Aga Khan opens rural empowerment initiative in Hunza

inaugurating the newly-re-stored 700 year-old Baltit Fort and a related town development initiative nestled more than 2,500 meters high in Pakistan's picturesque Hunza Valley overlooking the Karakorum Highway, Pakistan's President Farooq Leghari and the Aga Khan, Imam (spiritual leader) of the Shia Ismaili Muslims hailed the empowerment of local communities working in collaboration with governments, international agencies and non-governmental organizations, says a press release.

Located above the town of Karimabad and now restored as a museum and cultural center. once, for centuries, the seat of the Mirs (rulers) of Hunza, a former princely state. Baltit Fort has been the focus of a combined community-based planning and conservation project undertaken by the Aga Khan Trust for Culture through its Historic Cities Support Programme.

International agencies, including the Getty Grant Program from the United States and NORAD, Norway's bilateral aid agency, collaborated in this

Describing the Fort restoration project at the inauguration, the Aga Khan said that it was expected to "act as a dynamic factor of change, benefit ing from the improving accessibility of the Northern Areas."

The Trust's aspirations, the Aga Khan said, "are to develop models and techniques that will enable societies throughout the world to rescue, restore and reutilise monuments, structures and spaces that are products of their own distinct histo-

"Successful development" he noted "requires community engagement and mobilisation, but also needs to occur in a cultural context that preserves individual local values and ideals."

Village organizations established in some 2,000 villages in the area, with the help of the Aga Khan Rural Support Programme have, for over 15 years been working to promote community-based agricultural, income-generating and productive infrastructure activities as well as particularly successful projects through self-governed women's organisations.

Collaborative field research with the Aga Khan Program for Islamic Architecture a Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology resulted in a pilot project for cluster housing.

Saudi economy set to surge in '96

ABU DHABI. Oct 3: Saudi Arabia's economy is set to surge to one of its highest levels in more than a decade this year because of the sharp increase in oil prices and growth in other sectors, bankers said on

Tuesday. New bank projections showed the gross domestic product (GDP) of the world's top oil producer and exporter would climb by around six per cent in nominal terms in 1996 before it

retreats in the following year. With the average price of Saudi light and heavy crudes forecast to reach around 18.5 dollars in 1996, the Gulf kingdom's energy sector will likely soar by nearly 12 per cent.

bankers told AFP from Riyadh. "Saudi Arabia's GDP will increase by around six per cent this year compared with 4.3 per cent last year. The 1996 growth rate is one of the highest rate in nominal terms in more than 10

years," one banker said. "The high growth rate is mainly because of the large increase in crude prices and the impact of this on other sectors.

"Another factor is the reforms as there was a sharp upturn in investment in the manufacturing sector following the introduction of more govern-

Textile mills owners aired their grave concern over the labour unrest in the textile sector and urged the government to deal the "miscreants" with iron hand, reports UNB.

In a statement on Tuesday, Chairman of Bangladesh Textile Mills Association Mohammad Shahajahan said a few people were creating unrest among the labourers of the textile sector, particularly in the spinning sector, to establish their political supremacy.

"They are trying to hinder foreign and national investment in this sector for their self-interest," he said, without giving the political identity of those people.

Shahjahan said spinning mills in Savar, Gazipur, Sreepur and Bhaluka areas were about to face closure as some outsiders, posing as labour leaders, are out to establish influence at the initiative of local

political leaders. The move bred unrest and trouble in the spinning mills of those areas and hampered law and order seriously. Some mils in Sreepur area have already been closed due to this political

problem, he pointed out. The 'miscreants' have in the mean time assaulted some officers of the mills, he said,

Eurotunnel suspends trading in shares

LONDON, Oct 3: Channel Tunnel operator Eurotunnel said Monday it has suspended trading in its shares in London, Paris and Brussels, prompting speculation that the debt-ridden Anglo-French group was about to agree a refinancing deal with its bankers, reports AP.

The company, which has been in talks for months with more than 200 banks, said trading has been temporarily suspended "pending an announcement" but did not elaborate. The operator of the tunnel

linking England and France is now able to cover daily operating costs with revenues but it still cannot handle payments on its debt that totals more than 9 billion pounds, or 14 billion dollars. Press Association, the

British news agency, said Monday the deal is expected to include an initial debt-for-equity swap which would give the banks up to 49 per cent of the. enlarged share capital of the company. The Financial Times of London reported on Monday that
