

Taylor skips Lanka tour

MELBOURNE, Aug 12: Australia Test captain Mark Taylor today pulled out of this month's tour to Sri Lanka to undergo surgery on a back injury, reports Reuter. Taylor aggravated his back

during recent pre-season training and will enter hospital



corrective surgery next week, the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) said in a state-

"It is in my best interests and the best interests of Australian cricket that my condition be addressed as quickly as possible." Taylor

said in the statement. "I have had a chronic back condition for a number of years but until now I have always been able to overcome the problem through treatment,"

The treatment prescribed on this occasion has so far been unsuccessful. I have been advised that the recovery time from an operation is about three weeks," added the left-

handed opener. Wicketkeeper and vice-captain lan Healy is expected to take over from Taylor for the limited-overs tournament involving hosts Sri Lanka, India and Zimbabwe. The ACB said it will announce Taylor's replace-

ment as player on Saturday. Australia have yet to commit themselves to playing in the tournament after expressing concerns about player safety in Sri Lanka, which has been fighting a civil war.

Australia refused to play in Sri Lanka during the preliminary rounds of this year's limtted-overs World Cup, because of safety fears. ACB chief executive Graham

Halbish said the board would consider the current security situation in Sri Lanka at a meeting on Friday.

Meanwhile, Sri Lanka kept faith with their World Cup winning squad for the tourna-

Arjuna Ranatunga, who led the side when they beat Taylor's men in the World Cup final in Lahore last March, is again captain of the party named by the Board of Control for Cricket in Sri Lanka.

clared. Pakistan lead 1-0 in the three-match series.

Earlier, England kept alive their faint hopes of an unlikely victory by taking five wickets before tea to have Pakistan 189 for five. Pakistan, who scored 448

in the first innings and dismissed England for 501, have a 136-run lead with one session to play, and a draw is likely, but not ensured. England dismissed openers

Saeed Anwar (22) and Shadab Kabir (2) before lunch, but a 98-run third-wicket partnership between Inzamam-ul-Haq and ljaz appeared to have put a draw beyond doubt. Inzamam scored a quickfire

65 including nine boundaries most of them pulls of cuts off the backfoot - as he combined with liaz to overhaul England's 53-run first-innings advantage

He was dismissed by topedging Andy Caddick for an easy catch at third man, making it 132 for three.

Salim Malik came to the crease and added just six runs before lofting Caddick to midon. It was enough to take his Test-run tally over 5000 runs. but Pakistan was 142 for four with a lead of only 89 runs.

On Sunday. Nick Knight converted his overnight halfcentury into his first Test century as England overhauled Pakistan's first-innings 448 before tea on the fourth day.

Knight's 113 helped England move from 373 for five to 473 for nine before rain forced the players off the field A 30-run last-wicket stand

Cork and Alan Mullally took England to 501 and a first-innings lead of 53. Knight's century, scored off 154 balls with 16 boundaries.




