Rail line to be constructed over Jamuna Bridge

Communications Minister Anwar Hossain vesterday told the Jatiya Sangsad that a rail line would be constructed over the Jamuna Bridge, reports

Replying to a question from Awami League member Mirza Azam (Jamalpur), the communications minister said a total of Tk 845.19 crore including a foreign exchange component of Tk 578.91 crore has been estimated as projected expenditure for the construction of the rail line over the Jamuna Bridge.

The rail line project is expected to be completed by 1999-2000 financial year.

Replying to a supplementary, the communications minister said that the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had dreamt of the construction of the Jamuna bridge. Former president Ziaur Rahman too dreamt of the construction of the bridge, but it was former president Hussain Mohammad Ershad who laid the foundation stone of the bridge in 1988. Unfortunately, the foundation stone of the bridge was laid again, he said.

Replying to another question from BNP member Dr Dewan Mohammad Salauddin (Dhaka), the communications minister said the government has a plan to expand the Dhaka-Aricha highway from Baliarpur to Savar bazar under the Jamuna access road project. The construction of the highway is expected to start from the next year, he added.

Replying to a supplementary from Mashiur Rahman (Jhenidah-BNP) the communications minister said a bridge project over the Rupsha river at an estimated cost of Tk 400 crore from own resources was taken up by the past BNP government and the foundation stone of the proposed bridge was also laid by the then government.

According to the Immigration Department, 74 Pakistani nationals arrived at ZIA by a PIA flight on Thursday morning. The on-duty immigration officials did not allow them to enter into the country as none of them was carrying genuine Bangladeshi passport or visa against passport of any other country.

Twenty of them, mainly women and children, were sent back to Pakistan by the return flight of PIA Thursday afternoon.

They were reportedly ar rested on their arrival a Karachi airport as the Pakistan immigration identified the Bangla speaking people as Bangladeshis.
