## GO-NGO (Working) Relationship: Some Suggestions

HE NGO Affairs Bureau established in 1990 with the sole purpose of monitoring and assisting the work of the NGOs as a one-stop service. As time progressed, it became evident that it was not able to achieve its stated goals. The NGO community began to perceive the Bureau's rules of procedures to be rather unduly regulatory in nature, too bureaucratic and complex. On the part of the government, NGOs continued to be viewed as organisations lacking in transparency in their management and financial operations.

On the other hand, no sigruficant advantage was evidenced in terms of expeditious clearance of projects and other matters through this 'one-stop service.

Against the above background and being triggered by some special circumstances, NGOs for the first time moved the Bureau for simplification of its rules of procedures through its apex body, ADAB way back in mid-1992. No tangible progress was made in the the endeavour up until recently when the government approved two separate studies on the situation under the broad scope and title 'Strengthening of the NGO Affairs Bureau and Go/NGO Relationship.' not enough. There is, therefore, a continuous need for suggestion/recommendations for solutions to problems pre-

On the other hand, one must also accept the fact that the present government has to deal, among others, with a lot more complex issues compared to its predecessors which are not only complex but often considered difficult. Consider the fact that it has to imbibe in the minds of today's generation the essence and meaning of the Independence and the creation of Bangladesh side by side dealing with such hard core and practical aspects of developing the national economy through development of its industries, trade and agriculture.

Therefore I would consider it to be too ambitious for all parties involved in this exercise to expect any easy or ready solution. As a matter of fact I believe the matter should now be handled in a wellthought-out way with real political commitment. On the part of the NGOs their commitment should also be clearly spelt out. One thing is absolutely clear that atmosphere three major factors stand in our way without a clear understanding of which the right climate cannot emerge for hardcore practical steps by any and all parties.

The government, on its part, must spell out in concrete terms as to its perception of the 'NGOs lacking in their transparency of operations'. The NGOs on their part must be clear as to their role as catalytic agents in the overall poverty alleviation and development perspective in the national context. To my mind it would be fair to say that the NGOs are here to complement the efforts of the government working away within the framework of 'national development strategies'. NGOs must also realise that other people too are able to see through their operations as they unto others. The third and the final point seems to be the question of the alleged 'involvement' of the NGOs in partisan politics.

NGOs registered with the Bureau which are active. It is however important to note here that at the time of establishment of the Bureau the number of NCOs registered with it was 200 only.

The way the Bureau is structured today any one can see that it cannot function effectively despite best of intentions. Its overall staff strength, the access to professional resources within the set-up including the vested authority' are absolutely inadequate to meet the day-to-day challenges. In order for the Bureau to be effective its operational strength with staff complement consisting of dynamic professionals having adequate exposure in dealing with ex-

The existing status of the Bureau should also be elevated. It also needs to be stabilised The Bureau should have an extended authority in its operational jurisdictions. For this it should be headed by an official of the rank of an additional secretary to the government. Consideration should also be given in enhancing its status to that of a Ministry, if found feasible. Under the existing arrangement, the Bureau is a part of the Prime Minister's office. This was initially done for some historical reasons which I believe no longer ex-

good governance we need to decentralise the overall administrative, machinery to the farthest extent possible. It is counterproductive to place such a highly interactive department dealing with numerous complex and micro-issues under the aegis of the Prime

Minister's office. Within a span of about four years the Bureau has witnessed changes in its leadership as many as five times. Not only that even with its current staff strength which is grossly inadequate there has been too many shifting in its job-assignments between and among the existing staff.

I would like to point out that the steps suggested may not even be implementable and may not even be wise to act upon. A more comprehensive dialoguing and deliberations may be necessary, there is however one issue that the Government and the Bureau could give serious consideration with some urgency is the revision/rationalisation of the Bureau's Rules of Procedures for governing of the NGOs in line with ADAB's memorandum of 1992. I can say with confidence that a step towards this direction alone will be the longest leap ever towards improvement and development of the existing Go/NGO relation-

Haripur Oil: A Success Heads to Failure?

The discovery was celebrated by the entire Bangladesh which immediately expanded its programmes to find more oil fields. The celebration is proving short-lived.

Commercial production of crude oil from the field started at Well No. 7 in January '87 under the management of Sylhet Gas Fields Company Ltd. a subsidiary of Petrobangla.

Until last year, a total of seven lakh barrels of crude oil were extracted from the well. The average daily output during 1986-87 was about 29 barrels which went upto 400 barrels in three years. Afterwards, the production started declining gradually and came down to 100 barrels a day during

1992-93.

According to sources, precipitation of wax on pipelines. used for extraction of crude oils, aggravated the situation further. To remove the trouble. a team of foreign experts worked for about a month last year but failed to restore the

Things deteriorated further when water surfaced in the well. "There was no way that we continue extraction", said a Petrobangla official. He, however, informed that the authorities are contemplating some geo-morphological survey to delineate the viability of drilling more wells around the existing well.

Since the discovery of the

Haripur oil field, no exact appraisal of the reserve was done. However, it is estimated that there is about eight million barrels of crude oil, of which, at least two million barrels are recoverable.

According to Petrobangla sources, the then government had made an agreement with Canadian Scimeter Exploration Ltd in 1988 to explore petroleum in an area covering 1650 Sq Km in Haripur gas field. The signing of the deal kicked off a controversy with fierce protest from public and politicians across the country. The activities of the com-

pany, which tried to lease out its share of the oilfield to a US based company, had always

remained shrouded in mystery. And the company lost its contract in 1992 when the new government refused to renew the controversial agreement.

The company drilled two wells, out of four, for which it was contracted, and found gas from one of them. Later, they tried to export the gas to India but failed to implement their plan due to intervention from the government following political changeover in 1990. The company sealed one of the wells declaring that there was no gas in it.



# Time Runs out for Dirty Industries

In response to local and foreign pressures, Pakistan is launching measures to clean up its urban environment. Gemini News Service reports on a problem which the national environment council chairman says seems as big as "infinity".



Pakistan Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto: 'Committed to the environment'

## Shakil Shaikh writes from Islamabad

HE Pakistan Government has announced tougher measures to ensure that industries comply with environmental legislation.

It will focus on the enforcement of National Environmental Quality Standards (NEQS), which set pollution

The standards were drawn up in 1983, but no action was taken for a decade, when industries were given three years to comply.

That period of grace expired this July.

Penalties for non-compliance are one million rupees for industrial polluters, followed by a daily fine of 100,000 rupees and, finally, up to two years imprisonment.

However, there is an understanding between government and industries that punitive action will not be taken immedi-

"The government appreciates that in a number of cases compliance with the NEQS calls for substantial investment," says the former president of the Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry, S M Munir, who owns a chain of tanneries and textile mills.

Industrialists argue that anti-pollution measures will push up costs, and are constantly lobbying for the enforcement of legislation to be postponed. But they are having to respond to a range of pres-.Some industries fear re-

strictions will be imposed on their products in foreign markets if they do not clean up their act.

In addition, the World Bank, Asian Development Bank and other financial institutions and aid donors are increasingly insisting on the application of environmental measures, and occasionally support clean-up projects.

Two large tannery treatment plants in central Pakistan and in Karachi, for example, are being financed by industry associations, the government, the United Nations Industrial Development Organisation and the Dutch govern-

In the past two years, expanded media coverage of green issues in Pakistan particularly deforestation, vehicle emissions and industrial and municipal waste - has raised public interest and awareness. Environmental groups are beginning to exert powerful pressures.

The main parties agree that action is required. Although it is Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto who is giving the current push, it was her predecessor, Nawaz Sharif, who activated the national standards in

However, Sharif, now leader of the opposition, disputes Bhutto's claim that "Pakistan's commitment to the cause of the environment is beyond question". He says: "Proper attention has so far not been given to environment prob-

He is also critical of the performance of the Environment Protection Council and of its chairman - who is Bhutto's husband, Asif Ali Zardari.

Initially, Zardari had a cred ibility problem, but his toplevel connection appears to have helped give him weight in talks with industry. He says "appreciable head-

way" has been made in creating environmental awareness. but admits that the task is daunting: "Infinity is the concept in my mind. Salman Faruqui, senior civil servant in the Environment

Ministry, confidently asserts: "Pakistan has fully engaged itself in the battle to save the environment.

"Its resources may be limited, its efforts may be inadequate, but its commitment to this noblest of causes is no less genuine than anybody else's. and what it is doing to translate the commitment into practical action is more impressive in size and content than many."

He points to the achievements of a campaign to plant 600 million saplings in the past three planting seasons; the relocation of heavily pollut-

ing textile factories in Faisalabad, the third largest city, to a designated industrial estate: plans to curb vehicle emissions through the use of catalytic converters and unleaded petrol; and the inclusion of the environment on the school syllabus. For some problems, such as

the poor state of urban infrastructure, which Bhutto admits is a major issue, there are no obvious solutions. Others, such as Zardari's suggestion for a ban on smoking advertising by the year 2000, will be delayed by industry.

But it looks as though a start is being made.
