LONDON, June 25: British bookmakers are bracing themselves for a huge payout if England with the European Championship, the biggest sports betting event in Britain, reports Reuter.

A total of about 80 million pounds (123 million dollars) will be bet on Euro '96., about five million more than was placed during the 1994 World

England's run of success had caused thousands of fans to bet on the host nation and bookmakers said they could lose about five million pounds if they won Sunday's final.

About five million pounds has been placed on Wednesday's semifinal against Germany. Most have bet on England to win in the regulation 90 minutes.

England striker Alan Shearer is not the most popular man among bookmakers. He has scored first in three games in the tournament. costing the betting industry many hundreds of thousands of

Shearer is 3-1 against to score the first goal against Germany.

One of the country's leading bookmakers quote England at evens to win the game with Germany 4-5 on. England are 2-1 to win Euro '96 with Germany and France joint favourits at 15-8. The Czech Republic are 12-1.

Among the big gets is one by a Czech fan who put 100 pounds each way at odds of 200-1 on his side winning the tournament after they lost their opening game to Germany. He stands to win 30,000 pounds.

Crazy punter

LONDON, June 25: A confident punter has backed England to win Euro '96 with a 20,000 pounds sterling (30,000 dollars) bet — the biggest wager so far on a victory for the host nation, reports Reuter.

Bookmakers said it was placed on Monday by phone at odds of 2-1, forcing them to cut England's odds to 15-8 second favourites.

NEW YORK, June 25: John Harkes and Jorge Campos soon could be the weariest men in

soccer. Harkes, a midfielder with DC United of the Major League soccer, was among 12 US national team members selected Monday to play in the inaugural MLS all-star game July 14, reports AP.

The game at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey, is the first half of a unique doubleheader. A team of FIFA all-stars will play 1994 World Cup champion Brazil in the second half. Proceeds from the game go to FIFA's youth

Harkes of Kearny, New Jersey, was the lone American selected to the FIFA World Stars foster, and will be joined by Campos as the only players to play in both games.

Campos is a Mexican goalkeeper and forward for the Los Angeles Galaxy, the only unbeaten team in the MLS (11-0). Earlier this month, he played both games of a doubleheader as Mexico tied the United States 2-2 in US Cup '96 and the Galaxy beat Tampa Bay 3-2 in a shootout.

The announcement of the two MLS squads and the FIFA team was made at a Manhattan news conference. Initial selections for the FIFA squad were made in April, with additions coming June 12.

"Americans love an all-star. and these players have certainly earned that distinction in helping the league get off to a great start," MLS commissioner Doug Logan said.

Harkes, who returned to the United States after seven years in England, leads an Eastern Conference team that also includes US national team players Jeff Agoos (DC), Mike Burns and Alexi Lalas (New England). Roy Lassiter and Steve Pittman (Tampa Bay). Brian McBride (Columbus), and Tab Ramos (New York-New Jersey).

The Western Conference team also includes Marcelo Balboa (Colorado), Robin Fraser and Cobi Jones (Los Angeles). and Eric Wynalda (San Jose).

Also selected for the FIFA squad were 1995 world player of the year George Weah, the Liberian forward who plays for AC Milan; Romario, the Brazilian World Cup star; and Juergen Klinsmann, the German forward who tore a calf muscle Sunday during the European Championships and is unlikely to play.




