The 18th game will resume today.


Romantsev resigns



NEWPORT, Rhode Island. July 11: Top seed Byron Black of Zimbabwe survived his second consecutive three-set battle by holding off South African qualifier Robbie Koenig, 6-3, 5-7, 6-2 on Wednesday to advance to the quarter finals of the 230,000 dollars Hall of Fame tennis tournament, reports Reuter.

Black, ranked 29th in the world, did not face a break point while breaking Koenig twice in the final set of the one hour, 42 minute match.



His former wife also has the right to half his 10-room villa in Bucharest, a court in the Transylvanian city of Brasov ruled on Wednesday.



In the wake of India's 1-0 series defeat by England - and a number of poor decisions by the ICC-appointed umpires Darrell Hair of Australia and K T Francis of Sri Lanka -Azharuddin said Wednesday that the ICC should "sort out umpiring in Test cricket."

"I feel it is up to the ICC," he said. "We are not very professional in cricket, not as much as they are in other sports. The game has changed so much and one decision can make so much difference."

The ICC took the decision to allow all nine Test-playing countries to nominate two umpires for the international panel, while England, the only country with full-time professionals, is eligible to nominate

Azharuddin's criticism will not have been doused by an appalling - albeit inconsequential - action by Francis on the last day of the third Test at Trent Bridge.



Dalmiya advocate revolutionary changes which would rid Test cricket of drawn matches and argues that expansion is essential for the long-term survival of the game.

He favours a limiting of first-innings overs or using a time limit on every innings. He also proposes a World Club Championships.
