

Karpov takes the lead

MOSCOW, June 13: Veteran Russian Grand Master Anatoly Karpov won the fourth of 20 World Chess Championship games on Wednesday after his young rival, Gata Kamsky, conceded defeat, reports Reuter.

Itar-tass news agency said Kamsky, 22 and playing white, conceded defeat after 45 moves, facing inevitable losses. Karpov, 45, leads the match 2-1/2 to 1-1/2 points. It is the second defeat of Kamsky, who defeated from the Soviet Union in 1985.

The world chess federation (FIDE) title match is being played in Elista, capital of the semi-autonomous Kalmyk Republic of Russia, between the Black Sea and the Caspian Sea.

The winner needs 10.5 points — one point for a victory and half for a draw. If they are level after 40 days and 20 games, the match will continue until one of them wins another game.

Victory for either contestant will be tainted by the fact that world number one Gari Kasparov is not challenging because of a split with FIDE.

The next game will start on Friday.

Shahbaz skips Atlanta trip

ISLAMABAD, June 13: Pakistan striker Shahbaz Ahmed said he was not taking part in this month's European Hockey tour because he feared he would be held accountable if the team performed poorly.

The official news agency APP said on Wednesday, reports Reuter.

A 23-man squad left on Wednesday for the tour which is seen as a crucial warm-up to next month's Atlanta Olympics. "I had a feeling and a fear that had I gone on the tour and had the results not been favourable, the PHF (Pakistan Hockey Federation) would have accused me of conspiring and working against the interest of the national team," APP quoted him as saying in Karachi.

Ahmed's decision to miss the tour is a blow to Pakistan's preparations for the Olympics and seems to indicate that a change of management following last month's players' revolt has failed to quell discontent.

APP quoted Ahmed as saying he would play for Pakistan only if he were made captain, if the manager, coach and captain controlled team selection and if senior players K M Junaid, Asif Bajwa and goalkeeper Ahmed Alam were restored to the squad.

Ahmed, a mainstay of Pakistani junior and senior teams since 1985, said he would retire after the Atlanta Olympics.

Pakistan, bronze medalists at the 1992 Olympics, are due to play in a four-nation championship in Milton Keynes, England, from today and then in another four-nation tournament in the Netherlands from June 17.

The PHF last week named Samiullah as manager and Jahangir Butt as coach of the Pakistan team to replace the previous management removed after a players' revolt on May 24.

Rude wakening for Romario

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 13: World Cup hero Romario admitted defeat in his struggle to return to the Brazilian national soccer team in time for next month's Olympic Games, reports Reuter.

Shortly after learning that Brazilian manager Mario Zagalo had chosen strikers Bebeto and Ronaldo in his squad for an Olympic warm-up against Poland later this month, Romario conceded he would not be travelling to Atlanta.

"I really did think that, with my goals, I would get back in the national team to help them win this important trophy for Brazil," he said, referring to his 26 goals for Flamengo in this year's Rio championship.

"But now I realise that the goals were not enough," said Romario who recently signed to play for Spanish side Valencia next year.

Zagalo included Bebeto, still technically with Deportivo la Coruna although signed by Flamengo for next season, and Ronaldo of PSV Eindhoven among a list of players from non-Brazilian clubs to be included in the squad for the Poland friendly.

Stich sweats to sew up

LONDON, June 13: Michael Stich, defeated in last Sunday's French Open final, was forced to work hard on Wednesday as he scrambled through to the third round at Queen's Club after a narrow win over American Michael Joyce, reports Reuter.

Back on grass after the clay of Paris, the tall, stylish German who is still trying to work out the reasons for his failure in Paris, was fully extended for two-and-a-half sets before he finally moved up a gear to break Joyce's serve twice in the last three games for a 7-6, 6-7, 6-2 triumph.

The fifth seed was joined in the third round by the two men seeded right above him. Number three Goran Ivanisevic of Croatia blitzed Czech Martin Damm 6-2, 6-2 while fourth-seeded Wayne Ferreira of South Africa overcame Australian Scott Draper 7-6, 6-4.

Stich, the first French Open finalist to play at Queen's since 1989, admitted that he had problems focusing on his task.

"I wasn't really interested in playing tennis right now," he said after his win.

"It's not that I don't like to play, it's just that I'm still working out this thing at the French Open," he said of his 7-6, 7-5, 7-6 defeat by Russian Yevgeny Kafelnikov.

"I came here on Monday and I've had two days to understand what happened in

Paris and I still don't get it. May be someone can help me." "It's still going to take a couple of days but that's okay. I'm in the next round. I'm still here," he said.

"But now I have to prepare for Wimbledon. What I have to think about is winning one or two matches on grass. That is very important for me right now."

Stefan Edberg, the 1991 winner here, in who is playing for the last year before his retirement from the tournament grind.

The 14th-seeded Edberg defeated Australian Sadon Stolle, who had beaten him twice before 7-6, 6-3.

Ivanisevic, as occupied with the fortunes of his Croatia soccer team in Euro '96 as with his tennis, admitted he suffered through their 1-0 victory over Turkey on Tuesday night.

"I think I have a better chance of winning Wimbledon than they do of winning Euro '96. My tennis is better than their soccer right now," he said.

Ferreira had to battle to subdue Draper, falling a break behind in the opening set before immediately breaking back and taking the tie-break 8-6.

He dropped his serve again in the fifth game of second set. But, again, Ferreira broke back immediately and another break of the Australian's serve in the 10th game gave him the match.

Seventh seed Mark Woodford of Australia won 6-2, 7-6 against American Brian Macphie but there were defeats for the eighth and ninth seeds, Italian Andra Gaudenzi and last year's beaten finalist, Guy Forget of France.

Gaudenzi bowed out to compatriot Gianluca Pozzi 4-6, 7-6, 6-1 and Forget went down to Australian Pat Rafter 6-2, 7-6.

Stich, who won Wimbledon in 1991 and the Queen's event in 1993, has a natural grass-court game but he failed to fire consistently until the final three games when he broke away from the American for a popular victory.

Ivanisevic cruised past Damm in 43 minutes to set up a third-round battle with

Foes' contrasting time-out

LONDON, June 13: Russia and Bulgaria are unhappy, Italy savour their attacking luxuries, and the police breathes a sigh of relief as fans frolic instead of fighting, reports Reuter.

Such contrasting emotions marked Wednesday's rest day of Euro '96 — the first jumble-jumble European Championship that is showing signs of resembling an elephant's gestation period.

There's promise it will deliver something huge but you may have to wait a while.

Plenty of good football but not real goals — such is the story after the opening eight games.

Russia's dismay came in the wake of Tuesday's 2-1 defeat by Italy, claiming Pierluigi Casiraghi had been off-side when he scored the first goal.

Film taken by Alexander Svyatkin, the team's specialist video operator, did suggest Casiraghi was ahead of the last defender when midfielder Angelo di Livio intercepted a ball clear and passed the ball to him.

"That isn't marginally off-side. That is blatantly off-side. It's quite clear — the Italians

were handed a goal in the fifth minute of the game," said Svyatkin.

Bulgaria's squad quit their training camp near Scarborough, complaining that there was too little to do at their hotel and they spent too much time travelling.

The team will spend two nights in Stockton and then move on to Newton Aycliffe. Both towns are nearer to Newcastle where the Bulgarians play their final two group matches.

Romania's double trouble

BUCHAREST, June 13: Double world gymnastics champion Gina Gogean has appendicitis and may miss the Atlanta Olympics, the Romanian news agency Rompres said on Wednesday, reports Reuter.

It quoted coach Octavian Belu as saying Gogean, world gold medalist on the vault and floor, had undergone surgery on Wednesday and might not recover in time for the Games which open on July 19.

"(This) could seriously lower our performance at the Olympics," Belu said.

Rompres said the team's chances could be further hit as 1992 Olympic vault and floor champion Lavinia Milosivici was suffering from a sprain.

Milosivici and Gogean both helped Romania to win the European team title in Birmingham last month and world gold in Japan last year. They were the nation's best hopes for gymnastics medals in Atlanta.

Russian leaps to royal circle

MADRID, June 13: Russia's Inna Lasovskaya became only the fifth woman to leap beyond 15 metres in the triple jump on Wednesday to set a 1996 world best at an international athletics meeting, reports Reuter.

Lasovskaya dominated from the outset, jumping 14 metres in the second round and 14.85 metres in the fourth round before soaring to 15.08 metres in the final round.

The distance ranks her equal fourth on the all-time list for the event, which is headed by the Ukraine's Tessa Krevets with a leap of 15.50 metres.

Former record holders Ana Biryakova of Russia and the 1993 world champion Yamile Aldama of Cuba finished second and third respectively.

In the men's triple jump, Bermuda's Brian Wellman, the 1995 World Championship silver medalist, won with a jump of 17.15 metres in the fourth round he set the same distance as Cuba's Eliecer Urrutia, who jumped 17.70 metres in Seville last week, but took first place because of a better second jump.

Sweden's Lyudmila Enquist went to the top of this year's women's 100 metres hurdles rankings with an outstanding run of 12.52 seconds.

Enquist formerly ran for Russia as Lyudmila Narozhniko but was banned for taking steroids in 1993. She was reinstated at the end of last year after the IAAF accepted her plea that she had taken them unwittingly.

During her two-and-a-half year absence from international athletics she moved to Sweden, remarried and took Swedish nationality.

Cuba's Ana Fidelia Quirot ran the year's third-best time in the women's 800 metres with one minute 58.77 seconds.

Brits hit below the belt

ATLANTA, June 13: The British Athletics Federation has banned world champion Michael Johnson from the July 12 London Grand Prix meeting, saying it would be "demoralising" to face the American in the 400-metre race, reports Reuter.

"Our 400-metre runners don't feel that they want a competition against Michael at that time," British athletics spokesman Tony Ward said by telephone from his home in England on Wednesday.

"We've got a good squad of 400-metre runners, and they'd like to have a run-out in this meeting before they come to Atlanta... they felt that it would be a bit demoralising running against Michael at that late stage in their preparation."

Johnson's business agent Brad Hunt on Wednesday accused the British of "nationalist suppression," saying that it was the second time that Johnson had been banned from competing in Britain in the last three years.

BUCHAREST, June 13: Former 1970s tennis "bad boy" Ilie Nastase and his then Davis Cup partner Ion Tiriac announced on Wednesday that they had teamed up again to buy the ATP rights to the Romanian Open tennis tournament, reports Reuter.

Nastase, who is currently contesting the battle for mayor of Bucharest, and Tiriac have jointly taken over the rights from troubled businessman Sever Muresan.

The ATP stripped Muresan of the rights to stage the tournament — the world's sixth-largest on clay with 1.35 million dollars prize money last year — after he ran into trouble with the Romanian central bank earlier this year over "grave violations" of exchange and credit laws.

Hunt, speaking from his office in Boulder, Colorado, said Johnson had been scheduled to run the 400 metres at London, the last Grand Prix meeting before the Atlanta Olympics, where he will attempt to become the first male to win both the 200 and 400 metres at the same games.

"It's obviously an attempt by the British to perpetuate a myth that they still have good 400 metre runners," Hunt said.

"I plan to protest this kind of treatment to the IAAF. The public should be aware that the British are restricting entries in their meetings to certain athletes. It's case of nationalist suppression."

Ward said from Britain that Johnson had rejected an offer to compete in the 200-metre event in London and said he regretted the US runner's absence from the meet.

"It's a tragedy," Ward said, "because the British crowd would love to see Michael Johnson in action, but on the other hand we do have to consider the requirements of our own athletes."

Hunt said the British federation also had prevented Johnson from running in Sheffield, England, in 1994.

"An offer to run in the 200 metres was withdrawn after we began negotiating to compete against Linford Christie in the 150 metres," Hunt said.

"We were told that Michael could not run in the 150, and then they told us the invitation to compete in the 200 metres also had been withdrawn."
