persons, including a woman, were killed and 15 others injured when a night coach of Uttara Paribahan plunged into a roadside ditch near Chutulia on the Jessore-Jhenidah highway at about 4.15 am yesterday.

According to police the driver of the Darsana bound coach (Dhaka-Ja-3816) lost control of the vehicle. One Anwar Hossain, 45, died on the spot while one Ratna, 48, succumbed to her injuries at the Jhenidah sadar hospital. Ten injured persons were rushed to the same hospitals while five others were given first aid.

A day-long visit to Dhaka-8 All seek vote with 'sweet words'

With only one week left for the parliamentary polls, electioneering in Dhaka-8 constituency, of the city, Lalbagh thana area has reached a new height.

Candidates from different political parties were seen doing hectic campaigns to win the hearts of voters.

Nine candidates are vying from the constituency. Awami League nominee Haji Md Selim and BNP nominee Barrister Abul Hasnat are likely to have a tough fight here.

Two other powerful candidates from the Dhaka-8 seat are Saifuddin Ahmed Milon of Jatiya Party and Sabir Ahmed of Jamaat-e-Islami. The others in the race are: AH Shahabuddin of NAP; Zakir Hussain Khan of Zaker Party; Kamal Naser Chowdhury of Islami

Oukya Jote; Sheikh Rashid Mahmud of JSD (Robi); and Md Rashidul Islam of Muslim League.

Black and white posters of the contestants from major political parties covered the walls in the area. Catch words in these posters highlight the objectives of different candidates.

While Abul Hasnat, a former mayor of the city, pledges 'development of the area', his rival Haji Selim is seeking votes promising peace and end to terrorism. The JP nominee is trying hard to draw voters' sympathy playing the 'Ershad card' while the Jamaat candidate speaks loudly about providing jobs to unemployed youths.

Meanwhile, feelings of frustration were noticed by this

correspondent during talks with many educated voters in the locality yesterday. They said all candidates were speaking sweet words to them but some of the candidates were not even committed to their respective party ideologies.

In this regard, they referred to the change of party affiliations by the candidates of two major parties and said this was not good for the growth of healthy democracy.

Voters in the area are giving second thoughts before deciding whom to vote for as none of the two candidates from the two major parties contested from this constituency in the past. In the 1991 elections, BNP nominee Lt Gen (rtd) Mir Shaukat Ali had defeated AL
