

TOKYO, June 18: Japan's professional football league suffered a deficit of 74 million yen (680.000 dollars) in the year to last March, despite a record 10.27 billion ven income, the J-League secretariat

said today, report AFP. The deficit was due to low revenue from J-Leauge merchandising rights, which was also forecast to decline in the current fiscal year, the secretariat said.

The main sources of reventie were corporate sponsorships, which rose 80 million yen to 3.79 billion yen, and the sale of television rights, at 2.21

billion ven. The secretariat also estimated revenue from TV money to decline in the current year, reflecting falling TV ratings despite an increase in the number of teams from 12 to 16 in league's fourth year.

NEWCASTLE, June 18 (Reuter): Hristo Stoichkov, strutting hero of Bulgaria's forceful crusade towards a place in the Euro '96 quarter finals, is a man with a split

personality. ., One scowls, struts and gesticulates on the pitch as if tormented by demons. This man has been sent off countless times and had just as many brushes with authority

on and off the pitch. The other plays with a grace and power few can match. He charms school children with his smile, poses for the photographs and signs autographs without even a hint of



This year they have allotted us only one lakh fifty thousand taka. Do you think with this little amount of money you can run a national federation and go for numerous tournaments in a year? Nevertheless we are trying our best to uphold the standard of bodybuilding in the country. We have started a national veteran championship from 1994. This year we will try to hold the second version. This veteran tournament is
