The only advantage he however, enjoys is that he learns from the pulpit of a greater knowledgeability then the general learners seemingly devoid of the knowledge they specifically seek to learn. The difference is subtle though, from the viewers point of view, the two entities have their own distinctive features to be readily identified

and seen in segregation. From such an enviable position of a teacher or an instructor, the incumbent would naturally hold a position of command, which, in turn, would demand his listeners' closer attention to his learned deliberation. This is the most usual scenario observed in the classroom lecture sessions. But, exceptions are there when a teacher, rather an intelligent teacher, throws the ball to the learners court in order to induce them to open all their windows of knowledgeability even though they may not always coincide with that of the more exposed teacher. It is not unusual that such spontaneous exercise on the part of the learners illumines the otherwise dark alleys of the teacher's knowledgeability and thus enriches

not know the proper path to its exposition. The proverb goes like this:

"He who knows not, and knows not that he knows not. Is a fool — shun him: He who knows not, and

knows that he knows not.

Is ignorant — teach him; He who knows and knows not that be knows.

Is asleep — wake him; But he who knows and knows that he knows

Is a wise man - follow him." Here, the role of the teacher shall mainly confine to the people in the second and third category. And of course. he holds his own berth in the fourth and last dictum and

that's why he is a teacher. Acquiring knowledge is invariably the primary concern for any 'eligible' learner. I use the word 'eligible' because, in the context of the instructional lectures in class rooms on predetermined subject, it does not always bring in those who are willing entrants to the course. Because, very often entries to the training courses offered by the institutes, are sent whimsically by the employers. There are instances where trainees are forwarded without having any relevance to their functional activities at the work places. Plainly, such employers nominating them do not either have time to assess the relevance or are

Feigning that there is no break ostensively, the teacher punctuates his lecture with humorous anecdotes which keep the listeners briefly released and prepare them to take the second spell.

Another effective strategy

shall be to ask for personal ex-

perience of the individuals in their respective workplaces, during the intervening period between two spells of six minutes. This is in effect another way to unveil the state of comprehension of the individual and which serves as a tool the extent of to assess knowledge he/she has achieved so far. I would consider it a two-way test, both for the learner and the teacher. When the latter induces the former to talk, he can quickly measure his own clarity of expression from the inconsistent and irrelevant presentation of the learner. The teacher can thus mend the fences before he is caught off-foot by some other unpredictable learner.

It is not always good to assume the learners as being of inferior stocks. At times, the teacher faces the potentials of many a learners catching him unaware. At the onset of his · lecture a good teacher does not behove a teacher at all. Instead, he sinks himself in totality with the learners identifying himself with them with an overt plea that he is as good as others are and that he is present to learn with them. Such an attitude dispenses to the learners an air of pleasant complacency to spur their instincts and imaginative fervour. This benign gesture of the teacher eventually does the primary motivation of the learners and ensures greater participation. The barrier between the two entities is

Such a proposition is most likely to be fruitful in as much as that it helps the otherwise shy learner in transcending the boundaries of their known proficiency on the subject of learning. It is in fact, a warming up exercise that gears up the participative aspect of the session. It does also offer an opportunity to each individual learner to re-discover himself /herself.

In this context, I am tempted to allude to a very thought-provoking ancient Arabian proverb, which, among others, emphasises on rousing the one who, despite his dormant knowledgeability, does

goaded by the training institutes to send one or two nominees. However, the nominees having relevance to the subject or course contents, are the people who are the probable participants in our proposed learning process. I shall consider such group of participants as 'eligible.'

In my personal estimation. asking for total involvement of the participants in the discussion, needs some tactical effort on the part of the teacher/instructor. At the first instance, he has to create an atmosphere which shall take him closer to his listeners. He shall refrain from going direct to the subject of his lecture but shall go to it in a round about way. He shall start talking on unrelated matter go about knowing the individuals often punching witty remarks so that the air is not surcharged with the heavy materials of the subject of deliberation. A closeness between the two entities thus achieved must be sustained to the last.

And dn to the introduction of the subject — efforts should be there to make the introductory observation more precise and in a simplistic language. It must be remembered that, none listens to you raptly beyond six minutes at a stretch. This is a tested psychological aspect of human attention. After every six minutes there is an automatic break in the attention.

to fall back on your knowledge and experience on many other subjects in which he is yet to have some ideas.

Learners are potential teachers of tomorrow. So when they learn with the teacher nearby they would inevitably but silently get to heart, besides the lesson itself, the mimes and delivery styles of the teacher. This they can replicate when they make any attempt at teaching others. It is almost a universal cycle.

Teachers learn from the learners the overt process of unlearning. . The learners arrive in the class room or in front of a machine with some amount of Knowledge which they wash out in the course of learning and before long for its being unrelated and of no consequence. Parallel to un learning they learn.

For any serious and professionally sound teacher a typical learner can be a useful teacher As a matter of fact the learner serves himself as a mirror to the teacher where the latter can see the strength and depth of his own image and also locate the shortcomings that needed revamping

Practically, and as I was suggesting, that teaching and learning shall be an exercise in futility unless it is a two-way inter-action by which both the teacher and the learner meet at one point where both identify them as learners.!

The second is the date the ferociously active 71-year-old Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad has set as the year Malaysia will become industrially equal to western Europe. The huge figures 2020 are prominently displayed in

If any country is punching above its weight today, it is Malaysia. And it is not only doing so on a national economic level. Mahathir has also become internationally the most vocal of Asian leaders.

One day he is sounding off in Malta, the next in Washington; one day in Tokyo and another in London. Then he is back in Kuala Lumpur to welcome the Prime Minister of Kazakhstan for trade talks Although he once underwent a heart bypass operation, Mahathir's programme leaves younger men standing.

He is no windbag. He has important, often controversial things to say about Asia and its values, about technology, about education. He is not quite as elegantly eloquent as Singa pore's former Prime Minister. Le Kuan Yew, in his heyday, but the content is just as influen-

Some find Mahathir threat ening. He told the Pacific Basin Economic Council in Washington: "Much of Asia will no longer yield. For much of Asia is no longer weak — in material or mental terms Much of Asia will resist - in silence. Some in Asia will talk

Singapore, at Lee's insistence from the outset of his premiership at independence in 1965, has always had a reputation for clean government. It was thus something of a

shock when questions were asked about property purchases that he and his son. Deputy Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong, had made last

Those who raised the mat-

ter made no charges of impropriety, but concern arose because few things in landstarved Singapore stir people more than private ownership of residential property. Prices have soared.

The issue was about the discounts the Lees were said to have received. What followed was a remarkable exercise in openness of politicians' private affairs that other countries could emulate to their advantage.

Over two days, the Singapore Parliament and, through television, the country, heard accounts of the affair from both Lees and Goh. Many personal details were given, and, at the end, the reputations of all three men seemed to be en-Goh told the House that

when the story first broke, he felt bound to confront Lee and ask for an explanation. He admitted he felt most uncomfortable about having to do so with the father of the nation. Lee's response was typical

He said it had been the Prime Minister's duty to see him and he would not have expected him to do anything else. Goh said he was satisfied with Lee's explanation, but the country had a right to hear what had happened In an hour-long speech, de-

livered with some emotion. Lee said he had always believed in facing problems head-on. He was doing so again now.

He said the purchase of apartment blocks by him and his son were not speculations but part of family arrangements made for his wife, children and grandchildren. As a man just recovered from heart surgery, he had to look to a time when he might not be well enough to climb stairs.

The Lees had not known about any discounts since these were routinely part of such deals and included in the final price that was quoted.

One of several family details that came out was the fact that Lee had not made out a cheque for 20 years or so - his wife handled all such matters.

Lee Hsien Loong frankly related his anxieties about his children and the cancer he has suffered. He often referred in parliament to "my mother" and 'my father" in a way that he might have done in a private family chat. When they had realised discounts had been involved, the Lees had offered to pay these amounts to the Government, but Goh had refused acceptance. They had therefore decided to give the

money to charity. The all-powerful People's Action Party faces little opposition in parliament and any criticism of the Lee family quickly dissolved. No longterm harm has been done.

Goh said the purchases were "completely at arm's length and at market price" The Lees had received no spes cial favours from the devel-But Goh laid down new

ground rules for property purchases by civil servants. Ministers and other office-holders would have to ask his approval to buy real estate. They must set out the circumstances of their purchases,

explain how they were introduced to the property and declare whether they knew the developer or the seller in their official capacity. Goh said talk of the issue of

unsolicited discounts given to the Lees had shown how sensitive the public was to "pereeived privileges or advantages enjoyed by ministers who bought properties ... when the market is hot. He added: "It arises where

more Singaporeans desire and are in a position to buy private residential properties." Like the arrangement of the leaves on the trees outside, the curbs on smoking in bus queues and the elimination of litter of any form, the matter had been dealt with in the firm, disciplined way for which Singapore has become so wellknown.
