Consider 'realities' in designing Crude arsenic was being used at reforms, Dhaka urges donors Zoo till early 80s

By Morshed Ali Khan The Dhaka Zoo authorities

sold a 50-kg bag of crude arsenic, purchased in the midseventies, to a private dealer in an open auction last year, according to official sources. Crude arsenic was being used

at the zoo until the early Eighties as a preservative in taxidermy, a process of staffing the skins of dead animals.

The use of arsenic at the Zoo came to a halt when, in 1980, an elephant and an unspecified number of spotted-deer of the Zoo died of arsenic poisoning, it was disclosed by a Zoo official. An Indian taxidermist had trained the Dhaka Zoo employees in the early Seventies and introduced arsenic as a preser-

at the Zoo. "I was using arsenic on the skin of the dead animals with bare hands until 1980 when some deer and the elephant died. Then we were warned of the danger," he said.

Taher Thakur held, placed on 8-day CID remand

By Staff Correspondent Former state minister. Taher Uddin Thakur, arrested late Wednesday night in con-nection with the killing of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, was placed on an eight-day CID remand yesterday for interrogation, according to sources concerned.

Taher Uddin was arrested by CID personnel from his East Nakhalpara residence in the city on charges of involvement in the killing of Bangabandhu and his family members on August 15, 1975. He was also shown arrested for his alleged involvement in the killing of four national leaders inside the Dhaka central jail on November 3 the same year, police sources said.

He was produced before the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's court at about 4.45 pm yesterday. CID prayed for a 10-See Page 12 Col 8

Dhaka demands closure of Jerusalem tunnel

Bangladesh condemns the opening of tunnel in the vicinity of the Al-Aqsa Mosque and the Israeli oppression on the Palestinian people, reports

Commenting on the recent developments in Israel, foreign minister Abdus Samad Azad in statement at the OIC ministerial meeting in New York Wednesday said, "The new Israeli government's arrogance and provocative actions have spurred violence resulting in loss of lives." a message from the UN headquarters said.

Opining that the "peace process is in serious jeopardy, Azad demanded immediate closure of the entrance to the disputed tunnel in Jerusalem. He urged the Israeli government to honour their commitment made under the peace accord and called to take urgent steps for complete withdrawal of Ismeli troops from Hebron and dismantle all Jewish settlements in the occupied land.

Amendment not necessary: Khasru

'Indemnity Ordinance not a part of the Constitution'

State Minister for Law Abdul Matin Khasru has said the 'socalled' Indemnity Ordinance of Khondker Moshtaque is not part of the Constitution and there is no scope for debate on the matter, reports BSS.

He said the ordinance is not a part of the Constitution and there is no necessity to amend the Constitution to repeal it. It is repealable by a simple majority in the Sangsad, he added.

The minister was addressing as chief guest a reception accorded to two Members of Parliament from Comilla-2, A H M Mostafa Kamal and Tajul Islam by the Laksam Association. Dhaka at the Engineers' Institute here on Wednesday, according to an official handout issued yesterday.

Khasru said the ordinance. promulgated by Khondker

Moshtaque, is contrary to hu-man rights and rule of law. He said such heinous example to exonerate the killers could not be found in the history of human civilisation.

He said whether Khondker Moshtaque had any lawful basis to declare himself the president or whether he had any power or constitutional authority to promulgate the Indemnity Ordinance, and whether indemnity ordinance was incorporated in the fifth amendment by late President Ziaur Rahman were very significant questions.

Move soon to secure bail for Ershad in 17 cases

Lawyers for Jatiya Party chief Hussain Mohammad Ershad. MP, are moving the courts soon to renew their efforts to secure bail for their client in 17 more cases. JP sources said. The former president was re-

cently granted bail by the High Court in a corruption case in which he was sentenced to three years simple imprisonment. Two of Ershad's counsels

met him on Tuesday to discuss the strategy. Their hope for obtaining bail for their client was brightened following a meeting between top government leaders and a senior JP leader on Friday last. The JP leader conveyed Er

shad's 'frustrations' over what he feels delay in obtaining bail. Ershad has reportedly con-

veyed to the government leaders that he would like to see that his bail petitions are not opposed and the process is completed by November 1. Otherwise, he would consider withdrawal of his party's support to the government.

JP sources claimed they were reassured by the ruling party leaders that they would not oppose the bail petitions. But gov-


ernment sources said they would not interfere with the process of law. It's upto the courts to grant him bail, they added.

This year's prize was the richest ever since it was first awarded in 1901 - 7.4 million kronor (1.12 million US dol-

Fresh sanctions likely Travel to US by members of

Myanmar junta banned

WASHINGTON, Oct 3: President Bill Clinton signed a ban today on travel to the United States by members of the Myanmar junta and others who benefit from its rule in protest at the regime's human rights

abuses, reports AFP. An administration official also noted that the Clinton administration was considering new economic sanctions against the military-ruled country.

A provision just signed into law by Clinton calls for a ban on new US investment in Myanmar if the junta launches a large-scale crackdown on its critics or takes steps against opposition leader Aung San Suu

The visa proclamation follows the arrest of between 500 and 800 members of Aung San Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy (NLD) ahead of a planned conference last weekend in Yangon. "We deplore these actions

and call on the SLORC to release immediately and unconditionally all of the NLD members and other democratic activists." the White House said in a statement, referring to the ruling State Law and Order Restoration Council.

The visa ban takes effect immediately and bars entry to the United States by anyone "formulating, implementing, or benefitting from policies that are impeding the transition to democracy in Myanmar and their family members. It does not necessarily apply

to diplomats coming to the United States on official business, according to one administration official.
