#### BCL leader held in Kishoreganj

## Distribution of ballot papers completed 3 parties vie for all JS seats, 33 for one each

Only three political parties out of the 81 contesting the June 12 parliamentary elections have fielded candidates in all the 300 constituencies while 33 parties are in the race with only one candidate each, according to an Election Commission fact sheet available yesterday.

The three parties are the BNP, Awami League and Jamaat-e-Islami, followed by Jatiya Party (JP) with 293 candidates.

Ten parties have only two candidates each, 14 have 30 candidates each and nine other parties nominated 50 or more to join the fray.

Zaker Party comes next to the JP with 241 contestants while Islami Oikya Jote (IOJ) has 165 and Gano Forum has

104 candidates.

A total of 281 independent candidates with 19 election symbols are also in the race.

There are 2,574 candidates in the race, 48 of them women, the fact sheet said.

Among the four major political parties, only Jamaat has not nominated any female candidate.

In all 118 political parties were allocated polls symbols by the Election Commission.

Thirty-seven parties failed to field any candidate and dropped out of the race.

According to the EC, there are 56,716,935 registered voters in the country.

Of the total, 28,759,994 are male and 27,956,941 are female voters.

Meanwhile, preparations for holding the polls are nearing completion. The EC has completed distribution of ballot papers throughout the country yesterday.

Electioneering ends at Monday midnight.

Meanwhile, UNB adds: The Election Commission yesterday completed distribution of ballot papers by handing over ballots to the representatives of nine nearest districts, including Dhaka.

With this, EC officials said, despatch of all election materials has come to an end as the nation goes in to polls on June 12.

Other election materials, including ballot boxes, were sent to the districts last

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## 25.5 m infected by HIV virus

PARIS, June 7: More than 25.5 million adults have been infected by the HIV virus since AIDS was discovered 15 years ago, and 4.5 million have died from the illness, the latest UN figures indicate, reports AFP.

"Currently, 21 million adults (aged 15 through 49) are living with HIV and AIDS," said UNAIDS, the Joint United Nations programme on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and the virus that brings it on.

Forty-two per cent of the victims are women "and this proportion is growing," it added, puncturing AIDS' lingering reputation in some parts of the world as a "gay plague" that mainly afflicts promiscuous whites.

The latest data puts the total number of AIDS victims among adults and children since the late 1970s at more than seven million, taking into account reporting delays, incomplete reporting, under-diagnosis and lack of access to

## Polling in centres can be postponed for bad weather

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Mohammad Abu Hena said: polling would be postponed in centres which would be adversely affected by inclement weather on June 12, reports UNB.

According to him, polling will resume in those centres on dates to be announced by the Election Commission later on.

Talking to the state-owned Bangladesh Television, the CEC, however, made it clear that election schedule would not be changed in case of minor changes in weather.

"I hope voters will turn up at polling centres with umbrellas on their heads in the event of rains," he said.

BTV telecast the interview with Abu Hena after Bangla news bulletin last night (Friday night) wherein the CEC listed issues on which he gave vent to his mind.

The issues include recovery of illegal arms, use of black money, political parties' adherence to election code of

conduct, deployment of armed forces, voters list and preparations for the poll taken by the Election Commission.

Abu Hena said if any candidate was found to spend more than three lakh taka allowed by the Election Commission for expenses during the poll, he would be penalised a minimum of two years and maximum of seven years imprisonment with fine.

"No one guilty of expenses in excess of stipulated amount can avoid this penal measure," the CEC said.

Of the arrested, 1,378 were held for possessing illegal arms. 26,842 were picked up as they were running away from previous warrants while 14,048 were arrested on other charges and under the Special Powers Act, the official added.

The Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) had earlier said that on an average some 2,500 firearms are recovered in the country annually, but the recovery within the last two months was quite satisfactory.

## 4123 firearms recovered, 42266 held

The on-going illegal arms recovery drive across the country has succeeded in recovering 4,123 firearms, huge quantity of ammunition and explosives while 42,266 persons were arrested, according to a top official of the Election Commission.

He said that between April 1 and June 6 some 9,196 rounds of ammunition, 4,884 cartridges and 10,039 explosives were recovered.

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## Rail link with Sylhet restored

SYLHET, June 7: The train communication of Sylhet with rest of the country has been restored at 7:30 am today after remaining snarled for about 17 hours following the derailment of 11 bogies including two oil tankers of a goods train at Ponairchak near Shibbari, about 400 yards from the Sylhet railway station.

Official sources said, the goods train 'SSF-1 UP' was on its way to Sylhet from Akhaura and met with the accident at 2:30 pm yesterday. Eleven bogies out of 37 in the train were derailed. Of these, two oil tankers carrying kerosine oil were cracked.

Almost the full quantity of oil was leaked out. However, the extent of loss is yet to be ascertained. A number of local people were found looting goods like rice, kerosine and other commodities from the wagons and tankers derailed in the accident.

Policeman killed while rescuing kidnapped couple

did not believe in pro-people politics, she called upon the people to involve themselves in the politics of development, rejecting the politics which cannot bring welfare to them.

"You have to determine whether the country will proceed towards development and progress or destruction and anarchy," she said and urged the people to vote for "sheaf of paddy" the election symbol of the BNP.

"People are the strength of BNP's politics," she said, adding that BNP took over

power through a democratic and constitutional process, not in a hidden way.

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## 25-yr treaty with Bangladesh

## 'Most Indian parties favour renewal'

An expert on South Asian politics feels that most of the Indian political parties like to see the 25-year Indo-Bangladesh Treaty of Friendship renewed.

In an interview with The Daily Star Dr Sumit Ganguly, Professor of Political Science at Hunter College and the Graduate School of the City University of New York, said the sentiment in Indian political circles is that the treaty should be renewed but perhaps the terms should be re-examined.

Dr Ganguly, who also taught at the Columbia University and has published a book on the insurgency in Kashmir, is now visiting Dhaka at the invitation of the United States Information Service (USIS).

When his attention was drawn to the fact that none of the major political parties in Bangladesh wanted renewal of the treaty the visiting scholar said it was his feeling that "in

the existing format the treaty had some shades of dominance than fairness."

He, however, felt that the new government in India, if it continued in office, might not insist much on its renewal.

Dwelling on Indo-Bangladesh relations, Dr Ganguly said there were two main cross-currents in Delhi's perception of relations with Bangladesh. One school of thought felt that India should have good relations with Bangladesh while the other school wanted good relations with Bangladesh but on their own terms. They felt that India as a "dominant power in the region should be feared."
