

Mannan alleged that the BNP for the past several days was trying to foil the by-elections in 15 constituencies through different provocative activities.

He said the Awami League was all-through vocal against rigging and unfair means in polls and struggled along with people to realise their rights for "vote and rice."

Mannan said when the foreign and local poll observers and the major newspapers had observed that the Thursday's by-election was held in a free and fair manner, only the BNP was trying to mislead the people

He said for the first time in the history of Bangladesh, the head of the government and the ministers did not take part in election campaigns and Bangladesh Betar and Television refrained from broadcasting news in favour of ruling party candidates. They have set a unique example in the electoral history of the country, Mannan maintained.

Laxmipur-2 No action for obstructing voting, allege BNP, AL

India ratifies Salman, who got married chemical arms ban treaty

THE HAGUE, Sept 6: India has ratified the chemical weapons ban treaty, the preparatory commission for the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons said here today, reports AFP.

India, which formally handed the United Nations Secretary-general the instruments of ratification on Tuesday, has become the 62nd country to rat ify the UN chemical weapons convention, which needs the ratification of 65 countries to go into force.

The commission, in a prepared statement, noted that india's ratification was especially significant because of its large chemical industry. The convention, which bans

the production, stockpiling and use of poisonous gas and agents. was set up on January 13, 1993 in Paris and has so far been signed by 160 nations.

The signatures are regarded as a token form of approval and the treaty will only come into effect 180 days after 65 coun tries have formally ratified it.

Last month, Russia indicated it was prepared to ratify the treaty, which is also expected go to before the US senate

Film star Salman Shah commits suicide

Popular film star Salman Shah died at his 10th-floor flat in Eskaton area in the city vesterday noon.

Police suspected that Salman had committed suicide by hanging himself from the ceiling fan in the dressing room of his flat at the multistoried Eskaton Plaza at about 11:45 am. He was about 30.

The reason behind the reported suicide could not be known immediately. However police suspected that Salman had feud with his wife Samira Shariar which could have been a cause for the tragic incident The conflict between the film star and his wife emerged cen tering over his alleged relation ship with a popular actress of Dhaka film industry, police

Chowdhury Md Shariar alias Imon, better known as Salman Shah in the filmdom is the son of Kamaruddin Ahmed Chowdhury and Nila Chowdhury, former leader of Jatiya Party's women front Salman left behind his parents wife, a brother and a host of admirers to mourn his death

lice sources said quoting the as-Unlocking the door, Abul, Salman's wife and two maids found Salman hanging from the ceiling fan. Comparatively taller Abul immediately cut the rope, brought down Salman in an unconscious state. They started sprinkling water over his body, police sources added.
