



## EURO '96 NOTEBOOK

DURHAM, Eng-land, June 12 (AP): Under-fire England were de-alt another Euro '96 blow Tuesday when reserve centre back Steve Howey dropped out of the squad after twisting an ankle while on a training run. The squad was given two days off after Saturday's disappointing 1-1 tie with

Switzerland and Howey, who was an injury doubt before the tournament, decided to maintain his fitness by going on a run near his home. "I just went into a hole and went over on my ankle," the Newcastle player said. "I went straight

down and knew instantly it was really bad "I couldn't move. I spent 15 minutes sitting in the nettles waiting for someone to help me out. Fortunately a couple came along, picked me up and helped me home," said Howey, who will be

out of action for four weeks. Because the championship has already started, England coach Terry Venables cannot call up a replacement and the loss of another center-back, along with Liverpool's Mark Wright, is a major problems for the coach.

Howey is the second player to be ruled out of Euro '96. Germany's Juergen Kohler, also a defender, was injured after only 10 minutes of his team's opening 2-0 victory over the Czech

Republic on Sunday. LONDON: Uri Geller, who found fame by claiming he could bend metal forks and spoons with just thought power, now says he can straighten out England's wilting soccer team.

The Israeli-born psychic, who now follows soccer regularly in England, has asked coach Terry Venables if he can apply how powers to motivate the team, which appears to have been hit badly by Saturday's confidence-sapping tie with Switzerland in the European Championship. Geller suggested that England could regain that confidence simply by touching the ball used in the 1966 World Cup final, when the nation won its only major title.

"I would like them all to touch it as an inspiration. If I can see the England team they will win against Scotland on Saturday." Geller said. "I want to give them a psychic boost. I will tell them to have confidence, to visualize themselves scoring a goal. They can work up their own powers.

"If I tell them to be positive and that they can win - and then if I go ahead with a demonstration in which I bend a spoon, that will amaze them." Venables said thanks but no thanks.



### Campaigners' off-the-field cerebration

NOTTINGHAM, June 12: The 16 teams taking part in Euro '96 could do worse than spend Wednesday's rest day pondering how to score goals after the first round of eight matches produced a paltry 13, reports Reuter.

Italy beat Russia 2-1 and Croatia snatched a late winner to defeat Turkey 1-0 on Tuesday as the four last teams opened their campaigns to earn the title of champion of Europe.

The Italy-Russia match generated a relative goal flood with the Liverpool crowd able to enjoy three goals in the same match for the first time in the tournament.

Pier Luigi Castraghi, chosen ahead of Juventus silver fox Fabrizio Ravanelli, scored twice to make himself leading scorer of the England finals as the only player to net a brace.

It is no surprise that Croatia top Group D but they made heavy weather in every way before beating Turkey thanks to substitute Goran Vlaovic's goal four minutes from time.

In a match played during a torrential downpour. Turkey produced the neater football but fell to a sucker punch in a swift Croatia breakaway after they had forced a corner.

France are the only other team to have won a match. their 1-0 win over Romania in Group B on Monday taking their remarkable run to 10 successive wins and 24 games without defeat

The other four matches in the tournament have all ended in draws.

#### Benson & Hedges semis heat up

LONDON, June 12: Tim Walton blasted an unbeaten 70 to rescue Northamptonshire and guide them to a Fespectable 220 for seven against Warwickshire in a rain-delayed Benson and Hedges cricket semifinal on Tuesday, reports Reuter.

The 23-year-old Walton, brought into the side for outof-form opener Alan Fordham, combined with Tony Penberthy in a Northants one-day seventh-wicket record of 108 in 17 overs after his side had slumped to 88 for six.

Play will resume at Northampton today with Warwickshire on 91 for three after 23.2 overs.

Walton, in only his eight first-class appearance, hit straight sixes of Paul Smith and Dougle Brown, whose final over cost 16 runs, his runs came from 73 balls,

Opener Richard Montgomerie's 49 single-handedly kept Northamptonshire afloat in the difficult early overs against the new ball.

### Illy's date on Tuesday

LONDON, June 12: England's chairman of selectors Ray Illingworth will face a disciplinary hearing next Tuesday over comments he made in his book "one-man committee" reports Reuter.

He had been due to meet the Test and County Cricket Board's (TCCB) disciplinary committee this Tuesday but was granted a further seven days to prepare his case.

In recent newspaper articles extracted from his book Illingworth castigated a number of England players in general and fast bowier Devon Malcolm in particular. The book is due to be published on Thursday.

Illingworth, who plans to quit his job at the end of this season, could be reprimanded fined, or even suspended by the TCCB

#### Klinsmann's denial

MACCLESFIELD, England, June 12: Germany captain and striker Juergen Klinsmann on Tuesday denied British press reports that he planned to return to English club football next season, reports Reuter.

"My future is at Bayern Munnick. I want to win the German championship and the European Cup," said the former Tottenham Hotspur forward who has been reported to be set to join Chelsea. "I have to smile about all this speculation."

Hinsmann has a major success during his 1994-95 season at premier league Tottenham before he returned to Germany at the end of the campaign.

Although he has had problems with Bayern's veteran World Cup midfielder Lothar Matthaeus this season, few in Germany believe Kilinsmann is going to leave the Bundesliga's

richest club. Klinsmann was mobbed by reporters at the Germany's European Championship training camp on Tuesday, spending half an hour answering questions in English. German and French.

The striker missed Germany's opening game against the Czech Republic on Sunday because of suspension but will return for their next Group C clash with Russia at the week-

"I was more tense in the stands than I am on the field because I couldn't influence anything," Klinsmann said of the 2-0 victory over the Czechs.

Asked what the Germans would do if they failed to come through their Euro '96 "group of death," which also includes the powerful Italians, Klinsmann said: "It would be better if we didn't fly back to Ger-

# Casiraghi's cameo debut



LIVERPOOL, England. June 12: Italy joined Germany at the top of Group C after two goals by contr-

oversial selection Pier Luigi Casiraghi secured a 2-1 victory over Russia at Anfield on Tu esday, reports AFP. The decision to leave Ju-

ventus star Fabrizio Ravanelli on the bench was vindicated in emphatic fashion as Lazio star Casiraghi struck at the start of each half to ease the pressure on the Italians. To the delight of the predominantly Italian 35,120

crowd. Casiraghi put Italy, the perennial slow starters of mafor championships into the lead after just five minutes. Ravanelli said he was bitter about his omission but not

# Croats late in the day



NOTTINGHAM. England, June 12: A stunning solo goal by sub-

stitute Goran Vlaovic four minutes from time gave Croatia a 1-0 win over Tureky in a disappointing Group D game which completed the first series of matches in Euro '96 on Tues-

Vlaovic, who replaced the bandaged Alen Boksic after 73 minutes, picked up the ball in his own half, outpaced the chasing defenders and after running fully 50 metres rounded goalkeeper Rustu Recber for the winner.

It was his fifth goal in only his eighth international and was the only memorable moment of a game which had flashes of individual skills from both teams but was largely a disappointing spectacle on a cold, rainy night in a half-filled ground.

Croatia had far more of the play and looked the more likely to score. But they rarely penetrated a Turkish defence which always seemed to have men behind the ball.

Croatia had three chances to score from back-post headers but Mario Stanic, Zvonimir Boban and Davor Suker all missed out.
