Finance minister addresses workshop

Employment generation, increasing productivity can help combat poverty

Poverty cannot be eradicated from the country without achieving economic growth through increasing productivity and creating employment.

Finance Minister S A M S Kibria made this observation at a day-long national workshop on Stimulating Growth Through Rural Non-farm Activities in Bangladesh: Review of the Experience and Search for a Policy Agenda," jointly or-ganised by the World Bank and the Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies (BIDS) at a city hotel on Wednesday.

The Finance Minister said poverty has not only been confined to the rural but also extended to the urban areas.

The condition of landless people are more vulnerable in the rural areas, Kibria said.

Chaired by BIDS Director General Abu Abdullah, the inaugural session was also addressed by the former Adviser of the Finance Ministry (under the caretaker government). Professor Wahiduddin Mahmud and Chief of the Resident Mission of the World Bank in Dhaka, Pierre Landell-Mills.

The minister said the government's main goal is to alleviate poverty for which growth and social justice should be maintained.

Prof Mahmud, in his speech, said despite its importance, rural non-farm sector has always been neglected in policy-making.

He said more than onethird of the rural labour force is engaged in rural non-farm activities. Shift of rural labour force from agriculture to nonfarm sector is contributing to preventing poverty from rising, he added.

Pointing to the low productivity of the rural sector, Prof Mahmud said, "A huge amount of credit and capital were required to breakthrough the present rural productivity." It is easy to find out backwardness in any sector but difficult to solve the problem.

The World Bank Resident Mission chief said, rural

poverty has been shifted to the urban areas during the last couple of years. Only agricultural activities can not eradicate poverty. Rural sector has to be built in such a way so that

it can employ more people.

Mills said some of the NGOs including the Grameen Bank have been contributing to help alleviate poverty.

The World Bank Mission chief suggested that the government should raise the liter. acy rate in the rural areas to help alleviate poverty.

Cities have strong political lobbies while the rural areas do not have. "So urban problems are solved earlier," he pointed

Expressing World Bank's concern. Mills said several World Bank projects are being executed in the rural areas to reduce poverty rate and raise productivity level.

Four papers were presented at the working session which was presided over by the Secretary of the Ministry of Planning Shah Md Farid.

Wahiduddin Mahmud of Dhaka University in his paper titled "Macro Evidence, the push-pull debate reconsidered." said although the Rural Non-Farm (RNF) sector could play a potentially important role in generating rural income and employment, it was not often adequately recognised due to deficiencies of the official statistics and a general lack of information regarding the rural non-farm

For an over-all growth of RNF sector, he stressed the linkages between agriculture and RNF.

Binayak Sen of BIDS said the rural non-farm income grew at a faster rate than the farm income.

Evaluating different aspects of rural non-farm sector in Bangladesh, he said that participation in RNF sector helped the income mobility of the landless and acted in the direction of moderating overall inequality in rural income distribution.

He said the sustainability of the sector and possibility of its graduation into a dynamic sector will much depend on how the technology pro-

Zaid Bakht of BIDS said the RNF sector played a dual role as it was perceived as a safety valve against rising rural unemployment and poverty caused by declining growth in agriculture.

He said although the coverage of rural Non-Farm Activities (RNA) in the official statistics has improved, considerable under reporting still persists.

year 1994-95. Scientists make diamonds from 'carbon onions'

LONDON, Aug 1: Researchers in Germany reported yesterday they had managed to create diamonds by baking small spheres of carbon known as 'carbon onions'. says Reuter.

Florian Banhajt of Stuttgart's Max Planck Institute for Metals Research and colleagues said heating the carbon onions to 700 degrees Celsius (1.300 degrees Fahrenheit) caused tiny diamonds to form in the core.

"The transformation of graphite into diamond is of considerable technical interest," they wrote in the scientific journal Nature.

"We believe that our finding of a new way to convert graphite-like carbon to diamond could lead to a new understanding of the nature of the direct graphite diamond · transition."


