### US to give Nepal \$30 m in grant money

KATMANDU, Sept 5: The United States has agreed to give Nepal 30 million dollars in grant money over the next six years to improve health standards for mothers and children and to promote family planning, reports AP.

Nepal's Finance Ministry Secretary Ram Binod Bhattarai, US Ambassador Sandra Vogelgesang and USAID Nepal Country Director Frederick Machmer on Thursday signed an agreement for the grant

The aid will be utilized throughout Nepal to increase the availability, quality and use of voluntary family planning programmes and repro-ductive health services, a joint statement said.

A portion of the funding will go toward improving maternal health-care and reducing maternal mortality and the transmission of sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS.

### Pakistan cancels proposed sale of UBL to Saudi firm

ISLAMABAD, Sept 6: The Pakistan government has cancelled the proposed sale of stateowned United Bank Ltd. (UBL) to a Saudi Arabian concern, Basharahil Ltd., a government statement said yesterday, reports AFP.

Fresh bids from parties interested in buying UBL will be invited with the approval of the central bank, the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP), the statement

It gave no reason for the decision, but sources said the cancellation followed a breakdown in negotiations over terms of the proposed deal.

The SBP took over the management of the bank in April. saying the move was designed to protect depositors, recover bad loans and cut administrative expenses.

Following the takeover more than 16 UBL officials were arrested in May by the Federal Investigation Agency on charges of embezzlement and fraud.

The bank has estimated assets or about five billion dollars, mostly in real estate, with more than 1,600 branches and 22,000 employees.

### France announces \$5b incometax cut for '97

PARIS, Sept 6: French Prime Minister Alain Juppe on Thursday announced a 25 billion-franc (almost five billion dollars) incometax cut for 1997. partly offset by an increase of seven billion francs in social security contributions, reports AFP.

That means a net reduction in tax pressure of 18 billion

He also said that income tax would be reduced by a "net" total (after abolition of deductions) of 75 billion francs over five years by lowering all tax brackets as of next year. That measure will be adopted by parliament this fall, he said.

The maximum marginal tax rate will be cut from the current 56.8 per cent to 47 per cent over a five-year-period, while the minimum rate will fall from 12 to 7 per cent, he said.

 An additional 1.5 million families will come completely off the income tax rolls in the coming five years, he said.

The Prime Minister said that almost all households will find themselves paying a substantially lower percentage of their income in income taxes in

five years. But while reducing tax rates, the government is also going to gradually phase out a certain number of deductions particularly deductions for interest on new property loans, extra deductions from which 110 professions benefit, and some deductions for life insurance.

## Belarus freezes accounts of 5 independent newspapers

MINSK, Belarus, Sept 6: The bank accounts of five of the country's leading independent newspapers have been frozen and stiffiness imposed on them. the state tax inspectorate said

Thursday, reports AP. According to the Interfax news agency, the tax authority said the action was taken because the papers had violated accounting procedures. The fines ranged from 700 million to one billion roubles (41,000 to 59.000 dollars).

The international journalists group Reporters without Borders said taxmen employed unusual methods of calculation which were particularly disadvantageous for the newspapers.

With the Belarus independent media facing serious financial and political difficulties, measures such as these threaten the very survival of the newspapers concerned," the group said in a statement from its Paris headquarters.

Belarus has been increasingly tense as President Alexander Lukashenko undertakes a crackdown on opponents and tries to win approval of a draft constitution that his foes say would give him dictatorial powers.

# US to delay sale of F-16 jet fighters to Indonesia

WASHINGTON, Sept 6: Cit ing human rights concerns, the Clinton administration said Thursday it is holding off for at least four months on notifying Congress of its intention to sell F-16 jet fighters to Indonesia.

Department spokesman Glyn Davies said a number of lawmakers had expressed concern over the proposed sale following a late July crackdown on a pro-democracy movement in Indonesia.

As a result, congressional notification - A key step in major arms transfers - will be deferred until the new Congress

TOKYO, Sept 6: The US dol-lar rose slightly against the Japanese yen Friday as most players waited for figures on US-

unemployment, reports AP. Trading was quiet ahead of the scheduled release later Friday of US jobless figures for August as a possible indicator of the Federal Reserve's interest rate policy said, Hiroshi Yoshinami, a Tokai Bank trader.

In late afternoon, the dollar was trading at 109.16 yen, up 0.14 yen from late Thursday and also slightly above its overnight New York level of 109.13 yen.

The dollar has been supported by growing speculation that the Fed may raise interest rates soon, while Japan's largely are expected to remain at current levels.

At a new conference Thursday. Sanwa executives bowed deeply in apology. But they insisted the losses stemmed from the misdeed of one person.

The former Sanwa manager made unauthorized withdrawals in March to make up for his debts from failed investments in futures and equities, Sanwa said. There is no evidence he used bank money for the trades.

# Snagged shippers chart course for boom Egypt's maritime business, are

Forty years ago, a Greek merchant navy captain hit on an effective way to avoid costly ship congestion in Alexandria Egypt's main port.

As he tells it: The delay was costing us thousands of dollars a day. The ship-owner, a young man, was almost hysterical. I told him to stop fretting, go ashore and buy a Holy Koran He did. I put plenty of dollars between the pages, wrapped if up nicely and presented the book to Alexandria's chief port inspector. It worked like magic Our cargo was discharged that same day.

Such radical tactics, fortunately, are no longer needed to oil the wheels of Egypt's seaborne trade. But the country's shipping business remains mired in red tape dating back to the Nasser era. And the business community is becoming restless.

Prospects for rapid growth in international trade are fueling that impatience.

Egypt has a bright future in the shipping sphere," says Nigel Moore, general manager of Barwil Egyptrans, a leading shipping agency. Now stuck in a dark, cramped office in Alexandria's old El Shatby district. Moore intends to move the company to more modern. airier premises. "We have to be able to compete in the imminent market boom," he says.

FDI inflow NEW DELHI, Sept 6: India has witnessed a fast growth in inflows of foreign direct investment (FDI) into the country in recent years, the Times of India said today, reports Xinhua.

According to latest available figures of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), the central bank in the country, a substantial FDI inflow into sectors such as services and electronics equipment has resulted in an 118 per cent rise in the actual inflows into the country in rupee terms in 1994-95 against the previous fiscal year.

The actual inflow of foreign direct investments in 1993-94 at 12.14 at 12.14 billion rupees (370.1 million US dollars) was 50 per cent higher than the figure of 8.763 billion rupees (248.8 million dollars) regis-

tered in the year before. The investments in the food processing industries, for example have showed a healthy increase from 813.3 million rupees (22.91 million dollars) in 1992-93 to 1.375 billion rupees (38.73 million dollars) in the next year and 1.881 billion rupees (about 53.00 million dolin 1994-95, RBI figures
